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Executive Summary

This document is a comparison of Fargo Public Schools general fund to the finances of four North Dakota districts. Using data from the 2024 “School Finance Facts” and 2023 “Employee Compensation” reports published by the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction, peer district annual financial reports and information supplied by the districts, this report analyzes the characteristics of the most recent revenue and expenditure allocations. The following districts have been selected for comparison:

- Bismarck Public Schools
- Grand Forks Public Schools
- Minot Public Schools
- West Fargo Public Schools

The report is divided into three sections:

- Section I discusses revenue, fund balance and expenditure performance of Fargo Public Schools in relation to peer school districts in North Dakota. The general fund categories considered include overall revenue and expenditures, instructional and administrative expenditures, and support program expenditures.
- Section II highlights district spending on Special Education, including breakdowns of Special Education expenditures on a per-child count basis by program/service area.
- Section III provides a review of the English Learners program.

Section I: General Fund Revenues, Expenditures and Fund Balances

Revenues

Taxable Valuation and Levies

What is a Mill Levy?

The mill levy is determined each year by dividing the total amount of dollars needed by each political subdivision (city, county, schools, parks) from the property tax by the total taxable value of the city of Fargo. This, in effect, ends up being the percentage of taxable value that is levied or assessed in property tax annually. The mill levy is a composite of several entities' tax levying powers. In Fargo, since there are three school districts involved (Fargo, West Fargo & Kindred), there are three different mill levies.

What is Taxable Value?

Taxable value refers to a percentage of the city assessor's appraisal according to a state-prescribed formula, after exemptions are removed. To calculate annual taxes for a property, the taxable value is multiplied by the mill levy.


Fargo Public Schools general fund mills levied, and value of those mills for the previous five fiscal years has been:



Fargo Public Schools Mill Levy History

Since 2001, Fargo Public Schools has decreased the general fund mill levy a total of 170.82 mills. By honoring legislative intent, 125.0 mills were decreased (75 mills in fiscal year 2010 and 50 mills in fiscal year 2014). 33.82 mills were decreased through demonstrated fiscal responsibility to relieve tax burden on property owners. Most recently, 12.0 mills were decreased due to frozen property tax revenue in fiscal 2017, with a slight reduction in mills in 2018.

Local tax revenue includes property taxes, tuition and miscellaneous levies, and other taxes received such as electric, telecommunications, mobile home, and tax credits. It is important to note that while all districts levy property taxes, other tax revenue sources vary.



District Mill Value Comparison

The value of a mill is different for each taxing district. Bismarck has the highest per mill value and Fargo has the highest taxable value per student enrolled. The statewide average taxable valuation per enrolled student is \$46,692.

Average Daily Membership (ADM) is a count of the days students are enrolled in a district and is used for state foundation aid purposes.

Local and County Revenue

Local tax revenue includes property taxes, tuition and miscellaneous levies, and other taxes received such as electric, telecommunications, mobile home, and tax credits. While all districts levy property taxes, other tax revenue sources vary. Fargo Public Schools has the highest tax revenue percentage and tax revenue per pupil membership.

County revenue is comprised of funds received from mineral resources such as coal production and conversion revenue. Only Minot receives county revenue. Other local revenue includes tuition, transportation, interest, student and community service activities, and miscellaneous sources such as rental income. Minot has the highest county/local revenue of the districts compared, due to tuition received for educating Minot Air Force Base students.

State Revenue

State aid includes per pupil, transportation, state child placement, career and technical education, and handicapped program aid. All districts received more than 50% of their total revenue from state aid, with Fargo realizing the lowest percentage.

Federal Revenue


Most districts receive a small portion of total revenue from federal sources. The majority of this is pass-through funding from the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction (NDDPI) for programs such as Title I and IDEA-B. Grand Forks and Bismarck receive a significant portion of their federal funds through the Head Start program. Fiscal 2021 included the first round of federal funding related to the Coronavirus pandemic.



Total General Fund revenue is derived from property taxes, state funding, federal grant funding, tuition, and other local/county resources. Fargo has the highest total revenue per ADM.

Teaching Staff

Licensed staff employee compensation data are presented according to "Teacher " and "Administrator" categories defined in North Dakota Century Code (NDCC) 15.1-02-13.6.

"Teacher" positions include the following: Coordinator, Counselor, Instructional Programmer, Library Media Specialist, Special Education Consultant, Pupil Personnel, Psychologist, Speech/Language Pathologist, Supervisor, Teacher, and Tutor in Training.

"Administrator" positions include the following: Asst. Director, Asst. Superintendent, Asst. Principal, Director, Principal, and Superintendent.



Student-Teacher Ratios

The ratio of students to teachers is often used as an indicator of the resources devoted to education. The student-teacher ratio is obtained by dividing the number of full-time equivalent students (ADM) by the number of full-time equivalent teachers. The ratio, however, does not account for instruction time for students nor how much time teachers spend teaching.



Average Class Size

Average class size is calculated by dividing the number of students enrolled by the number of classes. The comparison districts report average class sizes for elementary students between 18 and 27 students. The national elementary and secondary average is 20.7 and 21.5, respectively. The North Dakota elementary and secondary average is 20.4 and 19.75, respectively.

Teacher Salary and Benefits

Teacher salary and benefits include instructional costs of regular, special and career and technical education, as well as federal programs, *including classroom instructional paraprofessionals*. All districts reported spending more than 50% of their total expenditures on teacher salaries and benefits. West Fargo reports the lowest spending while Fargo reports the highest spending.

The average days employed for teachers in North Dakota is 186 days. Fargo has the longest contract among the comparison districts at 190 days, which includes two additional holidays and a parent engagement day. Minot has the lowest with 186 days.




School Counselors

The national average student to counselor ratio is 385:1 while the North Dakota ratio is 298:1. The American School Counselor Association (ASCA) recommends that schools strive to maintain a 250:1 ratio.



School Psychologists

The National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) recommends a basic ratio of no more than 500 students per school. Most districts do not meet this standard. The national average ratio is estimated to be 1,119:1 with North Dakota averaging 1,614:1.



Licensed Support Staff Salary and Benefits Expenditures

Licensed support staff salary and benefits include instructional support costs of regular, special and career and technical education, as well as federal programs. West Fargo reports the highest percentage of support staff salary and benefits of the districts compared.

Paraprofessional salary expenditures have increased 18.0% over the past five years with an average increase of 5.8% per year.







Fargo Public Schools operates and maintains approximately 2.8 million square feet of building space in a district covering fifty-seven square miles.

In a continued effort to follow the district’s long-range facilities plan, Fargo continues to invest in neighborhood schools by ensuring the buildings are maintained to provide a quality school environment to all students.

Custodial Staff Analysis

The Association of Physical Plant Administrators (APPA) custodial staffing guidelines for Educational Facilities specifies five levels of cleanliness that many institutions use to manage cleaning efforts:

- Level 1: Orderly Spotlessness
- Level 2: Ordinary Tidiness
- Level 3: Casual Inattention
- Level 4: Moderate Dinginess
- Level 5: Unkempt Neglect

The accepted level of cleanliness for school buildings is Level 3 cleaning which assumes a custodian can clean 28,000 - 31,000 square feet in an 8-hour shift, with the mean being 29,500 sq. ft.

Level 3 cleaning indicates garbage is emptied daily, floors are swept or vacuumed daily, restrooms are cleaned, and disinfected daily, common areas are swept or vacuumed daily, and dusting, white board cleaning, and glass cleaning are done on a regular basis.

In Fargo Public Schools, staffing also accounts for the following factors:

- Secondary engineers do not have an area to clean daily as their job duties require tasks such as HVAC work, a larger share of grounds work, scheduling, repairs, preventive maintenance work orders, etc.
- Elementary engineers do have an area to clean daily, but it is not an 8-hour assignment.
- Not all areas within the building are cleaned daily. Mechanical rooms and storage spaces must be removed from the calculation to determine daily cleanable square footage.



Districts provide in city transportation based on walk-out distances. Minot provides transportation only for Minot Air Force Base students to high schools and rural elementary students in the BEL school attendance area, along with special education students. Grand Forks only transports special education students and students from the Grand Forks Air Force Base to Central High School.


Fargo Transportation Costs



While most states provide some funding to school districts for transportation, the amount varies widely. During the 2023 school year, the NDDPI provided the District transportation reimbursement in the amount of \$1,098,431, or about 16% of bussing costs, based on school year 2022 transportation information. The reimbursement formula is based on both miles and rides.





General Fund Balance

Historical Fund Balance Analysis

The chart below displays Fargo Public School’s general fund balance as a percentage of expenditures for the past ten years. Although expenditures have risen, the general fund balance has averaged 20.2%.



Ending Fund Balance

When comparing ending general fund balances, Fargo had the highest ending funding balance of the districts evaluated at \$41.1 million, representing approximately 2.5 months of operating expenditures. The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) recommends, at a minimum, that general-purpose governments, regardless of size, maintain unrestricted budgetary fund balance in their general fund of no less than two months of regular general fund operating revenues or regular general fund operating expenditures.

Adult Education


The North Dakota Department of Public Instruction receives federal funds under the Workforce Innovation & Opportunities Act (WIOA) and state funds to support the operations and free programs of the Adult Learning Centers who serve individuals who:

- are at least 16 years of age;
- are not enrolled in high school;
- do not have a high school diploma;
- are mandated by State Law;
- may lack sufficient mastery of basic educational skills; and/or
- cannot speak, read, or write the English language

There are eight regional adult learning centers and satellites in ND to serve the public. Programming offered through the Fargo Adult Learning Center includes:

- General Education Degree
- English Learners
- College and Career Readiness including Basic Job Skills, Computer Literacy and Driver's Literacy
- Citizenship
- Displaced Homemaker
- Certified Nursing Program
- Literacy
- Even Start Family Literacy

The Adult Learning Center employed twenty-one staff during the 2023 school year, serving on average 950 adult students. Most funding for the program is derived from state sources:



Trollwood Performing Arts School

Trollwood Performing Arts School, located at Bluestem Center for the Arts in Moorhead, MN, is a unique arts program of Fargo Public Schools committed to providing high quality arts education, exceptional community entertainment, and serves as a community events and exposition center.

Since 1978, thousands of young people have spent their summers learning, growing, and making friends at Trollwood. Trollwood offers nine annual arts education, youth leadership and performance programs.

Trollwood Performing Arts School's history of service to youth through arts education has been acknowledged with several prestigious awards:

Bluestem Center for the Arts


Fargo Public Schools, through Trollwood Performing Arts School, serves as the managing arm for Bluestem Center for the Arts, a world-class facility headquartered in Moorhead, MN. Nestled along the Red River of the North, Bluestem Amphitheater features an outdoor stage with seating for 2,500. The venue also offers a unique indoor educational center, which serves as a performance venue available for rent. The Center’s beautiful grounds are made up of picturesque river views, grassy meadows, woods, and wildlife.

The venue was constructed through a collaboration between Fargo Public Schools and the City of Moorhead. The District leases the facility from the City of Moorhead.

Bluestem Center for the Arts hosts programs that inspire a love for the arts in community members of all ages. The facility is used for school arts curriculum and activities, public performances, exhibitions, community festivals, corporate retreats, conferences, and other private rental opportunities. Since opening, thousands of patrons have enjoyed a broad range of programming including theatre, arts educational opportunities, concerts, dance, music, and special events.

With the onset of the pandemic in March of 2020, rental venues were closed or extremely limited to the public during the summer months, resulting in the facility realizing a significant loss in revenue.

District management of the facility began in 2012. The following information summarizes facility activity for the previous five years:

This section assesses district funding and spending on special education programs and services for the five largest districts in the state.


Special Education Child Count

School districts are required to submit to NDDPI their unduplicated count of children receiving special services each December. The table below displays the child count for the comparison districts and the percentage of special education students in each district.

Fargo Public Schools has historically realized an increase in students requiring special services at a higher rate than the growth in ADM. Currently, this trend is lessening as ADM is remaining consistent and the number of special education students in comparison is decreasing.

Special Education Revenues

Since its initial enactment, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) has included a commitment to pay 40% of the excess costs of educating students with disabilities. According to the National Education Association, the federal share is less than 14%. This lack of funding creates a shortfall that places a burden on state and local education agencies to fill in the remaining funding gap.


North Dakota school districts incur the full cost of educating students with disabilities based upon an approved contract and are subsequently reimbursed for amounts more than the cost cap, which is four times the state average cost for regular education. The fiscal 2023 cost caps were as follows based on a 175-day calendar year:

Section III: English Learners

Refugee Resettlement in North Dakota

Refugees are people who the government has determined have a well-founded fear of persecution, have gone through an extensive vetting process, and who have typically waited many years before arriving in the United States. Among the top countries of origin for refugees over the past decade are Myanmar (Burma), Iraq, Bhutan, Democratic Republic of Congo, Somalia, Iran, Syria, Cuba, and Ukraine. In the U.S., the refugee resettlement program is a public-private partnership of the Bureau of Population, Refugees and Migration, the Department of Health and Human Services, and nine national resettlement agencies.


Over the past years, most refugees in North Dakota were settled in Fargo. According to the Immigration Research Initiative, North Dakota is the second highest state for refugee arrivals per capita (Nebraska is first).

Program and Students

The purpose of the English Learner (EL) Program is to identify and provide specialized instruction, for students who qualify, through highly qualified teachers targeted to build students' English proficiency (Listening + Speaking + Reading + Writing), academic content knowledge, acculturation skills and choice (college-career-life) readiness.


Fargo Public Schools served 970 students during the 2023 school year, an increase of 6.2% over the previous year. Students are screened through the District's Home Language Survey and evaluated through a World-Class Instructional Design and Assessment (WIDA) consortium MODEL (Measure of Developing English Language) screener test to see if they meet the criterion to receive EL support services. Daily minutes of EL services vary depending upon student need.

Fargo Public School students receiving EL services have continued to increase with the forecasted trend showing additional progression.



Annually, all EL students take a standardized WIDA Assessing Comprehension and Communication in English State-to-State (ACCESS) test to determine their level English Language proficiency. There are five proficiency levels with the sixth reaching attainment of proficiency. Students are exited from the EL program when they score a 5.0 on the ACCESS test. Exited students continue to be progress monitored for two years to ensure they are being successful in the mainstream classes.

Revenues

EL programming is funded through a variety of grants with most support through general fund dollars (state and local).

Title III

Title III funding is to be utilized for school districts that have qualified Limited English Proficient (LEP) or EL students enrolled in local schools. Districts must have enough qualified students for a minimum grant award of \$10,000 to be eligible to receive any Title III funds.

STEEP


STEEP funds, also known as the “refugee school impact grant,” are used to better meet the needs of refugee children as they adjust to life in the U.S. STEEP funds support success in school by addressing the needs of newly arrived refugee children through entry-level programs and extracurricular services that increase the likelihood of: (1) high attendance and school engagement; (2) full classroom performance; (3) access to the core curriculum through increased English language proficiency; and ultimately, (4) academic success. Only refugee students who have arrived in the U.S. within the last 36 months, including any secondary migration, are eligible for STEEP programming.

State EL Weighting Factor

State aid contains additional ADM weighting factors for EL students in the following proficiency levels, providing approximately \$892K in EL specific funding to the District.

Expenditures

97% of Fargo Public Schools EL expenditures are spent on salary and benefits for highly qualified teaching staff. The remaining expenditures are related to purchased services (interpreters), student transportation and supplies.

Total EL expenditures have remained consistent. Due to the discontinuance of certain grant funds, increased local support may be required to provide the same level of support for students in future years.
