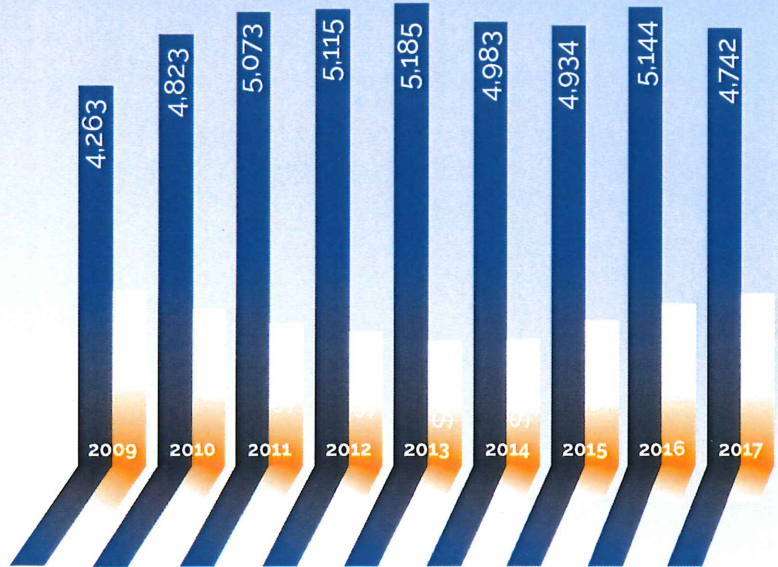

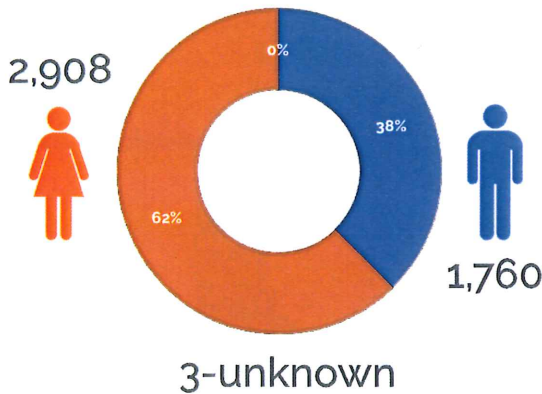

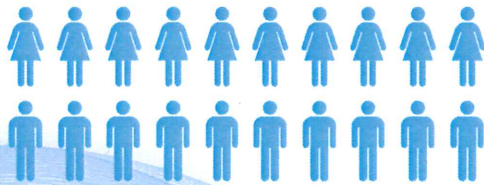

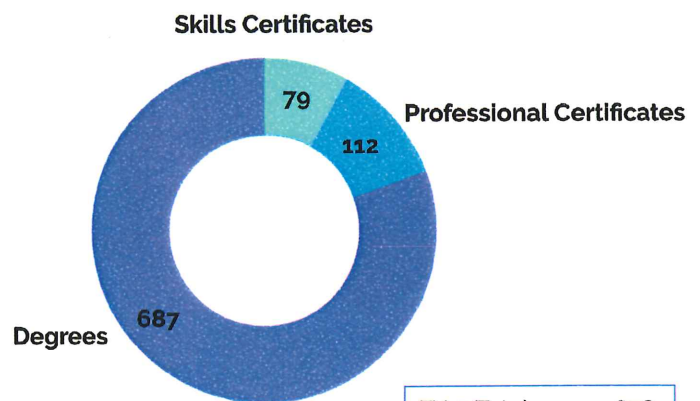

Daum Museum of Contemporary Art

The Daum Museum of Contemporary Art opened in 2002 on the Sedalia campus. Its heart is the permanent collection comprised of abstract paintings, drawings, prints, ceramics, and sculpture created since the mid-20th century that has grown to over 1,500 objects through gifts and selected purchases.

- › The museum's namesake, the late Dr. Harold F. Daum, was a retired radiologist and avid art collector. He gave life to the museum by donating his 300-piece art collection and funds toward its construction.
- › The Daum receives operational funding from SFCC; exhibitions and activities are also funded through various grants and generous donations of arts patrons and memberships.

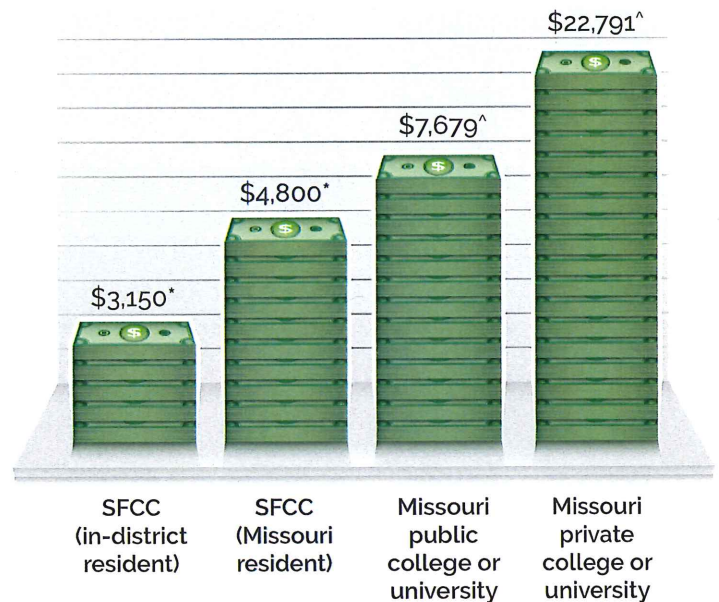

Meeting Workforce Needs

A study conducted for the Missouri Chamber of Commerce and industry found there is a "skills gap" between what business and industry need and the skills employees have. People who work with employers to select industry locations said, "It is increasingly difficult for manufacturers to find skilled and semi-skilled labor, such as machinists, welders and maintenance technicians. Demand for these positions is outstripping supply."

SFCC offers these programs and others, and they include short-term skills and professional certificates that lead to associate degrees. Many of our students leave SFCC with multiple job offers and salaries starting at more than \$50,000 a year. Simply put, these programs lead to good-paying jobs.

In 2015, the college developed a new campus master plan to chart the course for the next 15 years. With the help of faculty, staff, students, and the community, we created a vision to expand the Sedalia campus and upgrade technology and training facilities.

At the top of the list for facility improvements is a new **technical education facility**. Our technical programs are currently housed in two separate buildings that are both more than 40 years old with limited space for expansion.

The new building would be located in the southwest part of the Sedalia campus, just west of the Potter-Ewing Agriculture Building. It would be an innovative space for SFCC's technical programs such as Automotive Technology, Welding and Precision Machining, as well as new programs in Diesel Technology, Agriculture Mechanics and HVAC/Advanced Environmental Systems.
