Welcome back to the 2012-2013 school year. It is hard to believe the new school year is already here. It is even harder for me to believe that this will be my twentieth year as a North Tonawanda City School District employee. Over

at grades 3-8 that is meant to align testing with the Common Core Curriculum.

Introducing the NTHS Academy of Information Technology and This Year's Inductees

The Academy of Information Technology (AOIT) is the fourth and newest academy at the high school. The AOIT is a four-year program that gives students the opportunity to pursue a focused area of exploration; that being a computer science or digital media and communications path. The AOIT will introduce students to career opportunities in today's digital workforce including:

- * Publishing industries (software, internet, and traditional)
- * Graphic design, marketing, advertising, print media
- * Animation and game design
- * Motion picture, sound recording, broadcast industries
- * Data processing and information services
- * Network administration
- * Computer systems design, service and maintenance
- * Cyber security and information management

Project-based classes enable students to have exposure to a variety of current software applications including Adobe Web Premium CS5, and equip students with personal, analytical, technical and communication skills necessary in any career pursuit. The AOIT offers a flexible program of study that is an asset for any future career/job path. This year's academy events will include the induction ceremony, field trips, tours and guest speakers.

District Awarded \$1.5M Physical Ed Grant

The District has been awarded a \$1.5 million grant to implement comprehensive physical fitness and nutrition programs for the district's 4,000 students through the Carol M. White Physical Education Program (PEP). The funds will be used over three years to enhance the physical education program, and to develop programs that encourage physical activity and healthy eating through professional development of physical education staff members and the purchase of new equipment.

The Carol M. White Physical Education grant is through the federal Office of Safe and Drug Free Schools. NTCSD is one of 56 districts nationally to receive the grant this year.





Breakdown From Superintendent's Message

Common Core Standards

The Common Core State Standards Initiative is a state-led effort coordinated by the National Governors Association Center for Best Practices (NGA Center) and the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO), according to the website EngageNY.org.

The intent of the standards is to define the knowledge and skills students should have within their K-12 education careers so that they will graduate high school able to succeed in entry-level, credit-bearing academic college courses and in workforce training programs.

The standards:

• Are aligned with college and work expectations;

• Are clear, understandable and consistent;

• Include rigorous content and application of knowledge through high-order skills;

• Build upon strengths and lessons of current state standards;

• Are informed by other top performing countries, so that all students are prepared to succeed in our global economy and society; and are evidence-based.

There are 12 shifts of common core, six in mathematics and six in English language arts. These shifts help districts align with Common Core's expectations and goals.

Under the 6 Shifts in ELA/literacy, students will:

• Be encouraged to read more nonfiction

• Learn about the world by reading

• Read more challenging material thoroughly

• Discuss reading using evidence

Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR)

The purpose of the evaluation system is to ensure that there is an effective teacher in every classroom and an effective leader in every school, according to the NY State Education Department. The evaluation system will also foster a culture of continuous professional growth for educators to grow and improve their instructional practices.

Beginning in the 2012-2013 school year, the evaluation system includes all classroom teachers and building principals.

The APPR evaluations are broken into **three** areas: growth on state measures, locally-selected measures and other measures.

1. Growth in state provided numbers and student learning objectives (SLO) will comprise 20 percent of review. Student growth percentile showcases the change in performance compared to students with similar starting points. The definition of "similar" students is not just based on tests, student characteristics such as poverty, disability indicators, gender, student age will be considered.

2. Locally selected measures will comprise 20 percent of review.

3. Other measures comprise 60 percent of review and include rubrics, observations, visits and surveys. Teachers will have at least 2 classroom observations by the principal or another trained administrator.

Dignity for All Students (DASA)

The Dignity Act became effective on July 1, 2012.

• The goal of the Dignity Act is to create a safe and supportive school climate where students can learn and focus, rather than fear being discriminated against and/or verbally and/or physically harassed.

• The law prohibits discrimination and harassment against any student by employees or students on school property or at a school function, that creates a hostile environment by conduct, with or without physical contact and/or by verbal threats, intimidation or abuse based on a person's actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practices, disability, sexual orientation, gender, or sex.

• The Dignity Act applies to behavior on school property (including athletic fields, playgrounds and parking lots), in school buildings, on a school bus/vehicle, as well as at schoolsponsored events or activities.

• The NT Schools' Code of Conduct has been amended to reflect the prohibition of discrimination and harassment of students by students or staff — in age appropriate plain language.

• The law also includes protection of people who report discrimination or harassment.

At least one employee in every school shall be designated as a Dignity Act Coordinator. Ronald Barstys, Director of Student Services, is the DAC for NT Schools. Please visit ntschools.org for a list of Dignity Act Coordinators in each building.

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Last June the Academy of Engineering and Architecture students embarked on an overnight fieldtrip to the most famous house in the world; Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater. The Modernist house was built in 1937 as a summer retreat. It is anchored into a hill and its many reinforced concrete cantilevered overhangs jut out from the main structure right over a 20 foot high waterfall. This structure is considered by many architectural historians to be architect, Frank Lloyd Wright's greatest achievement.

These students were amazed by the beauty of the home as well as how the house was engineered to be able to carry all the weight of the overhanging patios. Many of the students were also surprised to find many famous artists' works hanging on the stucco walls inside the house; such as two Picasso paintings and Mexican artist, Diego Rivera, painting. From Fallingwater to the great city of Pittsburgh the students loaded the bus and made the one hour ride to the

The 800 foot long cable driven cable car was built in 1877 and rises at a 30 degree angle to an observation deck. Because the Academy students were on the deck at night they were able to get the best view of the city which made for some great pictures. The following day the 40 students embarked on a trip to the Science Center on the cities great waterfront, learning about and exploring robotics, hydraulics and energy displacement exhibits. They were also able to test their endurance, athletic skills and knowledge of how the body functions at the Science Centers Sports Works.

Before making the trek back home, the NT students climbed aboard converted WWII military vehicles that serve as a tour bus. The DUKW was used in amphibious operations throughout the Mediterranean and Pacific, including Operation D-Day in 1944. The duck boat first traveled through the city's business district past

local government buildings and the headquarters of the area's Fortune 500 companies. The boat then made its way into the river for a spectacular view of Pittsburgh's waterfront.

The students were awed by the amazing architecture Pittsburgh has to offer and learned some fun facts about the modern skyscrapers that soar to dizzying heights, including the U.S. Steel Tower. Senior Maya Welch said, "It was a great trip filled with impressive architecture and I had lots of fun with my friends exploring the city."

Ohio School Welcomes Multi-Cultural Community

The closing of Gilmore Elementary School has brought a positive addition to the Ohio School Community. Students who speak languages as diverse as Turkish, Chinese, and Farsi at home receive extra English language instruction to improve their listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills. This is done through the English as a second language (ESL) program which is now facilitated at Ohio Elementary.

The ESL program is designed to supplement and support a student's classroom curriculum and instruction. All instruction in the ESL program is provided in English, not in a student's native language as is the case in a bilingual education program. The aim of the program is to help ESL students perform as well as their English only speaking classmates.

"Thanks to ESL, I learned a lot, how to read and how to write. I didn't know any English when I got here" said Darina Shishkina, a fifth grader who moved to the United States from Kazakhstan three years ago. "One day I want to be a teacher."
