#### **Superintendent's Message**

It is amazing that it is November already. As we get set for a different looking holiday season with family, we are also doing several alternative plans for school.

First off, if we need to close a building for any amount of time or the state closes us, we have been working with administrators and staff and using parent input to develop a full remote plan as needed. The six-day cycle that we use in North Tonawanda will be followed for special classes and daily instruction under this model.



Second, enhancements to the current remote plan will be implemented after Thanksgiving. K-6 will have daily live support in ELA and Math going forward. These will be at designated times by building and grade level and a full schedule will be published as we get closer to that time.

Third is the district's ability to get more students back in seats. New York State has not lifted any precautions such as mask wearing or social distancing, so we must work within those guidelines. We all agree that returning to normal can't happen soon enough, but until then we will work to get as many students as possible back two days a week. We have adequate seating with social distancing in place in most classes for this, however the problem is that buses are close to capacity so transportation may become a hurdle to get over.

As I write this, North Tonawanda CSD has had five confirmed cases of students or staff testing positive for the COVID-19 virus. While one case would be too many, we are pleasantly surprised that we made it through the first two months of school with a single-digit positive number. Much of that success goes to the staff and families of North Tonawanda for taking the proper precautions as directed by the CDC and Department of Health. Thank you all for doing your part in keeping schools safe.

I will continue the Wednesday Facebook live sessions and add a monthly evening Facebook live on the third Wednesday of every month for those that may wish to ask questions but work during the day. I appreciate everyone watching, asking questions, and sharing the videos so we can stay informed.

I wish you all a safe and happy holiday season with your family and friends. Let's hope that 2021 brings us a return to normal as we know it. Stay Lumberjack strong.


William attended Meadow and Ohio Elementary, NT Middle School and the High School. He will be attending school to become an Intelligence Analyst.

#### How NT School District Stayed Ahead of the Curve for PPE

In March when the first wave of the COVID-19 outbreak hit the US and schools shut down, Anthony Montoro III, Assistant Superintendent of Administrative Services, jumped into action. "We could see the writing on the wall and knew we better start getting bids on PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) and getting it in house while supplies were still available."

Along with the Director of Facilities, Jim Hart, "It became very important to us to acquire PPE and cleaning supplies, so I began in April reaching out to vendors so I could get a decent price and get the supplies in here before the school year started. Even once I had made deals with vendors, I made sure to have a list of backup vendors, a failsafe, in case we ran short on supplies."

The District brought in masks, gowns and N95 masks for the nursing staff at all their schools. "We also installed acrylic shields at our front desks at the offices where the public comes in," says Mr. Hart. "We are really focusing on disinfecting and safety



protocols. At each entrance there is a temperature screening kiosk with an iPad to fill out a health questionnaire to help the office assess who should be allowed into the building. We are using Hillyard QT-3, Diversey Triad III, Oxivir and we are trying to duplicate them in case of supply shortages. One of the biggest struggles are the product shortages and logistics. When you go to place an order now, it can take three to four months."



The District has also invested in having disinfection of high touch areas performed at the schools during the days that school is in session. Common spaces are a focus of deep cleaning along with thorough cleaning in the classrooms at night. The deep cleaning is not stopping in the schools. The District has outfitted the Transportation department with disinfecting wands that treat the interior of the buses. Ed Strasser, is the Transportation Supervisor at the District. "These disinfecting wands are great for our bus drivers because they can spray the buses several times a day and within three minutes it sanitizes the area and doesn't need to be wiped down. It saves a lot of time and makes sure the interior is safe for students and staff. As far as I know, we are the only district in the area that sprays seven times a day." Transportation Assistant Tammy Frye says the drivers are vigilant in making sure the buses are disinfected properly. "We spray the buses down after each run and from 10:00am to 1:30 pm we have a crew of two clean the buses again. It's a challenge now that kids are coming back to four days from two, but we want to ensure the safety of our kids and all the drivers feel safer as well." As far as people who are concerned about the bus runs, Ms. Frye just says, "Please be patient. It is our first pandemic too."

Mr. Montoro also points to the success of the COVID testing event they held at the district and how well the district has communicated to the community. "We want everyone to know how serious we are taking this. That is the main reason we have been so successful with our reopening. We are fortunate to have been on top of securing supplies when we did and we were much earlier in the process than a lot of school districts. We were able to get a lot of cutting edge technology not only at the school, but we put in over 200 hotspots so our students could stay home and continue their studies remotely." The district made sure that students had devices to work remotely, whether they were taking part in the hybrid model or staying home to learn. "It is another layer of protection for everyone too, if a student is not feeling well and needs to stay home."

According to the School Superintendent Association, school districts across the country could spend up to \$25 billion on PPE and related cleaning supplies to deal with COVID-19. "We are working on getting reimbursed from FEMA for what we have had to pay to keep everyone safe," says Mr. Montoro. He says he is proud of the way his staff and the administration have handled the protocols for the pandemic and how quickly they jumped into action. "We had very limited



information to go on when we first got shut down and we had a lot of restrictions and challenges with getting supplies and materials to prepare for school reopening. We were fortunate that we started so early getting in what we needed as far as disinfectants and PPE, which we were able to get from a bid at Orleans/Niagara BOCES. We had a good outcome because of the tremendous effort to make sure we got everything in early."

#### Five Students Selected for Music All State Ensembles

The North Tonawanda Fine Arts family is very proud to announce that five of our students were selected to participate in All State Music Ensembles. These students were selected through a solo audition process where thousands of auditions were held across the state. Although the New York State School Music Association will not be able to host these students for rehearsal and performance at Eastman Theatre in Rochester this December, students will participate in a virtual format still making incredible music. Director of Fine Arts, Dean Vallas, was elated with this year's participants. "All of these musicians are hardworking and motivated students. They are also wonderful humans who are caring and creative. I could not be more proud of them, their families, and all the teachers who helped them grow to be All State kids."

**Cassie Diliberto** has been selected as a soprano chorus alternate based on her performance of "Your Daddy's Son" from the musical Ragtime. She is the daughter of Beth Freedman and Chuck Diliberto and is a senior at NTHS. Cassie never thought she'd get to All State and is grateful to be considered. When thinking about her time in our Fine Arts Department she says "I've always loved music more than anything but so much of what I've learned now didn't



come easy or naturally. Challenging yourself and working through every sharp and flat and voice crack is where that growth happens even if you don't see it." She thanks Mr. Ferguson and Mr. Vallas for their encouragement.

As a second year All State Musician, **Joseph Kelly** feels validated to be chosen two years in a row. Joe is playing Oboe in the All State Symphonic Band and thanks his private instructor Anna Mattix. Without her I would have never been able to find my musicianship and really refine what I already knew about music along with new oboe techniques. Joe is the son of Julie Kelly and switched to oboe as a secondary instrument. "Ever since starting Tenor Sax in 8th grade I've always found my teachers encouraging me to do more with music, and they made me strive to want to be better. Without them I would have stuck with just playing Tenor Sax and I'd never grow the love for it like I do today."

**Megan Orrange** is singing soprano in the All State Mixed Chorus and earned her All State honor by singing "Sure On This Shining Night" by Samuel Barber. The daughter of Susan and Paul Orrange is incredibly honored to be selected for All State. "I have been dreaming about getting in since my freshman year, and now that I am accepted, it is truly an honor. Music has always been a big part of my life, and it is another step in my musical journey that I am proud to represent NTHS at All State this year." said Megan when asked about All State. Megan thanks her family for continuing to support her, especially her older brother Paul, because he motivated her to do more in music and was one of the reasons she was inspired to audition for All State. Megan also thanks her vocal teacher, Dr. Holly Bewlay, for training and helping her grow as a vocalist.

#### **Congratulations to Eagle Scout Harrison Roberts!**






#### Hybrid Students Show Off At Home Artwork

This is Officer Snopkowski's third year at the High School and he sees his role as a way to bridge the gap between the police department, the school and the community. He views the partnership as a way to build relationships with the students, help those who are at risk and educate about the role of the police in society. "Unfortunately with the negativity surrounding police throughout the country, I think it is more important now than ever to show them that we are human beings and we are here to help them. I want to have a positive impact on their lives and I really enjoy being a mentor and an informal counselor to many of the students here."

Students have gotten used to seeing Officer Snopkowski in the halls and enjoy interacting with him on a daily basis. He lets them know that he has an open door policy if they want to discuss anything with him. "I have talked to students about everything from careers in law enforcement, to bullying, to drug and alcohol use. I have had students come to me because they were worried about a friend or acquaintance harming themselves or to advise me of crimes that have been committed against them personally. Sometimes students come to me knowing that I am someone that they can confide in. Others are looking for information on what resources are available to them. I think in a lot of ways, I do more good here at the school than being on the road."

A Niagara Falls native and Air Force veteran who was stationed at the Niagara Falls Air Base, Officer Snopkowski is vested in the community and is proud of his connection to the North Tonawanda Police Department and the North Tonawanda City Schools. "I have really enjoyed being here at the high school and it is nice to be liked where you work. I feel like in my time here I have built many respectful relationships and been an active part in student successes while helping to maintain a safe learning environment. I really love what I do."






#### Walls of Fame Get Makeovers


# **Fine Arts Welcomes Two New Faculty Members**
