
Michael was an integral part of the athletic program during his tenure at Suffern High School. For the Mounties football program Michael contributed to the team beginning in his sophomore year where the team


had successful seasons.

In his junior year, he continued his dominance on the gridiron earning the honors of first team defensive back and second team PSAL Offensive QB. By his senior term, he served as team captain and was named second team All PSAL defense.

In addition to his prowess on the football field Michael thrived as a multi-sport athlete lettering in basketball and baseball. In his sophomore year, as a varsity baseball starter Michael garnered accolades as a New York News Rockland-Orange All Star.








Robert Buono: Class of 1974






When asked about coaching, legendary football coach Don Shula stated, "I think what coaching is all about, is taking players and analyzing their ability, then putting them in a position where they can excel within the framework of the team winning." This certainly came to fruition when talking about the illustrious career of Bob Buono. Bob was a Physical Education teacher and Athletic Director at Suffern High School for over 30 years until his retirement in 2011. During that time, Bob coached soccer, football, basketball and baseball. The list of awards, championships, and accolades accomplished by Coach Buono is prolific. In basketball, Bob coached the first two Suffern teams to get to the County Center for the section finals.

Suffern is truly indebted to Bob Buono during his time as Athletic Director. His goal was to create opportunities for all students to find their niche in sports. This included adding multiple new programs including Boys Volleyball, Girls Bowling, and Crew. In addition, under Bob's leadership Freshman and Modified programs flourished. With over 100 teams in the district Bob was the leader of a community group that was instrumental in getting the bond issue passed that resulted in the upgrade of EVERY athletic facility in the district, including the original turf field and lights at the Middle School.

Beyond the hallowed halls of Suffern High School, Bob has left an enduring legacy in Rockland County Athletics. Bob was President of both the Rockland County Athletic Directors and Section One Conference One. Bob also serves as a member of the Rockland County Athlete of the Season Committee and The Rockland County Basketball Officials Association. Last but not least, Bob is a founder of the Suffern Sports Hall of Fame, the reason we are all here tonight.


John A. Orlando II: Class of 1988

John Orlando certainly led the Suffern Hockey team to many great days. He was an essential part of the Suffern hockey program during his tenure as a Mountie. On the ice John served as Co-Captain of a team

that went 19-8. Under his leadership, the team was the Montclair Tournament Champions. They went on to dominate throughout the regular season and made a deep run in the playoffs becoming League, Section, and Regional Champions, culminating in a State Silver Medal. John's dominance as a shutdown defenseman was recognized with All-County and All-Section honors his junior and senior year.

In addition to his accolades as a hockey player, on the Lacrosse field John helped his senior year team to an impressive 10-5 record and an historic win over Yorktown. He led the team and Rockland County in goals scored on his way to earning All-League, All-County and All-Section honors. He was voted top defenseman in Section One, and he finished his career with 90 overall points.





He continued his hockey and lacrosse career at Berkshire Prep School, where he set the single season scoring record in lacrosse (a record that still stands) with 57 goals. He went on to attend

West Point Academy to play both sports, and finished his career there with 32 goals and 22 assists in his four year career on their lacrosse team.




Raymond Tyrrell





As a baseball player, Ray was part of a powerhouse program that were League Champs in both 1987 and 1988. That league was very competitive.

Playing upwards of 24 games per year plus Sectionals as a catcher, Ray played a significant amount, minimum of 50 games which was and remains noteworthy. In his senior year in 156 at bats, Ray had an impressive batting average of .353.

Lauren Eichenberger: Class of 2006

Jordan's profound words certainly ring true when talking about Lauren Eichenberger, she made it happen. During her time at Suffern, Lauren was a three sport athlete lettering in Field Hockey, Track, and Lacrosse for which she earned the Nick Mottola Award.



As a three year varsity field hockey star, Lauren was two time Rockland Journal News Player of the Year. She was All-League, All-County, and All-Elite in both her junior and senior years. In her senior year, while serving as co-captain, Lauren was the leading scorer in Rockland County. To exemplify her selflessness as a player Lauren was also a member of the Futures program which is a feeder program for the US Junior and Senior Olympic games.

Lauren was a First Team All-County and All-Section performer as a member of the Varsity indoor track team. She was a member of the 1600 meter relay team that qualified and placed 4th at the New York State meet.

In the spring, Lauren served as the captain of the lacrosse team. There, she helped lead the Mounties through her tenacious defense skills. Lauren was awarded Co-MVP honors in her senior year, as well as being named All Section First Team.











James Brennan: Class of 2009

Jimmy loved sports and his success was no accident. Jimmy was often the first one at practice and the last one to leave. He put in the work and it showed. As a four year varsity basketball player, Jimmy was a versatile player. He could handle the ball, take a key shot, and play strong defense.

In addition to his four year varsity run on the hardwood, Jimmy shone on the diamond as a varsity starter since his Freshman year. In his Senior year, Jimmy served as team captain. As a result of his efforts, he was named Rockland County Player of the Year in 2008 and 2009.

During his tenure with Suffern baseball, Jimmy was a 2 time team MVP, while also garnering All-League and All-Section honors. In addition, Jimmy was nominated to Collegiate Baseball newspaper's All American Team and the New York State High School All-District and All-American team.

Jimmy certainly made a mark in the annals of both Suffern baseball history and Rockland baseball history by setting the Suffern HS hits record with 119. In addition, he holds the Rockland County single game strikeout record with 17. He finished his career with a lifetime batting average of .381 and an ERA of 1.64.

In 2009, Jimmy was drafted by the Detroit Tigers in the 45th round. Jimmy played Collegiate baseball for Division 1 St. Johns and appeared in the College World Series.





Shelby Greany: Class of 2009

No doubt Bethany Hamilton was talking about Shelby Greany. From the moment Shelby started running, very few could catch her. She was a six year varsity Cross Country runner, who participated in six straight state championships. She was a five time county and section champion as well. Her accomplishments in Cross Country culminated in four trips to the Footlocker National Championship, finishing 7th her senior year. Shelby was perennially the top distance runner in the

county/section during her time at SHS.

In addition to the fall, Shelby dominated in winter and spring track. She won numerous titles, nine trips to the state meet, three

individual state titles (steeple, 3000m). She graduated as the national record holder in the steeplechase and 4x mile relay.

The accolades for Shelby include being a twelve time All-American, four National championships and five New York State championships. She is one of only two athletes in Suffern's history to be named NYS Gatorade Player of the

Year. While running at Providence College, Shelby was a 5x All-American, 2x Big East Champ, represented Team USA in the World Jr Championships, and competed at the 2020 Olympic trials.





1972-1973 Boys Lacrosse Teams

Pat Riley's words certainly describe the Suffern Lacrosse teams from 1971-1973. Under the tutelage of head coach John Orlando, the Mounties achieved unprecedented success amassing an impressive 23-5 record over those two seasons. The Mounties were certainly a dominant team for any opponent during the time of 1971-1973, as they were back to back Section champions. During this stretch, the team outscored opponents by an average of 7.2 goals per game.

This success was due in part to many outstanding individual performances. The Suffern lacrosse teams had multiple players garner All-League and All-County honors, and in 1973 Kris Snider was Rockland County Player of the Year.

Kudos to Eric Snider who became the first player selected to the High School All-American Team in 1972.

The tradition of Mountie Lacrosse is rich and storied. The teams of 1972-1973 began a tale that has continued to today. We honor all those who took the field then, and encourage those who follow in their footsteps.






