#### Superintendent's Message

It is hard to believe we are almost over with the first two months of school. This past summer and fall marks the end of our major construction projects. Each building has seen classroom and technology upgrades that will help keep the buildings in good shape for years to come. There is still much work that can be done. Every five years school districts across New York State are required to do a building condition survey. This report outlines areas that must be fixed, should be fixed, and could be fixed. We know we have more to do but before that can be accomplished we are completing a detailed enrollment and building use study. This report will be presented to the public and the Board of Education in November. How we use current space and how we might redistrict students will all be part of the report. We will also be looking at how grade levels are configured in the buildings and what that means for the delivery of curriculum to the students. As we try to navigate through hard financial times it will be important to use the current resources we have to the best of our ability.

While our enrollment suffered a decline in the late 90's when we were able to close an elementary and middle school, our enrollment has now leveled off over the past decade to be just fewer than 4,000 students. This summer we experienced a number of late registrations that resulted in increased numbers at kindergarten and 9<sup>th</sup> grade. This tells us that our enrollment will most likely stay where it is at for a number of years to come. We continually monitor enrollment and will be posting this information online in November as well.

In the meantime our athletic department and athletes are having a great fall season. I encourage you to visit our newly designed web site at <a href="https://www.ntschools.org">www.ntschools.org</a> to see it and the fall athletic sports schedule. I hope you and your family can come to a game and see how great the children and Western New York School Sports are.

Also new this month is a FACEBOOK page where the district can post important information as an-

We are always looking for new ways to get the good news out about the North Tonawanda students and schools. Enjoy this fall and the beautiful colors that this time of year brings. Before we know it, we will be covered in a blanket of clean white snow.

### GILMORE ELEMENTARY

Fifth grade students at Gilmore Elementary School learned about pulley systems by building them with K'nex kits. Katherine Sieracki, Destiny Harris, and Isabelle Thompson built a block and tackle system, and tested the amount of work being done by adding pulleys and measuring the amount of work being done with spring scales. Other pulley systems that were built and tested included a flagpole and a sailboat. Students also learned about wheels and axles and various levers with similar kits. The students are also learning about kinetic and potential energy by building a large roller coaster with a loop. The students have had to problem solve to overcome friction and construct the coaster in a way that allows the car to gain enough energy to make it around the coaster successfully.

PBIS was introduced to help add cohesiveness to our school-wide behavior program. It concentrates on the non-classroom areas of the building, such as the hallway, cafeteria and playground. It helps to provide every teacher, faculty and staff member with the same language and expectations for how students should behave at school.

On September 9<sup>th</sup>, Meadow kicked off our 2011-2012 PBIS program. This year the kick-off included being reacquainted with our three main cool tools: Give Me 5, Rules of the Road, and Voice Levels. These tools were reviewed in the cafeteria, bathroom, bus, playground, assembly area, and field-trip locations! The children prac-

ticed these expectations in fun ways, including getting on a bus, playing games on the playground and in the gym, getting their faces painted, and practicing the "right of way" in the hallway.
