


A Good Father

Hello to all you members of the Aggie family!

As the school year ends, we must say goodbye to our senior class of 2024—our 83rd graduating class! We will say goodbye to Sister Simeon Marie (returning to Ann Arbor, MI) and Dr. Tom Stierman (retiring) from our Upper School faculty. We will say thank you to Dr. Michael Adkins as he returns to lead our academic program as Director of Academics for the PreK-12 curriculum and turns over the reins of the Lower School to Mrs. Miriam Naughton (who becomes our new Lower School Director). Finally, we will try to say goodbye to a man who has been instrumental in all the success of Saint Agnes School for the past 12 years—Fr. Mark Moriarty.

When Fr. Moriarty called me in December of 2014 and asked me to consider whether God might be calling me to Saint Agnes as the next leader of the school, I had just finished building my family a house in Greenfield—38 miles away from St. Paul! He asked me to pray about it. Within a couple months, it became perfectly clear that God wanted me here. Two years later, Fr. Moriarty and a donor made it possible for me to bring my kids to the school by offering a home for us to rent during the school year located directly across the parking lot from the front doors of the church. I cannot express sufficient gratitude to God and Fr. Moriarty for calling me here almost a decade ago. My family, and especially my children, cannot thank him enough, either!

Under Fr. Moriarty's pastoral leadership at Saint Agnes Church and School, students have been able to go to Confession every month and grow spiritually because of it. We have a faculty culture that is supportive, committed, and mission focused. We have an extraordinarily well-written Philosophy of Education, a new Activity Center, healthy buildings, a preschool program, Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, a renovated convent, a newly roofed and air-conditioned church building...the list goes on and on. When he announced to the students that he was being reassigned, the last thing he said to the students was: "I will miss you terribly!" That is the heart of a pastor—he has loved our students so well, the future of the Catholic Church.

During Fr. Moriarty's tenure as pastor, we started and completed two separate capital campaigns—the first to put a new roof on the church building and reconstruct the front steps as well as to get the school's building into better shape (among other things), and the second to renovate the convent, upgrade lighting and electrical, and establish a preschool (among other things). When I arrived, Fr. Moriarty had just said goodbye to the Sisters of Charity from Connecticut, and he told me that we had to get sisters back into the school as soon as possible. We were able to do just that—welcoming the wonderful Dominican Sisters of Mary, Mother of the Eucharist! Last month, when we asked what he would like as a parting gift, his only request was a 12-year Saint Agnes pin—so justifiably proud he is of having served this extraordinary faith community for his two 6-year terms!

Thank you, Fr. Moriarty, for trusting so many of us to run with ideas you were not so sure of. Thank you for caring so well for the physical plant, for managing two capital campaigns, for getting Dominican sisters here serving the school, for instructing our students, for administering the Sacraments, for loving us even when it was difficult. Thank you for leaving Saint Agnes School in extraordinarily healthy condition—structurally, financially, culturally, academically, and spiritually. Thank you for giving so many of your best years to us here! May God reward you with a special place in heaven. We will miss YOU terribly!

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
In the end, though, the teachers prevailed once again, holding off the valiant effort of the Aggie students by a final score of 38-34 and retaining their bragging rights for another year.

and Activities Director, Mr. Mike Streitz. "When I first got here we had just rebranded our school crest with our signature "A" and I thought it would really be neat to have a bull too. This was decades in the making."

The History

Over the 40 years that the Aggie Bull has been around, there hasn't been much consistency in its design or use. Sometimes it resembled a Texas longhorn. Other times, the Chicago Bull. More recently, just a silhouette behind our "A." While our Saint Agnes "A" has been the primary mark for Saint Agnes athletics and activities since the mid-2000s, the first depiction of the bull can be found on a 1984 homecoming button, and the bull-in various iterations—has continued to be used ever since. Making his way through the yearbooks and archives a year-and-a-half ago, our Marketing and Communications Coordinator, Mr. Neal Abbott, identified the need to formalize our athletics and activities branding. "I started digging and doing a lot of history research on the Aggies and the bull," said Abbott, "It was really important for us that after all this time—we get it right." Streitz echoed Abbott's sentiment. "We both felt there was a need for some consistency," said Streitz. "I wanted us to have an identifying mark for Saint Agnes.

In the spring of 2023, Abbott approached Mr. Streitz and school administration with the desire to spearhead this project, and the two spent the next year working together to bring this new Aggie brand to life.

The Process

"We had no idea where to start, or what it would cost," said Mr. Abbott. "But while doing some profile searching on Instagram one day, I happened upon a designer that seemed too good to be true: Mike Irwin. Mike currently works at ESPN as one of their senior graphic designers and takes on freelance projects on the side through his own design studio: Michael Irwin Design Co." Prior to joining ESPN, Irwin worked for the NFL and was on the design teams that worked on the recent rebrands of the Indianapolis Colts, Detroit Lions, Cleveland Browns, and Los Angeles Chargers. Oh, and Mike designed each of the logos for Super Bowls 51-54. "We didn't think there was any chance Mike would be up for working with a little old Catholic school in Minnesota," said Abbott, "but I noticed he had a couple of Scripture verses in his Instagram bio—and that gave me hope!"

Mr. Abbott reached out, and a few days later we had our designer. Mike was incredible to work with, and over the course of several months he helped us to put all of our new branding together. "There's so much that goes into it," said Streitz. "You email back and forth with the designer, we have conversations, he has to get to know our school. It's never an easy project, but for us it was a lot of fun. This process has been incredible." Abbott agreed, emphasizing his desire to continue to expand Saint Agnes' reach and recognizability, particularly as it pertains to extracurriculars. "As people keep hearing about the great things that are happening at Saint Agnes, this is another way for people to recognize us," he said. "Having a brand that is defined and consistent enables us to promote ourselves in ways that we couldn't before. I'm grateful to have played a part in contributing to the continued growth and advancement of our Saint Agnes School student, faculty, alumni, and community culture."

The New Look

After being unveiled to our students, families, alumni, and greater Saint Agnes community this spring, the new marks and branding are already beginning to be incorporated into all of our athletic uniforms, merchandise, media, and more. Over the next several months new Aggie swag will be available for you to purchase both online and at our pop-up spirit wear sales to come. Reflecting on the project, Mr. Streitz summarized that, "It's a total collaboration between the school and the athletics side. It's going to bring us together, and hopefully what will happen—it will take a little time—but people will recognize that this is Saint Agnes."

Saint Agnes looks forward to seeing how this brand adds to our school spirit and brings Aggies young and old together.

Note: This new branding in no way impacts the more formal school side of our brand identity. Our crest, school colors of red and white, letterhead, fonts, etc.—all of that is staying the same. The new branding only applies to our Aggie athletics and activities.

MARY SEWALD HOBBS

Grade School Class of '37

This past November, Headmaster Kevin Ferdinandt had the pleasure of traveling to California to visit with some of our Aggie alumni. A special treat was meeting Mary (Sewald) Hobbs from the 8th grade graduating class of 1937.

With the help of her nephew, Mary had recently written a letter to the alumni office, relaying her appreciation

for receiving the Aggie Archives throughout the many years. The occasion to meet quite possibly our oldest living alumna was an opportunity he didn't want to miss.

Mary was the youngest of six children born to German immigrants in 1923. The family resided in the home her father built at 509 W. Minnehaha Avenue and were parishioners of Saint Agnes. Besides one brother who died in infancy, all the Sewald children attended Saint Agnes School. Mary proudly presented her First Communion prayer book, "The Little Key of Heaven," dated April 17, 1932, as well as a few class photos she had saved.

Mary fondly recalled Sr. Cosma, the kindergarten teacher

for many years, who was the sweetest nun and beloved among the children. She named several other favorite teachers including her 7th grade teacher, Sr. Josephine and the two 8th grade teachers, Sr. Nicolette and Sr. Austin.

At over 100 years old, Mary's memory is quite impressive. She reminisced about playing

tag and skip on the playground on Kent and Lafond; the darling house across the street that housed the sisters and how she thought it was so small for so many nuns; how the church basement was the auditorium.

But most of all, Mary remembers people. She told stories of Patty Phillipi and Lucille Tschida who performed in Fr. Schmidt's Selbitschka. And when looking at her 8th grade class photo, she was able to name so many of her classmates.

After 8th grade, Mary and her siblings attended Mechanic Arts High School after which she worked various jobs. In 1954, Mary and her husband moved to Cleveland, where her daughter, Nancy, was born.

> Shortly after, she found herself raising Nancy alone, so she moved to California to be with her brother and his family. Her parents eventually relocated west as well and Mary has since enjoyed life in California surrounded by her loving, extended family.

She wondered aloud if there was still a tunnel that connected the State Capitol to the State's Business offices, where she once worked. And she asked about White Castle. Was there still a store on University Avenue? And one on Rice Street?

Mary's last trip back to MN was in 2011 to celebrate her brother Al's 90th birthday. She proudly brought her family to Mass at Saint Agnes and afterwards, was talking with an usher whose wife was an alumna. When she

The Sewalds lived next to the Selbitschka family and without missing a beat, Mary rattled off the names of all twelve Selbitschka children. She remembers her playmates Lorraine Lindorfer, Mary Thill, Mary Margaret Thill, Elizabeth Overly, Dorothy Ferris and Marie was told the maiden name, her eyes lit up. Of course, she wouldn't forget a schoolmate!

At 100 and some odd months, Mary lives at home with her nephew, John, and is still a proud Aggie! It was an honor to meet her and we pray that God will continue to bless her with good health and the presence of family at her side.



As the plaque itself states for both the male and female recipients: "This senior represents best the hopes and goals as expressed in the mission and vision of Saint Agnes School." On behalf of the faculty, administration, and the entire student body, we are honored to announce that the 9th annual "Saint Agnes Palm Award" was presented to seniors Cadman William Foley and Elizabeth Margaret Williams!

Palm Award Recipient Elizabeth Williams is a parishioner of the Cathedral of St. Paul. Elizabeth was President of the National Honor Society and a member



of the Student Council. She was also involved in the Pro-Life Club, Militia Immaculata, Latin Club, acted in the Spring Musical, ran Track and Field, and was a captain on both the Girls Soccer and Basketball Teams. She will be attending the University of St. Thomas in the fall and will double major in Catholic Studies and another yet to be determined field.

At Commencement, Elizabeth reminded her classmates to remember and appreciate their time together and to look forward to what is to come. She said, "God placed us all here at Saint Agnes together so that we may carry this time with us and glean from it. It takes maturity to say goodbye, but it also takes maturity to recognize when we should hold on to something good."

Continuing her reflection, she quoted *The Brothers Karamazov*: "At the conclusion of *The Brothers Karamazov* Alyosha says, 'You must know that there is nothing higher, or stronger, or sounder, or more useful afterwards in life, than some good memory.' Our time here will serve us well if we put what we have learned to use. Obviously in terms of academics, but more importantly in how we have learned to serve God. We should maintain the foundation that we have laid here."

Cadman Foley PALM AWARD HONOREE

Palm Award Recipient Cadman Foley is also a parishioner of the Cathedral of St. Paul. He served as Vice President of the Student

Council and was involved in many clubs and activities including Drama Club, Pro-Life Club, Usher Corps., Militia Immaculata, Quiz Bowl, the Spring Musical, Aggie Strength, Track



and Field, Wrestling, and was a captain of the Football Team. Cadman will also be attending the University of St. Thomas and plans to double major in Catholic Studies and Business.

Cadman acknowledged the wide array of talents and abilities the Class of 2024 possesses, and emphasized the need for devotion to their individual vocations. He challenged his class by posing the question, "What then, is 'true devotion?" Answering, Foley defined devotion as: "The happy acceptance of our daily tasks, the Divine Love which helps us work meaningfully in all we do. Devotion in our lives entails carrying and keeping that love for Christ close to us as we journey through this life. It means we embrace those we encounter, and we bring the love we have for Christ and spread it through our human love." It is this devotion to their vocations that Foley hoped to inspire in his classmates as they concluded their time at Saint Agnes.

Quoting Saint Augustine, he encouraged his classmates to discern important choices, but not to become paralyzed in that discernment. He said, "St. Augustine wrote that we ought to 'Love God, and then do what we will.' This means embracing our gifts and abilities and then simply serving the Lord by living active lives in His service. We must chase after that which we find joy in and most importantly that which brings us closer to Him. When we find what it is we truly desire to do, then we must begin doing it with total devotion. It is in this way that we will build His kingdom on Earth. It is in this way that we will live lives that truly reach excellence and glorify God."



Aggies March for Life

On January 22nd, over 200 Aggies attended Minnesota's March for Life. The march began with a prayer liturgy just across the interstate at the Cathedral, with Aggie altar servers bearing the torches and crucifix, and Aggie students from St. Charles Borromeo's youth group receiving the archdiocesan St. John Paul II Champions for Life Award for their weekly commitment of praying outside of Planned Parenthood.

The Aggies then marched down from Cathedral Hill to the steps of the Capitol, joyfully encouraging cars driving past to honk in support and raising their signs and voices- along with thousands of our fellow Minnesotans gathered for the march—in support of the gift of life from conception to natural death.

Aggies choose life. We pray our state might, too.







The Saint Agnes Concert Band spent their Easter break in the Birthplace of Jazz. 37 students, led by Mr. Steve Truran, Concert Band Director, traveled 22 hours by bus down to Louisiana to advance their musical artistry, grow together as an ensemble, and experience the rich musical culture of the Big Easy.

There were many things for our students to love about their time spent in New Orleans,

from the music, to the history, to the delicious food. But how did the band end up deciding to go to New Orleans? "Easy," said Mr. Steve Truran: "I let the band choose. I was glad—that was my choice, too," he said.

Once the band arrived, the itinerary was packed every day to squeeze in as much of New Orleans as possible. Aggies experienced a walking tour of the French Quarter, dinner at a Rock-and-Bowl, a swamp tour, and Mass and a performance at the St. Louis Cathedral, just to name a few highlights. "You felt like you were constantly on the move," Truran said.

For our band students, the trip was an eye-opening exposure to a city whose musical culture was unlike anything they had experienced before. Junior flutist Chloe Carnes loved how prevalent music was throughout the city. "There was music everywhere you went," she said. "People playing on the streets, everywhere. It was really cool to see. And they were really good musicians."

A few of our courageous seniors were even able to contribute to the scene by busking themselves! Trombonist Charlie Wallisch noted the opportunity as the highlight of the trip for him. "My favorite part of the trip was when Noel (Varco) on trumpet, Gabe (Osterbauer) on percussion—he smacked my trombone case with his drumsticks—and I went out on the street corner and busked for a half hour," he said. "We made \$42! Getting out and playing in a place of so much history of jazz and culture down there was really cool!"

The trip also included a couple of school performances for the students, which provided opportunities for the Aggies to meet other musicians and gain feedback from the directors of other ensembles. One stop was at Loyola University New Orleans. The Aggies worked through some of their repertoire with Loyola's band professor and met some of their collegiate musicians.

Another memorable exchange was at Holy Cross Catholic School, whose school had been destroyed during Hurricane Katrina. "They rebuilt it on another site," said Truran, "and it was gorgeous." While their band was a smaller 7-12 program, it was a good experience for our students. "It was really fun to watch the other band," Chloe Carnes said, "It was a marching band, and they had a routine."

Truran could sense the excitement in his concert band students after exchanging with Holy Cross: "Marching band was big for them. Of course, the kids then said, 'Oh, we should get a marching band and a drumline!'"

Aggie students were also able to expand their historical knowledge and experiences on the trip, visiting the Whitney Plantation Museum, riding the St. Charles Streetcar, Preservation Hall Jazz Club, which is situated in the heart of the French Quarter on St. Peter Street. The Preservation Hall venue presents intimate, acoustic New Orleans Jazz concerts over 360 nights a year featuring ensembles from a collective of 50+ local master practitioners. "They did a private

visiting the New Orleans Jazz Museum, eating beignets at Café du Monde in the famous French Quarter, and spending an evening on the steamboat Natchez jazz dinner cruise. Charlie Wallisch recalled a unique memory from the cruise, in which he and a classmate played with the featured band. "They asked if there were any musicians on board, so we cheered and said we had our instruments on board. The director looked at his watch and said, 'Come back at 8:30.' So, we came back and played *When the Saints Go Marching In* with them."

There were also opportunities for the students to see New Orleans' rich historical and musical heritage come together within the city itself. One such stop was at the

concert for us," said Truran, "We went at 9:30 in the morning and sat in this old room that was kept like it was in the old days—it was dark and very, very rough inside."

"The musicians there were so good," Carnes remarked. "It made you feel like you were a part of it and it was in such a small room—just us and them."

"It was really

inspiring," senior trumpeter Sarah Clyde agreed. "This guy was 71 and had been playing the trumpet since he was 5. I just thought, 'That is a completely different thing to dedicate your life to.' An NFL player can't play football for 70 years. We don't have that kind of musical culture in MN; it's very sports oriented. In New Orleans the celebrities are the musicians."

Mr. Truran acknowledged the importance of exposing our students to the musical culture in New Orleans. "The kids were so inspired," he said, "and that was the big thing: to get inspired by music."

Wallisch agreed. "I think seeing that kind of music would make anyone appreciate it more. Appreciating music is such a huge

part of being able to play it musically rather than just playing the notes. It's made a huge difference for me."

In the end, the trip was about even more than musical growth, though-it was about growing together as a band, as Aggies, and as friends. Clyde recalled that, "A lot of people said that they either formed new relationships with people or deepened the relationships they already had. In band we're not able to talk to each other-we can't really move around. In a regular class you change seats, but in band you never change your seat so you're always next to the same people. Getting to know people like that was cool." Carnes shared a similar sentiment and was surprised by just how much fun she had both in New Orleans and on the "crazy" bus rides. "Our band connected on the trip," she said. "I became friends with a lot of people in the band that I wasn't before. We laughed a lot."

"Band trips are magic," said Mr. Truran, offering his final reflections on the experience. "The bonding that happens—it's something special that you won't forget. And that's what I told the kids—this will be your story. This will be one of those stories you'll never forget."

The Concert Band participated in an exchange concert with Holy Cross School.

BOYS BASKETBALL

The Boys Basketball Team had a great year, finishing 18-10 overall and 13-3 in Skyline Conference action. For the third consecutive year they played in the section semifinal game but again came up a bit short. Senior **Andrew Weber** and junior **Nolan Davis** were selected to the All-Conference team while seniors **Elijah Simmons** and **Cegan Flood** were named All-Conference Honorable Mention.

Senior Andrew Weber became the school's all-time leading scorer with 1,524 career points. He surpassed Nick Turch '14 who had 1,516 career points.

GIRLS BASKETBALL

Girls Basketball finished a historic year with a record setting 21-win season. This is the first time in the history of the program that the girls' basketball team has eclipsed 20-wins in a single season. Specific highlights from the season include: the program's first ever victory vs Maranatha Christian Academy in a double OT thriller, a season sweep against rival Concordia Academy, and multiple girls being named to the state's top players list in their position groups in an SB Live Sports article (guards, wings, and posts).

The team was led by a strong group of hard-working seniors who have committed the past 4 years to working relentlessly to achieve something great as a team and it was very exciting to be able to watch them experience the fruits of their labor. In addition to the seniors, we had a great group of underclassmen on the varsity level ranging from 9th grade to 11th grade contributing in many ways on and off the court. After fielding 3 levels of teams (Varsity, JV, and C) for the third consecutive season, we are excited to see this program continue to grow and develop in the years to come.

Seniors Malini Sandifer, Maria Fischer and Freshman Ma'lon McCoy were named All-Conference, while Senior Sarah Clyde and Junior Terese Fischer were All-Conference Honorable Mention.

BOYS AND GIRLS ALPINE SKI

The Aggie Wrestling Team continues to make their mark in section and state competition. This year they finished 17-23 and won a first-round team section meet vs. powerhouse Kimball 42-33 at the end of the season.

At section individuals, three wrestlers qualified for the state tournament: senior Jacob McLaughlin, 172 lbs. and juniors Joseph Cummings, 145 lbs. and Charlie Witzel, 189 lbs.

BASEBALL

The baseball team continued their winning tradition, finishing the season with a

19-6 record and making a return trip to the Section 4AA championship game. Unfortunately, their quest for a fourth consecutive section championship fell short with a loss to Blake in the final.

"We had to replace seven starters from the 2023 season, and the boys answered the call. We didn't miss a beat," said **Coach Streitz**. "Many of last year's JV players stepped up and filled the voids nicely."



On Thursday, May 9th, the Saint Agnes School Varsity Baseball Team enjoyed a day at the ballpark, first taking in the Minnesota Twins game and then defeating New Life Academy 4-0 at Target Field as part of the Minnesota Twins High School Baseball Series. 




