SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY

Midland Senior High School is accredited by the Texas Education Agency and the Southern Association of Secondary Schools. MHS was founded in 1926 and twenty-three years later was moved to where it currently sits today. The school is composed of grades 10-12 with an average enrollment of 2,519 students. Although most ninth-grade students attend a separate campus, there are approximately 171 reclassified ninth-graders at MHS.

The 2022-2023 school year is from August 8 to May 26 and consists of six reporting periods totaling 36 weeks of school. There will be two weeks of intersessional instruction. The regular school day consists of seven class periods.



GRADE POINT AVERAGES

Class ranks are based on semester grades in the first 4 years of the core subjects of English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and Foreign Language (1st two years only).

Cumulative class rank is computed for seniors at the end of the 5th six weeks of the school year. Grades point averages are derived by dividing the total number of grade points by the number of semester courses attempted. The highest grade point possible is 5.0. No Grade Points are awarded for classes in which the grade is below 70 or the students fails to gain credit due to excessive absences. Grade Point are awarded in decimals by increments as follows:
