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Message from Superintendent

As we speed towards the 100th day of school and look forward to signs of spring the North Tonawanda City School district is getting ready for next school year. The board of education and administration is working on a budget for the 2017-18 school year that will provide new programs for students while keeping taxes in check. We are getting ready to break ground on the capital project that will transform Meadow elementary into the middle school. We are excited for these changes in the future and what is in store for the North Tonawanda community.



The board of education will be looking at redistricting the city into three K through 3 sections for our youngest students to attend either Drake, Ohio or Spruce Primary buildings in September of 2018. We hope to have that done before this school year is out to give parents time to plan for the changes that are coming. All of grades 4 through 6 will be housed in the intermediate building in September of 2018. This new intermediate building will be located where our current middle school is on Vanderbilt Street near Ruie and Nash Roads.

While these are some of the big physical changes that everyone will notice, there are many internal moves also happening. The staff has been organized into K-3 and 4-6 committees to discuss scheduling and academic programs for the new structure. The middle school and high school are looking to add a new Academy of Health Science and are considering future scheduling opportunities for our teenage students.

The community that currently uses a worn out cinder track behind the middle school will benefit from a meandering walking track that will go around new varsity and junior varsity baseball fields. While the Meadow complex will benefit from the construction of the latest in multi-purpose stadiums for a multitude of sports.

Therefore, you can see we are excited for the future as the incoming Kindergarten students of 2017 will be the graduating class of 2030! We are trying to imagine what skills and jobs the world will need in the year 2030 and beyond. We look forward to the challenge of educating for the future today here in North Tonawanda.

Pastor John Paul McLaughlin from the Lumber City Church said they were overwhelmed with the outpouring of generosity from the school district. "I am super excited. I actually just moved here four or five months ago to North Tonawanda and this is unbelievable. I have never seen people come together like this. It's very cool to be part of something like this."

Robot Takes Charge at Drake Morning Announcements

Students in Kristie Keidel's 6th grade class at Drake Elementary have been giving their robot Jack some new skills this year. In the computer programming unit students learn about problem solving skills and how

to think logically like mathematicians and engineers. By writing code for the robot, they are applying computer science and basic technology skills.

The students decided they wanted to program Jack to do the morning announcements. Mrs. Keidel says the students learned

about say boxes and how to input information into them. "So we decided to type in the whole entire Pledge of Allegiance and all the morning announcements. They also used the voice parameters to adjust his voice to make it slow enough so he didn't talk too fast for the students. It was the students' idea to have the robot interact with the school and show everyone what they had learned."

Principal Katie Smith says she was very impressed with what the students achieved. "The students were so excited to master programming the fluency of the robot's speech. It was very tricky to get anything coherent to come out of the robot. Our entire school loved it when the students programmed him to read "Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer" at the holiday sing along. Programming is not an easy task and requires the students to demonstrate persistence, problem-solving skills and teamwork."

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Robot Takes Charge

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Mrs. Keidel says the students also learned a lot of math through the robot. "They have learned X and Y coordinates and independent and dependent variables which is really helping them with their math in their equations unit. They are not just using the robot for science, but math and engineering which is really helping them in real world situations."

The students have certainly been challenging their teacher with wanting to push the boundaries of what Jack can do. "It's a very exciting unit. The kids love it! They love the cooperative learning and working with each other and trying to help each other make programs together. I think I am going to have to ask for further training just to keep up with them and their inquisitiveness. I would really like to help them push their learning further," says Mrs. Keidel. Student Jack Porter says the robotics unit is different from other school work. "It was all technology and we had so much access to learning." Classmate Aiden Maher had some words of wisdom for next year's class. "Stay on task because you learn a lot and its fun.'



Drake Embraces Season of Giving Back

The students and staff at Drake Elementary School were busy over the holiday season giving back to their community.

"It really put us all in a good mood," says
Principal Katie Smith. "Every day the students and
staff were doing something to help out someone

The St. Luke's Mission of Mercy is an independent Roman Catholic mission that serves the inner city of Buffalo. Boxes and bags are put together for the homeless that the mission serves. For 15 years the staff gathers and has a holiday luncheon while they wrap gifts. "This year we just asked faculty and staff to participate only in this because the children were actively involved with the Box of Hope," says Annette Beutel. "We were able to make 15 bags for homeless men, 15 bags for homeless women and 10 stockings for homeless children. In the adult bags were small toiletries, a warm blanket, snacks, water and things like



that were distributed. In the stockings were puzzles and coloring books, a stuffed animal, socks and other necessities for the children to receive. "

Ms. Beutel says that former teacher Debbie Lloyd comes and gets the bags and stockings for St. Luke's and it is a great thing to do together as staff. "We were all talking and we said especially now that we are getting older, it means so much more to give than to receive. It is just awesome experience for all of us."

Drake's Young Writers Gain Confidence in their Skills

Recently students in Miss Maureen Byrne's first grade at Drake Elementary held an audience, consisting of friends and family, rapt with attention as they showed off the stories they had written as part of their classroom assignment. It was all part of the Writer's Workshop initiative that the North Tonawanda City School District has implemented in grades K-6.

The Writer's Workshop is an interdisciplinary writing technique which builds students' fluency in writing through continuous, repeated exposure to the process of writing. The hope is that it will make writing a lifelong habit. "We want our students to view themselves as writers," says Principal Katie Smith. "They are authors of personal narratives, informational texts and opinion pieces. It has been very exciting here watching them grow in their confidence."

On the day of their performances, some of the first graders admitted they were nervous and got a little teary eyed. Their teacher Miss Maureen Byrne said her students have really grown. "In the beginning,

they did not love writing. Now they are much happier writing and are able to write for longer periods of time."

The students started writing what they call "small moments" narratives and have moved on to "how to" pieces. They are also showing off their artistic skills by illustrating their own texts. When Miss Byrne asks them how they know it time to start on their next assignment, they all said, "When you say, "Off you go! Happy writing!"

"What a great legacy for those students to leave behind."

At the tree lighting the community is invited in to listen to music performed by the district's Music Department, partake of some yummy offerings from food trucks and purchase ornaments and luminary bags that can be decorated with a message and placed on and around the tree. Santa and some of his friends come by on a float wishing everyone a happy holiday and giving out candy canes.

This year Ms. Lentsch added another component to the holiday celebration. "A friend told me how Niagara Wheatfield School District has students and staff adopt trees each year and decorate them in their high school hallway. They have a silent auction and the proceeds go to helping underprivileged families in the area. I thought that would be a great way to get the students involved with giving and helping out those less fortunate. Al Pogel at Niagara Wheatfield High School has generously given us his time and experience to help us with this project."

What she envisioned to be about ten to fifteen trees ended up being 45 trees. "I was overwhelmed with the amount of people here who wanted to participate. I had to turn some people down because I was sure how much would be involved in getting this done. It was very gratifying to see so many people want to take part. I am thrilled with the response we got and how much fun everyone had working together to create these beautiful trees."

The money raised, along with the 12 Day of Giving canned food drives held around the school, will go towards putting together Boxes of Hope that local North Tonawanda churches will distribute to families in need.
