I would like to highlight the work on Strategic Planning our Board has conducted throughout the 2023-24 school year. This has included a community survey, a Special Board Meeting dedicated to interpreting the feedback and identifying district goals, and work from our Leadership Team to further refine the goals and action steps. I'll be presenting the goals to the Board in June. I am excited about our progress, and I believe the outcome of our Strategic Planning will give our district direction for years to come.

Another initiative worth mentioning is the development and multi-year implementation of our Learner-Centered Education model. This is a way for us to personalize learning for each of our students and is an outgrowth of trends in education that have extended beyond the traditional education model. For many years, education has been trending towards less "whole class" instruction and more active and student-centered learning and teaching. As a result, our teachers and staff have implemented many of those practices throughout our district already. The next phase of this initiative was the development of our Portrait of a Spartan. This is our vision of what we want our students to become. Our portrait is less about specific academic achievements and more about skills and characteristics. In this day and age, information is more readily available than ever. As a result, memorizing

information is less important than being able to appropriately and accurately find and use it. In addition, in order to "empower our students to succeed in their world," they have to become good citizens...good people. Our Portrait of a Spartan lays that out and will give us direction for many years to come to support our students.

Finally, some of you may have attended, or read about, the State of the Community event hosted by the Chamber of Commerce on May 1. At that event, I talked about our successes and areas of focus for the coming years. We've accomplished much in the last several years, and this year, we turned our attention to long-term planning to our High School and the Administration Building. These buildings have served our students and community for many years and developing a long-term plan for these buildings is a priority. We are exploring all options, as well as the financial impact of any decision.

COVER STORY: SYCAMORE COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICT 427 AWARDED PRESCHOOL FOR ALL GRANT

Sycamore Community School District 427 is pleased to announce that we have been awarded a Preschool for All (PFA) Grant from the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) to expand our Little Spartans Early Learning Program. This development is set to take effect at the start of the 2024-25 school year.

The State announced that our district was selected to receive funding from the competitive PFA program, which provides funding directly to public school districts to increase access to early childhood education and intervention services for children ages 3 to 5.

The grant represents a major milestone for our community, as it empowers the school district to offer preschool education at no cost to some families who qualify based on state criteria. This includes delays identified on screening instruments in intellectual processing, academics, speech/communication, social-emotional

development, and/or motor development. In addition, family environmental factors such as low income, homeless, parent/sibling with a disability, parent education level, family structure, non-English speaking household, and others are also considered when identifying eligibility.

This grant will also allow us to transition to a five-day-per-week schedule, providing a more comprehensive and consistent learning experience for our students and their families. This initiative is a testament to our commitment to providing highquality early learning opportunities for children in the Sycamore community. "Providing learning opportunities and support for our preschool students helps prepare them to become lifelong learners in our district and beyond," said Mr. Steve Wilder, Superintendent. "We are always looking for ways to expand our programs for our students, and through the financial support of this grant, we'll be able to expand our Little Spartans program."

EMPOWERING TOMORROW'S LEADERS: SYCAMORE HIGH SCHOOL SHINES AT ILLINOIS YMCA YOUTH & GOVERNMENT

The Sycamore-based Youth and Government Program has been fostering the next generation of leaders since its inception in 2016 based out of the Kishwaukee Family YMCA. Currently based out of Sycamore High School, it has seen remarkable growth and success over the years. Spearheaded by Kristin Miller and Sheri Wigant, in coordination with Jordan Wilkerson, this initiative has provided students with a unique opportunity to engage with the processes and procedures of state governance, while shaping them into informed and empowered citizens.

This year marked a significant milestone as Sycamore High School's delegation celebrated its eighth year of active participation in the Illinois YMCA Youth & Government program. With 44 students taking part, the delegation attended the 75th Annual Springfield Assembly, showcasing their dedication and passion for civic engagement.

One of the hallmarks of the program is its immersive approach to learning about government. Through assuming various roles such as legislators, attorneys, executive



officials, lobbyists, and press members, students delve deep into the workings of Illinois government. The three-day conference, held at the actual Illinois Capitol and Supreme Court facilities, offers students a firsthand experience of the legislative process, allowing them to witness how bills transform into laws.


