

UPCOMING EVENTS

APRIL 17: COLLEGE OF MARIN PLACEMENT TESTS

Seniors planning to attend College of Marin next fall will have an opportunity to take the mandatory placement tests in English and math at Tam on Wednesday, April 17, from 9 am -noon in the computer lab. Make-up tests will be given at COM. Seniors planning to attend other community colleges should contact the school now for its placement test policy. Seniors may sign up for the COM Placement Test in the College and Career Center.

Students must have registered to attend COM and have received a COM student identification number in order to take the placement tests.

MAY 6: MARIN COUNTY COLLEGE FAIR

More than 150 colleges and post-secondary programs will be represented at the Marin County College Fair on Monday, May 6 from 6-8 pm at Dominican University of California in San Rafael. There will also be workshops on financial aid and college admissions tests. The college fair is free and open to the public.

Save time at the fair and the bother of filling out contact cards for different colleges by pre-registering online at <u>www.wacaccollegefair.com</u>.

SAT and ACT REGISTRATION DATES

The last SAT exams for this school year will be given on May 4 and June 1. Sign up online at <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>. The last ACT will be on June 8. Register online at www.actstudent.org. Sign up early for a convenient location. Tam is not a testing site.

Juniors applying to four-year colleges are encouraged to take the SAT this spring. In addition, many juniors choose to take the ACT, which is accepted equally with the SAT. Juniors planning to apply to highly competitive colleges are advised to take two Subject Tests. Although the University of California no longer requires Subject Tests, some campuses recommend that "students vying for slots in competitive majors take the tests to demonstrate subject proficiency." For more information on the UC Subject Test policy, go to: http://www.universityofcalifornia. edu/admissions/freshman/requirements/examination-requirement/ SAT-subject-tests/index.html.

Students who will complete a subject such as biology or US history this year are strongly advised to take the Subject Test in that area this spring instead of waiting until senior year when they will have forgotten some of the material.

Students may borrow practice books from the College and Career Center to prepare for the SAT, ACT, Subject Tests and AP exams. Free SAT and ACT test preparation is also available online at <u>www.number2.com</u> as well as the College Board and ACT websites.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR SENIORS

Each week the College and Career Center publishes the Green Sheet, a list of local scholarships, which is emailed to seniors and their parents. It is also available in the College and Career Center.

Students do not need to have a 4.0 or attend a four-year college to receive a scholarship. Awards may be based on need, merit, community service, talent (such as sports or art), interests (such as engineering or gardening), ethnicity, where the student lives, where a parent works or a combination of any of these factors. Some scholarships are just for



Wicked Fun! *The Witches* Closes CTE's 2012-13 Season!

After a fall season that brought us a whirlwind of Arabian storytelling, high-toned gossip, small town loneliness and an apocalypse, CTE/TAM Drama closes their season with the imaginative, action-packed, and fun production of The Witches, directed by Kathryn Zdan. The script, adapted by David Wood, is from a book by famous author Roald Dahl. Performance dates are April 19-23 at 7 pm at the Caldwell Theatre.

Roald Dahl first published *The Witches* as a children's novel in London in 1983. Dahl, known for children's classics such as Charlie And The Chocolate Factory and James And The Giant Peach began writing his later stories with edgy humor such as Matilda and The BFG. The Witches was part of this shift and soon became a favorite among his fans, leading to the movie version in 1990 and a radio play. The story centers on a young British boy who loses his parents in a car crash. He goes to live with his grandmother in England who comforts him by telling the boy many stories about witches. Their harmless fantasizing soon becomes more realistic than they expected as the "witches" gain power, revealing them to be a real threat to global security. While they look and act like normal women, they are secretly plotting to turn every single child in England into mice. The play is full of secrets and mysterious puzzles, sure to delight children while keeping older audiences entertained with humor and wit.

The innovative direction of quest director Kathryn Zdan is the heart of CTE's production. Zdan's previous plays for CTE include Wind In The Willows, In The Dark and The Eiffel Tower Wedding Party; all utilized her strong expertise in physical theatre and ensemble work. Actors develop character choices that deeply personify a strong type that is sometimes satirized. Kat's personal relationship with each cast member creates a strong bond of respect and discipline reflected in the high quality of work she achieves with her actors. Because of her background in physical theatre, she adds different twists providing a lot of physical humor. Her approach supplies the ingredients for great family entertainment!

VARSITY BASEBALL

After enjoying its best season in many years in 2012, the Tam varsity baseball team is looking to make another successful run, according to coach Mike Terry. The Hawks started the season in exciting fashion with a global studies trip – along with Varsity Softball – to Cuba, posting a 2-1 record and interacting with many Cuban baseball dignitaries.

The program lost ten seniors to graduation and returns just six varsity players, including seniors catcher Kevin Jordan, shortstop Chris Hayman, third baseman Jonathan Wachtel, pitcher Kenny Rosenberg, outfielder Jay Hopelain and junior Geoffrey Mohn.

"We hope to stay competitive in the early season while new players learn the system and their roles," Terry said. "We expect to make a strong push during the second half and compete for the league champion-ship."

Lawley will rely on three freshmen pitchers, Christy Gusif, Marley Townsend and Jessie Scarsella.

The team had an exciting and successful trip to Cuba in February, but struggled in early non-conference season with four losses to start. But the Hawks rebounded with four MCAL wins. Pogni was leading the team in hitting, with a .684 average and 1.079 slugging percentage. Crawley is assisted by Lindsay Haynes and Jackie Graf-Reis, both MVPD officers.

GIRLS'VARSITY LACROSSE
