Art Students Experience Raku

On November 4, ceramics students took to the road for an exciting and unique experience. Sponsored by a guest artist grant from the Tam High Foundation, we visited the Berkeley studio of Andree Thompson to participate in a day of raku firing.

In this ancient technique from the Far East, once-fired pots are glazed with special glazes loaded with copper and other metals and then loaded into a hot kiln fueled by propane gas. Glazes melt in minutes instead of hours. Students were able to peek into the top of the kiln to see exactly how glazes mature to coat their pots with gorgeous colored glass. As soon as glazes form a smooth covering on the clay, the kiln is uncovered. Seeking the brilliant iridescent colors that only raku can produce, students race to extract their red-hot pots and bury them in a "nest" dug into the ground and filled with combustible materials. The red-hot pot ignites these materials and the nest is immediately covered to smother the flames, starving them of oxygen and causing them to reach into the clay for it. This pulls the metals

to the surface and produces prodigious amounts of smoke that make the unglazed portions of the pot black. Performing a similar process at a more leisurely speed yields beautiful blue and green colors and the dramatic black veining characteristic of the raku technique.

The pots are beautiful and impressive, but the main attraction of the process is the action, the excitement and the teamwork that it engenders. Participants invariably leave Berkeley happy,

smelly, and with a new understanding of and appreciation for the art that turns bits of earth into objects of lasting beauty.

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


On the communications front, we have been working on updating our emails and newsletter to make them more concise and easier to read.

The College and Career Center is sponsoring several events to help students and parents become familiar with college admissions tests and financial aid.

Financial Aid Night

Tuesday December 6, 6:30 pm @ Tam Student Center.

Bryan Hacke, senior financial aid advisor at Dominican University of California, will present an overview of financial aid and explain how to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), the primary financial aid application. This presentation is open to the entire Tam community. Families of seniors applying for financial aid are urged to attend this once-a-year event.

Admissions Testing Night

Wednesday, January 25, 6:30 pm @ Tam Student Center.

Bruce Reed, regional director of Compass Education Group, will review PSAT results and give an in-depth explanation of college admissions tests: the SAT, ACT and Subject Test. Students who took the PSAT should receive their results later this month. Reed will also discuss Score Choice, a reporting option offered by the College Board. Sophomores, juniors and their parents are encouraged to attend this very informative, once-a-year presentation.

Mock SAT at Tam

Wednesday, Feb. 1, 1:15-5:15 pm (a minimum day). Sign-ups begin Jan. 16.

This practice test is a great opportunity for students to increase their familiarity with the SAT. A \$10 donation, payable in cash or check made out to Tam High PTSA, is requested. The donations fund the PTSA Academic Scholarships given to graduating seniors. Signup deadline is January 30.

National Portfolio Day for Visual Artists Saturday, January 14, noon-4 pm @ California College of the Arts, San Francisco.

SAT and ACT

You can download the 2011-2012 SAT and ACT testing calendars and register for either test online. Go to www.collegeboard.com for the SAT and www.actstudent.org for the ACT. Sign up early for a convenient test site. Tam High is not a test site.

Attention: UC Applicants

The University of California expects all applicants to complete the courses listed for senior year with a grade of "C" or better. It is the student's responsibility to notify the university if he or she has received or expects to receive a grade lower than "C" for the first or second semester. Students must also notify the university if they drop a class listed on the application or add a new one. Students must also notify the university if they change their mailing or e-mail address.

ROP Programs

The Marin County Office of Education's Regional Occupational Program is offering three evening programs of interest to Tam students.

Construction Technology: This class, offered in partnership with the Marin Builders Association and held at Redwood High School begins in January. The course covers framing, plumbing, electrical, roofing, green building practices and more. Students learn by observing demonstrations from volunteer master craftsmen and by participating in construction projects and summer internships. Students can earn up to five units of high school credit. The class is held from 5-9 pm and fills up quickly.

Automotive Technology: ROP offers an automotive technology class that allows students to earn high school credit and transferable credits at College of Marin. The class is held at San Rafael High School on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 4-6:30 pm. All you have to do to register is go to the class and meet with the instructor.

Media Center: ROP opened a technology center for high school students to learn state-of-the-art sound, video, multimedia and engineering skills. Students can earn high school credit in the foundations of multimedia design using Adobe software. They can also learn to develop and program robotic creations and understand applied physics and design through the construction of engineering projects such as motors. The media center is located at 1115 Third St., San Rafael and is open Monday through Thursday, 5-7 pm. Open Lab is available Fridays, 3-7 pm.

Journeys of a School Gypsy

I've always been a school gypsy. For those of you who are unaware of this subspecies, I will explain. A school gypsy is one of those odd people whose life seems to consist of change; they have itchy feet and never stay at the same school.

There are different gypsy categories: the troublemaker gypsy, the drama gypsy, the moving caravan gypsy, and then the very rare category into which I fall. I am one of those rare gypsies who actually thrive off of change and feel an almost physical desire for it. I diagnose this disorder change-dependent school gypsy (CDSG). I have never stayed at the same school for more than two years.

It began when I moved in the middle of the first grade. I was home-schooled by my mother for the rest of that year, and all the angst of a recently-relocated precocious first grader came out in full force. My mother, exhausted, sent me to a brick and mortar school for second grade. Most "normal" kids finish elementary school, go to the nearest middle and high schools and that is the end of their school traveling. However, I wasn't sent to a normal school. I was sent to a German Brethren School, attended by a group of plain folk that didn't watch TV, listen to music or wear anything shorter than knee length. My teacher wore a bonnet and the men wore top hats. I was the only person there who was not a part of their church. However, my time at the German Brethren School ended quickly due to the fact that the entire school consisted of less than 25 people, and when a family of six left, the school closed down.

In third grade, I was sent to another plain folk school because my parents were so pleased by the last. I remember being the only girl without braids down to her waist. Uttering the word television around other students seemed like a curse word. I stuck out like a sore thumb, which is why I left after third grade.

I didn't move schools because my parents told me. I left because I was never satisfied. I am thankful for every single school year I've had, but the source of the problem is my addiction to change. I've experienced three home-school programs, three private schools, one performing arts school, two online schools, one public school and now Tamalpais High.

I came to Tam High as a sophomore, after a move from Tuolumne County, Sierra Nevada to Bolinas. I completed an online high school program through Stanford University as a freshman, which was a challenging, yet wonderful experience. However, the Stanford program became too rigorous to handle. I had no time to spend doing things that I truly loved. My art, fashion, and writing were left deserted. My understanding people completely supported my decision.


I never ran from situations or schools. I just wanted as many experiences as possible. I had a goal for every year, whether it is to grow, expand my mind or spend a year writing as much as possible. Some years I felt I wasn't challenged at all, so I left. When school dragged me down socially and mentally, I left. I don't regret a single move except for one detail. I regret that I never let myself make lasting relationships. I have friends all around the world and all around the U.S. I've been blessed to have met a very diverse group of people, and moving around so much has taught me not to be shy. But just because I thrive off of change, doesn't mean I'm always happy in it. In my immediate social circles, I've never let myself be close to anyone.

Part of living through high school is a desire for change. As humans, we usually seem to be more comfortable with what we know. Instead, I'm comfortable with what I don't know. So here I am, wondering how I can finally force myself to stay somewhere. I can't let my desire for change compromise my high school experience. I have to finally allow myself to truly care about people and live in the present. I must battle the desire for change and make a personal decision to stay at Tam High.



Directed and designed entirely by advanced drama students, the CTE Winter One Act Festival encompasses a diverse collection of shows covering all time periods, storylines, locations, and universes imaginable. As a united team, student directors, along with first and second-year drama actors have created exciting, dynamic shows that employ the skills they have honed during three months of rehearsal. Together they studied the structure of scenes and characters, motifs and themes. Preparing for a one act is intensive but very rewarding. It requires concentrated ensemble work, which is what CTE is all about.

The shows, chosen by Honors Theatre Directing students, range from the satirical comedies of Christopher Durang to the heartfelt dramas of William Saroyan, and everything in between. Behind the scenes, advanced drama students are busy scheduling, directing, and producing. All one acts are managed and designed by student directors in a collaborative, collective process. Design work includes lighting, sound, costume, prop, and set. First and second year students are equally busy, memorizing lines, blocking, developing their characters, and exploring their talent with the encouragement and aid of their peer directors. These plays are the culmination of many hours of work and preparation for these students. In fact, every student in CTE will be involved in some aspect of the festival!

Festival dates are January 5-7, 10-14, and 17-21 and all performances will be held at Caldwell Theatre, located at the back of Tam's campus. Each play will be performed twice. Tickets are \$5 for students and senior citizens and \$12 for adults. CTE's Box Office opens at 6 pm. Tickets cannot be purchased in advance online or by phone. Seating is a on a first-come, first-serve basis. Please do not save seats. Doors open at 6:30 pm and shows begin promptly at 7pm. You will not want to miss out on these fun shows!
