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





Executive Summary

Mount Diablo Unified School District's (MDUSD) Career Pathways program includes pathways from all five of the comprehensive high schools, representing eight different industry sectors. These include Design, Visual, & Media Arts, Health Care, Hospitality & Tourism, Engineering Technology, Building Trades, Education, Automotive Technology, and Information Communication Technology. Within the different career pathways, students receive rigorous and relevant curricula aligned to current industry standards as well as the California State Career Technical Education (CTE) Model Standards. Students also participate in experiences designed to bridge academic and career skills, including effective communication, community collaboration, complex thinking, and self-directed learning.

In developing meaningful work based learning experiences for MDUSD students, the Career Pathways department strives to connect students to hands-on learning experiences that bring real-world connections to support the CTE classroom curriculum. Through these experiences, MDUSD also works to build a strong support network of business partnerships. These opportunities not only help prepare students for a career, but it also provides our industry partners the opportunity to guide, mold and mentor the workforce of the future.

2023- 2024 was a busy year for our Career Pathways programs in terms of work based learning. With the implementation of new events such as an 8th grade CTE & Pathway Fair, a Book Drive for an Elementary School and an Elementary School Career Fair, the team was able to expand the reach to a much larger audience. All of these experiences depend on the strong and collaborative relationships with various industry partners. We cannot do the work we do without the support of industry.

We are proud to share that, in 2023-2024, MDUSD's Career Pathways supported 8,348 students in 207 different Work Based Learning experiences. The following pages provide an overview of the Work Based Learning experiences and opportunities MDUSD pathway students participated in over the 2023-2024 academic school year.



Message from our Administrator







Industry Wide Work Based Learning Experiences



An MDUSD industry wide work based learning experience is one that involves collaboration between pathways across the district, typically within the same industry sector. Through these industry wide projects, students from different schools participate in events such as the annual Career Technical Career Fair and the Allied Health Fair where students are exposed to different opportunities and career options. Sometimes the projects allow for industry partners, pathway teacher and students to plan and implement the project together, such as the Digital Media Showcase. Through industry wide work based learning experiences, MDUSD and its industry partners are able to provide meaningful work based learning on a wider and more in-depth scale across the district.

CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION FAIR

The Annual Career Technical Education Fair, in partnership with Concord High School and its College & Career Advisor, Sheila Bergum, was held in October 2023. Concord High School hosted 1100 students from all of the comprehensive high schools, three alternative education sites and youth in MDUSD's Youth Empowerment Services Workforce and Opportunity program! There were 53 different post secondary programs participating, including: Diablo Valley College, Los Medanos College, Contra Costa Community College District, Trades Unions, and many more. Each program provided opportunities for MDUSD students to learn about different post-secondary options following high school. Students also had the opportunity to participate in hands on activities designed to provide them with some insight into the career options in the different trades and certificate programs.



DRONE PROGRAM

With a K12 SWP Grant, MDUSD Career Pathways developed its Drone Program. This program was piloted in 2023-2024 but will officially roll out in 2024-2025. During the pilot, several teachers and one student earned their certification. Additionally, several students interested in earning their certificate participated in a summer internship, taking aerial photos of MDUSD campuses. Through the Drone Program, MDUSD provided equipment, materials and test vouchers for Career Pathway students interested in earning their Drone Flight Certification through the FAA. This program will serve students in multiple pathways, including arts, media & entertainment, construction, engineering technology, & patient care. These certifications will add to a student's employability across the different industry sectors.



Industry Wide WBL Experiences



ALLIED HEALTH FAIR

In partnership with Mt. Diablo Adult Education (MDAE), the Career Pathways Department hosted its annual Allied Health Fair, for patient care pathway students at Mt. Diablo High School, Ygnacio Valley High School, and College Park High School. Participating students rotate through the different patient care certificate programs offered at MDAE including Dental Assisting, Surgical Technical, Medical Assistant, EMT. Students were exposed to the different types of equipment and skills they would learn in the different programs, as well as the different careers. Students also learned about DVC's and Contra Costa County Health's Community Health Worker Program. Finally, students had an opportunity to talk to local health care providers in the Allied Health Expo.

Organizing the event required students to use some of the work readiness skills they were learning, such as professionalism and time management. Students advertised on social media, by email, hanging posters and word of mouth to gather as many book donations as they could. The books were then donated to Cambridge Elementary School. While delivering the books to the classrooms, the Academy students talked to the younger students about the opportunities available to them in high school and the importance of exploring those options. It turned out to be a great mentorship opportunity for all. The Education Academy students received so many book donations that they were able to give each class a stack of books. 

MDUSD Career Pathways, in partnership with Riverview Middle School, bussed 8th graders from every middle school in the district to the fair hosted by Riverview. Eleven different industry partners participated as well as, three post-secondary partners and six of our high school pathways. The goal of the fair was to get students to start thinking about possible career interests and connect to the career pathway opportunities at their high schools. The 8th graders had an opportunity to talk to students and teachers in the pathways as well as industry professionals and post-secondary options for training in those industries. Students had a great time! We thank our partners for participating and providing this opportunity to our students! We are looking forward to making this an annual event!



CCAP Stem Academy Cohort 1

In the early Spring of 2020, no one knew what the next few months, to a few years were going to look like. While this was true for everyone, a group of 8th graders decided to take a chance on a program they would start in their first year of high school at Ygnacio Valley High. Knowing only that they are interested in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) and learning new things, a few short months later, these students started high school AND college during the shutdown; never setting foot on the high school campus. They did not know what a cohort was, much less what it was like to be in high school. But they all took a chance. They joined a program that promised early college credit, a chance to work with industry support and an opportunity to explore their interests of STEM. Starting in 9th grade, while on a computer, these students took all of their high school classes and, two days a week after school, they took a college course. When they returned to in person instruction, they continued with the college coursework. They did this for 4 years—8 semesters. Some even taking college classes during the summer to fine tune those engineering technician or drone flying skills. With an average of 20.76 college credits, this first cohort just walked across the graduation stage and set their goals on another step—a college degree. More than half of these students will continue taking classes at DVC, and some were accepted into four year institutions including San Diego State, Manhattan School for Engineers and Michigan Technology University. We are so very proud of this first cohort and look forward to all their successes!
