Tam High Wins Unprecedented 19th Consecutive County Mock Trial Championship

Terra Linda came out strong in the final round. They were seamless, perfect, and

tough, but the young lawyers and witnesses from Tam did not give in. Punch and counterpunch. Each team fighting hard—both unwilling to lose. But in the end, Tam prevailed as county champions for the 19th straight year.

The staff is focusing on the areas of discipline and truancy to guarantee we have a significant impact on student behavior and positive decision-making. It is truly inspiring to work with such a dedicated group of individuals who see the power of creating a supportive learning environment for our students.

We would like to thank all of the members of our Tam Family for their continued support and volunteerism, and give a special thanks to our Tam Alumni Association for repairing our clock tower. Fixing the clock tower was no small feat, and we appreciate all the hard work it took to bring the clock back to life. Congratulations for a job well done!

TAM FOUNDATION HELPS JOURNALISM STUDENTS TO LAUNCH THE TAM BROADCAST NETWORK

Ever since Tam senior Randy Shapiro was five years old, he wanted to be a sportscaster. When he was 17, he became one.

This didn't surprise Randy, or anyone who knows him because Randy is a determined young man. What did surprise him was that, along the way, he created an entire broadcast network. The Tam Broadcast Network (TBN) launched this year under the auspices of the Tam News, offering – among other things – live broadcasts of Tam sporting events.

Randy's story is one of entrepreneurship and personal initiative, but also one of how an exceptional teacher and a supportive community made a profound difference in the lives of our students.

As a junior, Randy was a sports writer in the journalism program. He took a summer course on broadcasting through the Community Media Center of Marin, the public access channel that broadcasts the San Rafael Pacifics baseball games. He learned how to use video broadcasting equipment and the basics of sports coverage through this course and an internship at the radio station that covered the Pacifics' games.

He wanted to bring that skill set to the Tam News sports department, but, like almost every high school journalism program in the nation, it lacked the proper equipment to support live sports broadcasts. "The big obstacle was money," he says, "because all of this equipment is really expensive."

That's where journalism teacher Jonah Steinhart stepped in. His philosophy is "putting the opportunities in front of the kids, and letting them run with it. As soon as the kids show the interest and the drive to do something, I go and find the right resources to make that happen."

In just a few months, Steinhart, Randy, and several other students raised enough money to buy three SONY NX5-U HD video cameras and the other equipment needed to support live broadcasts. This fall, TBN

debuted its sports coverage, broadcasting the homecoming football game, a water polo match, and several boys' and girls' basketball games. With professional-grade cameras, three camera angles, graphics, and a play-by-play and color commentator, the productions offer everything you'll find on ESPN – except, Randy notes, instant replay. Which, of course, he hopes to add soon.

TBN is also evolving to include other forms of video journalism. A monthly news roundup show was launched and Tam News print reporters have filmed their interviews so they can also produce video features. The process is one of trial and error, which Steinhart encourages: "The great thing about the journalism program is that kids get to do what they want to do."

TBN also plans to broadcast events that are of interest to the larger Tam community, like graduation. "Imagine somebody's grandmother in Maine who's too sick to travel being able to watch her grandchild's graduation on her computer," Steinhart says. He also envisions broadcasting guest speakers who visit individual classes, CTE performances, and parent education speakers.

Although Randy will graduate this year, he's training his younger classmates so TBN can continue after he's gone. He's already found his successor: junior Riley Kuffner. The head of Tam's Young Entrepreneur Club, Riley is "very interested in startups, in founding something and creating something that benefits the community." He picked up the skills quickly enough to produce the recent broadcast of the Tam-Drake varsity boys' basketball game on his own.

The Tam Foundation is proud to have provided funds to help purchase TBN's HD cameras. The Foundation's mission is to support exactly the sort of innovative and cutting edge opportunities that TBN represents, and teachers like Jonah Steinhart, who guide their students in the pursuit of their passions with such unflagging energy.

Foundation to Solicit Major Grant Requests

Each spring, the Tam Foundation offers teachers and staff the opportunity to submit applications for major grants to enhance classroom teaching and additional areas of student support. Major grants are proposals for projects costing over \$10,000. (The mini-grant application process, for projects costing less than \$10,000, is conducted in the fall.) This year, teachers have until February 28 to submit their applications to the Major Grants Committee. The committee will make its recommendations to the Foundation Board in late March.

Major grants account for most of the Foundation's annual disbursements, and are budgeted for nearly \$250,000 this year. The Foundation funds projects that are conceived and requested by teachers and staff and that align with its mission to "foster academic excellence and innovation in education for every student at Tam High." Applicants are asked to demonstrate that their project enhances the learning environment and supports them and their students in ways that the district budget does not allow.

Last year, for example, teachers in the Social Studies and Science departments received funding for pilot programs that allowed them to try innovative teaching approaches in their classrooms. The AIM program received a grant to repair and replace its professional-grade HD cameras. The Drama, Art and Music departments were able to bring in guest artists to provide small group, hands on, specialized instruction for students.

Tam's teachers and administrators are a dynamic group of educators who constantly seek out fresh ideas and tools in order to improve their teaching. Through your donations, the Foundation supports them in these efforts so that they can continue to offer Tam students an extraordinary learning experience.



Please Support PATH

PATH (Patrons of the Arts at Tam High) is facing a significant shortfall in our fundraising this school year, and this is threatening our ability to provide Tam's art teachers with the resources they need to give students the excellent arts education for which Tam has become known.

PATH is a parent-run organization that supplements district funding for the Tam High Fine Arts program. Several years ago, the district barred art teachers from requesting donations from parents or students. Teachers had depended on such contributions to pay for sup-

plies, equipment, field trips, student exhibits, and other items that the district's budget did not encompass. PATH was created to fill this gap, and it has successfully done so since its inception.

But this year, parent donations are significantly below those of prior years. While PATH receives funds from other sources, including our successful MaskARade fundraiser last fall, the deficit in direct donations means we don't presently have enough funds to support all of the field trips, exhibitions, and critical supply purchases our teachers plan to make during the second semester. This will affect Art Exploration, Photography, Ceramics, and Draw/Paint classes at all levels, from introductory to AP.

New Graphic Design Class Coming in 2014-15

Next school year, the Fine Arts Department will offer a course in Graphic Design. The semester-long course will be offered to students who have previously taken the introductory art course, Art Exploration.

The new course will focus on the elements, art, and principles of design and how they integrate with text to convey meaning. Using a variety of media from traditional to fine-arts-based mixed media and printmaking, students will develop expressive, technical and cognitive skills in the use of image design as a means of communicating ideas or information. Assignments will relate to the workplace; presentations will be chosen and assignments structured to prepare students for a career in design. Anticipated projects include digital photography, computer generated drawings, books, posters, logo/identity projects, web sites, murals, and screen printing.


Tam's art teachers decided to add the course after noticing how much students have enjoyed using iPads and Wacom tablets in the Draw/ Paint classes. "It became clear that many students enjoy mixing photography, technology and traditional art mediums, and would like a deeper understanding of graphic design," says Draw/Paint teacher Lynne Klein. The art faculty is also excited about the course because it will "work collaboratively with our students' other subjects, like Science, English, and Social Studies, helping them make connections between them," Klein adds.

Interested students will be able to sign up for Graphic Design during the spring course selection process.

MARCH 19: COLLEGE OF MARIN REGISTRA-TION AT TAM

A representative from College of Marin will meet with seniors interested in attending COM in the fall on Wednesday, March 19, during tutorial period, 9:45-10:45 am, in the computer lab. Students will receive registration materials, assistance with online registration and learn about educational and vocational opportunities and transfer options available at COM. Passes are available in the College and Career Center.

MARCH 20: POST-HIGH SCHOOL PLANNING NIGHT

Tam will hold its Post-High School Planning Night on Thursday, March 20, at 6:30 pm, in Ruby Scott Gym. Guest speakers will represent California Community Colleges, the California State University, University of California and private colleges. MARCH 24: COM PLACEMENT TESTS

Students planning to attend College of Marin in the fall may take the required placement tests in English and math at Tam on Monday, March 24, 2:30-5:30 pm, in the computer lab. Make-up tests will be given at COM. Only students who have registered to attend COM may take the placement tests.

MAY 7: MARIN COUNTY COLLEGE FAIR

More than 150 colleges and universities from across the country will have representatives at the Marin County College Fair on Wednesday, May 7, 6-8 pm, at the Conlon Recreation Center at Dominican University of California in San Rafael. There will also be talks on financial aid and college admissions tests. Students and parents are invited to attend. The fair is sponsored by the Western Association of College Admissions Advisors.

SAT and ACT

Students may register online for the SAT at www.collegeboard.org and ACT at www. actstudent.org. Register early for a convenient location. Tam is not a test site.

Testing Tips: The counseling department recommends that juniors applying to four-year colleges take the SAT in March, May, or June. Juniors may want to take the ACT in April or June in addition to or instead of the SAT. The SAT and ACT are accepted equally at colleges and universities across the country. Students may borrow practice books from the College and Career Center to prepare for admissions

Some highly competitive colleges require or recommend Subject Tests. Sophomores and juniors who are completing an academic subject this year should consider taking a Subject Test in that area this spring. For example, students taking AP Biology or AP United States history are advised to take the Biology or US History Subject Test in May or June and not wait until senior year when they will have forgotten some of the material

The California High School Proficiency Exam (CHSPE), which awards the legal equivalent of a high school diploma, will be given on Sat., March 22 in San Rafael. Students must be 16 or in the tenth grade to take the exam. Pre-registration is required. The regular registration deadline is Feb. 21; late registration requires an additional fee. CTE Presents: Dickens' Great Expectations

Tam High School's Conservatory Theater Ensemble (CTE) presents Charles Dickens' Great Expectations, directed by Ben Cleaveland, Co-Director of the CTE program. CTE's version was specially adapted for the Royal Shakespeare Company by Nick Omerod and Declan Donnellan (Cheek By Jowl Theatre Company). The play faithfully follows Dickens's famous story and features an array of fascinating characters caught in a web of deceit, lies and self-delusion.

One of Dickens' most cherished novels, Great Expectations follows the life of Pip, a young orphan boy, as he tries to find his place in society. After an unexpected invitation to wealthy Miss Havisham's house, Pip meets Estella, her cruel but beautiful niece and the pair become childhood friends. As these two mature, each separates to follow their divergent paths in life. Estella is sent to study abroad and Pip apprentices for his uncle as a blacksmith. However, Pip continues to dream of both Estella and the wealthy lifestyle of a gentleman as a way to win her.

When an anonymous benefactor gives him a small fortune, he returns to London to become a gentleman and tries to win the fickle heart of Estella, unaware of the danger and decisions he faces.

The cast is comprised mostly of advanced drama students and includes M.J. Alves, Tizjohn Armstead, Ashley Baker, Duston Baranow-Watts, Sarah Berman, Halie Bradley, Britt Haegglund, Carson Harvey, Tessa King, Matthew Kline, Emily Malmquist, Emelia Michel, Sydney Smith, Mike Van Zandt, Ben Weinswig, and Alec Williams. Underclassmen Andrew LeBuhn, Sam Novick and Benjamin Spendov round out the cast.

The dedicated and original design team will create the world of the play. Cedar Banks, Abby Bordin, Maddy Hill, Avery Stray and Meg Weisselberg develop the visual look and sound of the production to help transport the audience into Dickens' time. The crew will be Lucy Black, Kevin Hunter, Kate Luebkeman and Caitlin O'Shea led by stage managers Trevor Guyton and Connor

Performances are March 7 -11. All performances start at 7:00 pm and are held at Caldwell Theater located at the back of Tam's campus. The box office opens one hour before performances begin. "They pushed themselves to the sky. They were amazing in the face of an older, excellent Terra Linda team. They are so young, and so fearless. When they announced who won, I had to turn away so my kids would not see me crying. This is so special—they are all heroes. I hope they get the recognition that a feat like this deserves," said their long-time head coach, criminal defense attorney David Vogelstein.



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Sports Updates

BOYS' VARSITY BASKETBALL

The boys' varsity basketball team is a wellbalanced deep team, with contributions from a wide range of players in every game. In fact, eight different players have received "player of the game" honors in the 20 contests so far this

The boys got off to a strong start this season, winning nine of their first 12 games, including many on the road. They have played excellent basketball every game this season, even during more difficult stretches. Their brand of up-tempo and pressure basketball is exciting, and was exemplified by their double-overtime win at San Rafael. They have shown repeatedly that they are able to compete with all top-level teams. Their chief challenge is remaining consistent in their high level performance for 32 minutes every night, the hallmark of excellence.

Sophomore Amari Allison is currently leading the team in scoring and steals, while returning MCAL All-League forward Amanda Barriscale leads the team in rebounding and assists. The Lady Hawks biggest strength has been their

depth, which fuels their full court pressure defense and fast break offense.
