If your child is presently enrolled in Head Start, you will need to complete a registration packet. If your child is presently attending the Carousel Academy prekindergarten program at Grant School, it is necessary to complete another packet. It is necessary, however, to update any address or phone number changes.

Age Requirements

- Kindergarten children must be <u>5 years</u> old on or before Dec. 1, 2013.
- Prekindergarten children must be <u>4 years</u> old on or before Dec. 1, 2013.

House visits all the eighth-grade classes each semester to explain the program firsthand. The representative shares stories about why the teens in the home are there, how Casey House can help, and how the current students' donations will be used. Last year 60 hats were donated in November and 60 drawstring bags in the spring.

Mitzi the Reading Dog



Ohio Elementary School is very lucky to have a new friend to read with! Reading Center and English as a Second Language (ESL) students are excited about reading with Mitzi, a licensed therapy dog. She helps make reading a warm and enriching experience for the children.

Ohio is the only elementary school in the district that has a reading dog program. Eliminating the anxiety over reading is key to why the program works. Reading to dogs is much less stressful for many students than reading to adults or other children. Mitzi never corrects, judges or makes fun of the reader. She is just a great listener! When students read with a therapy dog, reading skills improve. A study at UC Davis showed that children in reading dog programs increase their reading skills by 12 to 20 percent over children not in a reading dog program. Educators who have participated in reading dog programs note that students increased their reading skills, selfconfidence, and class participation.

Everyone at Ohio School is thrilled about Mitzi and she will make more visits to the school this year.

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Superintendent's Message: Factors Impacting the 2013-14 Budget

Each New Year brings with it a new budget. To start on a new budget for 2013-2014, we begin by looking at a "rollover budget" that will maintain all current programs, services and staffing. There are many pieces of the budget that have yet to fall into place but this much is already known: If all current programs, staffing and financial commitments were rolled forward to 2013 – 2014, adjusted for the cost of living, expenses would increase by nearly \$2.4 million. At the same time there is no expected increase in state foundation aid.



As the budget process progresses, we will be talking about the tax levy "cap" that was imposed by the state last year. This cap limits our primary source of revenue and has already impacted academic programs, services and staffing. While North Tonawanda stayed within the tax levy limit last year, an option is available to school districts to exceed their limit. In such a scenario, approval from a supermajority of voters (60%) is required for the budget to pass.

As we explore sources for additional revenue, we have been looking at how to use some of our assets. One avenue we have pursued is selling underdeveloped district-owned land and school buildings that are no longer needed to meet the long-term needs of the district. The buildings would include Gilmore Elementary School which closed due to decreasing enrollment last year, Grant Elementary School which closed over five years ago and the district's Administrative Building on Humphrey Street which would be relocated to unused space in another building owned by the district.

We are also looking for ways to share staff with nearby districts. We started this share two years ago and are currently looking to see if it would be possible to expand sharing personnel. The Board of Education is committed to leaving no stone unturned as we attempt to maintain a quality educational program and control spending. There is a budget containment suggestion box on our web page at **www.ntschools.org** where you can send in your suggestions. In addition the budget will be discussed at our regular Board of Education meetings the second Thursday of each month. The budget vote will be on May 21.
