District Happenings:

Major Capital Improvement Progress:

- At the new Sussex Central High School, roofing on the classroom wing is 85-percent complete, while work is continuing on courtyard and classroom wing brickwork, main entrance exterior structural work, mechanical rough-in, electrical and ductwork, and painting and ceramic tilework in various areas.
- The greenhouse at the new Howard T. Ennis School is complete. This is the final item for the construction project.

Carver Consent Order Update:

 The Community Advisory Board meeting was held on June 20. Special Master Matt Denn shared his latest interim report and reviewed his recommendations with the district team. District officials also shared information about the new Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) curriculum and the upcoming IRSD community festival on October 5.
