2012— 2013 School Year Kindergarten and Prekindergarten Registration Dates Announced

Registration packets are **NOW** available in the lobby of the NT School District's Administration Building located at 175 Humphrey Street. They are also available on-line at www.ntschools.org under "Shortcuts".

Dates and times to return **in person** to the Administration Building to have the application packet reviewed and processed are:

Monday, Feb. 13 from 1-7 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 15 from 1-7 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 28 from 1-7 p.m. Thursday, March 1 from 1-7 p.m.

If schools are closed for any reason, registration will be cancelled

Kindergarten children must be 5 years old on or before Dec. 1, 2012 Prekindergarten children must be 4 years old on or before Dec. 1, 2012

If your child is enrolled in Head Start, you will need to complete a registration packet. If your child is attending the prekindergarten program at Grant School, it is <u>not</u> necessary to complete another packet. It is necessary, however, to update any address or phone number changes.

COMPLETED REGISTRATIONS are accepted at the Administration Building ONLY

NO registrations will be processed without all of the required documents.

Mid-Winter Break begins on Feb. 20. School will resume on Feb. 27.

Superintendent's Message

It seems like the New Year just started but we have been working on the 2012-2013 school year budget since November.

We know that this budget will be one of the most difficult to develop as school districts move to a revenue driven process forced by the loss of federal and state aid, as well as the imposition of the new tax levy limit (tax cap). While these limits will force us to make decisions on how services, programs, and courses are offered, we will still do our best to meet the needs of the students we serve. State and local taxes will only provide so much so we must work to develop a budget that upholds student learning, reflects district priorities, and is financially responsible and supported by the community.

While we don't have exact funding numbers from the State yet, we know we are looking at a \$5 million budget gap for the 2012-2013 school year. Part of this is the loss of Federal Education Jobs Fund money that will end after this year, resulting in a loss of \$1.5 million for North Tonawanda. We are like a number of school districts that are facing the reality that costs are outpacing income.

While the School Board has already studied plans to close an elementary building and cut other costs, the District finds itself still in the hole as personnel costs account for about 75% of the budget. While the number of staff has decreased over the past few years, the cost of those who remain has increased with mandatory salary increases, health insurance and mandatory retirement system contributions.

While less staff helps with budget costs it also has ramifications that result in increased class sizes/class loads, and loss of electives. We are, however, looking at this in addition to the redistricting and building closure that is possible this year.

On the revenue side, the District will be limited by the new tax levy limit imposed by the State. Property tax is a primary revenue source. Here in North Tonawanda the tax increases have been minimal. The property tax revenue increase over the past 5 years averages 1.2%.

Good Management is a year round process and we have enacted a budget freeze in November to help carry over some funds to offset next year's deficit. We are looking outside the box to find new ways to earn revenue as well as continuing negotiations with all un-

ions to try and work on concessions and new contracts to help the district with long range planning.
