

Summary: Campus Performance Objectives

The Dallas Independent School District, in collaboration with the district administration, has adopted four Student Outcome Goals to be achieved by 2022. The focus is to increase student performance at all levels along with increasing student participation in extracurricular activities.

The Dallas ISD Board of Trustees established four goals during the 2015-16 school year as well as targets created within each goal to be reached by 2022. Additionally, the Dallas ISD Board of Trustees created academic indicators for each ensuing year. One can find the 2017-18 target for each goal in the four goals below along with the ensuing results:

Goal 1: Student achievement on state assessments in all subjects at the "approaches" level or above will increase from 66% to 75% by 2022 (68% by 2017-18).

Overall, 69% of all campuses (157 out of 229 campuses) were at or above the 2017-18 target while 47% exceeded (107 out of 229 campuses) the 2022 Goal.

Additionally, 76% (114 out of 150) elementary schools, 49% (20 out of 41) middle schools, and 63% (24 out of 38) high schools were at or above the 2017-18 target

Goal 2: Student achievement on the 3rd-grade state assessment in reading at the "approaches" level or above will increase from 63% to 75% by 2022 (65% by 2017-18).

78% of all elementary campuses (110 out of 141 schools) were at or above the 2017-18 target for reading at the "approaches" level or above.

Goal 3: Student achievement on state assessments in two or more subjects at Meets or above will increase from 34% to 40% by 2022. (39% by 2017-18)

57% (131 out of 229 campuses) of all campuses were at or above the 2017-18 target.

Goal 4: Student participation in extracurricular or co-curricular activities will increase from 59% to 65% by 2022. (53% for Elementary, 63% for Middle, and 69% for High Schools)

67% of all elementary campuses were at or above the 2017-18 target.

80% of all middle school campuses were at or above the 2017-18 target.

66% of all high school campuses were at or above the 2017-18 target.
