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A new musical opening in August is the product of an all-alumni cast and the devotion of Notre Dame Prep's talented longtime choir director

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n Aug. 23, the musical "Alyce" opens at Meadow Brook Theatre in Rochester, Mich. It will be the culmination of a

years-long effort to stage the musical fairy tale about an indentured servant, a scarecrow, a witch and a witch finder. It's loosely based on Nathaniel Hawthorne's short story "Feathertop," which was first published in 1852.

It also will be the first time that veteran Notre Dame Prep choir director Dave Fazzini has managed an all-alumni cast musical.

"It's never been done before," said

Fazzini, who wrote all the music for the play. "The initial response was positive and the enthusiasm has steadily risen all along. Our alumni have in the past returned and performed at various concerts and video projects over the years and we've had a few alumni choir concerts in the past as well, but this will be different."

Matthew Croft NDP'06, who currently is traveling the country as the music director, conductor and keyboard player for the "Mamma Mia!" 25th Anniversary National Tour, has agreed to provide the orchestration for "Alyce". He said his former teacher first contacted him about the project in 2022.

"It's never been done before..."

"Dave had asked for some thoughts about arrangements for the show and whether I might be available or interested in orchestrating the show," said Croft, who currently lives in Omaha, Neb., when he's not on tour. "So we started there and began to more fully work on the project late last summer to start the scoring process." He said it's truly exciting to work on an original score and show.

"Plus, to have an orchestra of 15 professional musicians to work with is quite the treat. I'm hoping to be able to come and be a part of the production in August if I'm able to work it in my schedule."

Another alum, Dennis Bonucchi, who has been cast in the new musical, said being part of something like "Alyce" was intriguing after he read about the play in a recent alumni e-newsletter.

"The article indicated that theatre alumni from heritage schools also could apply to join the cast," said Bonucchi, who graduated from Notre Dame High School in Harper Woods in 1969. "I immediately emailed Dave Fazzini to express my interest, and also to advise him of my past theatre experience at NDHS. He responded by inviting me to an "Alyce" workshop on Feb. 18 at Notre Dame Prep, where we rehearsed songs from the musical.

Now that he's been cast, Bonucchi says he feels both "privileged and fortunate to be participating in NDP's summer production of 'Alyce."

INSPIRED BY STUDENTS

The initial call for auditions for "Alyce" went out last summer and most of the main characters have been cast, according to Fazzini, and there have been a number of read-throughs. There are a total of six leads, a dozen supporting roles, two choruses, dancers, non-singing actors, the production

"I owe a great deal of

team, crew and administration. With rehearsals beginning in earnest in early July, it's a huge undertaking for anyone let alone someone who's teaching full-time.

But for Fazzini, now in his 25th year at NDP, he wouldn't have it any other way.

"I've been fascinated by the theater since I was a child myself," he said. "Directing plays and musicals at NDP has deepened my understanding and love of the genre. It seemed like a natural progression to combine my need to write music with my love of the theater. And I have to say that while I've been composing music my whole life, it wasn't until I recently explored writing for the stage that music seemed to just pour out of me."

And while some of the stage's most famous performers, such as singer Julie Andrews and composer Stephen Sondheim, have influenced Fazzini, he says his greatest inspiration always comes from working with young people.

"If that sounds corny, so be it," he said. "Directing them in more than two dozen musicals over my career each one a treasured memory — was the main prompt for me to tackle something as ambitious as 'Alyce."

Former student Croft says he in turn holds special memories of working with Fazzini.

"Dave was a fantastic teacher; I owe a great deal of my musical development to both Dave and Joe Martin," Croft said. "Dave always encouraged me to write and arrange, and has been a big fan of my work. His gospel and film music background was part of a really great learning opportunity for me as a student, and I took a lot of lessons from him into my college experience and beyond."

CAPTIVATED BY THE STAGE

Fazzini grew up in Farmington, Mich., and attended Farmington High School and Wayne State University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in music composition. He's been playing piano since he was a child but says singing has always been his true passion.



"My father was a music minister at a large Protestant church in Southfield called Brightmoore Tabernacle," he said. "So from my early elementary school days, I was put on stage to sing in front of hundreds of people. In fact, most of my early experience with music came from that church, and much of it under my father's direction."

For the past 15 years, Fazzini also has been a member of a local band called "Cancel Monday," which plays around 80 dates a year — weddings, corporate parties and some clubs. In addition, he's the sound engineer for St. Joseph Catholic Church in Lake Orion.

He played cello in middle school and eventually joined the choir in high school.

"My high school choir teacher took us to see a few musicals one year and I was captivated by the magic of the stage," recalls Fazzini. "So much so that during my senior year, I auditioned for my high school's production of 'Annie Get Your Gun.' I got the lead role and experienced the magic from the other side of the curtain, which had such a profound effect on me that since then, I've been compelled to stay as close to the theater stage as possible."

A CHRISTIAN MAN

Now well into his third decade at Notre Dame Prep, Fazzini easily reflects on what it means to work at a Catholic and Marist school like NDP.

"Teaching at a Catholic school is an amazing blessing. My childhood was full of church activity, participating sometimes four or more times a week. But like many, my church attendance lessened in my college and early career days."

He said working at NDP put him close to the church once again. So close, in fact, that he's proud to say that last year he attended

the RCIA program at St. Joseph's parish in Lake Orion and was confirmed last Easter.

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"Now I also get to more fully explore both my Catholic faith and the school mission with my students," he said. "I always pray that I can be a good example of a Christian man to the kids. The choir classroom and the cast of a musical are both great models of citizenship. In addition, classes like choir explore parts of the human condition that can't be explained by science. Things like beauty, faith, love and joy. I believe that this kind of scholarship is not only worthwhile, but essential to a complete education." +

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SPOTLIGHT ON NDP CLUBS

BIG WIN for Notre Dame Prep's Michigan Youth in Government delegation

Notre Dame Prep's Michigan Youth in Government delegation, which included the state's youth governor elected earlier this year, attended the 2024 MYIG spring conference in Lansing and came home with major accolades and a big mock trial win.

YMCA Michigan Youth in Government is a student-run, student-led model government program for teens across the state of Michigan. It provides the content and resources for delegations to organize locally to prepare for regional and statewide events. The program year typically starts with a regional fall training conference and culminates in a spring conference in Lansing.

This year's spring conference, for high schoolaged participants, ran from April 11-14 and was centered predominantly at the DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel in Lansing, although some of the Thursday and Friday events were held in the State Capitol Building.

Notre Dame Prep's delegation, one of the largest in school history, was featured in a number of forums, programs and activities, including the swearing-in ceremony on Thursday and a welcome address and State of the State speech to all attendees by the 2024 youth governor, Michael Kenny NDP'24.

According to Whitney Lorenz NDP'12, who recently had been mentoring the school's MYIG team and assisting in coaching the forensics club, one of the most exciting events that NDP delegates participated in was the Model Judiciary Program, which began in earnest on a Thursday afternoon.

"After a grueling eight rounds of mock trials, the NDP team 113, Geralyn Nguyen NDP'25, Erin Surmann NDP'26, Caroline Powell NDP'26 and Valentina Sedano NDP'25, took home the win in the final round of competition," she said. "Erin Surmann received a 'Best Witness' award for some superb acting, and lastly, the team was gifted with a replica of the ring that served as evidence in their mock murder-trial case."

Lorenz was effusive about the talent demonstrated by the Notre Dame Prep students.

"I cannot begin to explain all of the hard work and dedication that they put into preparing for this mock trial case," Lorenz said. "I'm so proud of that team as well as all our students who were in Lansing. It truly is another testament to the incredible students at NDP." +

Difference maker

A busy, young student finds inspiration through her sister








n Dec. 2, 2023, Notre Dame Prep sophomore Elisa Kim and several members of 100+ Women Who Care Motown, an organization of local women who support area charities, visited Gigi's Playhouse in Southfield to tour the facility, meet with participants and present a check for \$10,000.

Gigi's Playhouse, which opened in 2019, is the local branch of an organization with more than 50 locations across the

country that helps raise awareness for individuals with Down syndrome for developmental play, therapy, sharing resources, and most importantly, the creation of important support networks for both kids and parents.

Kim's family has been associated with Gigi's Playhouse since January of 2019. Her younger sister, Elena, has Down syndrome, and Elisa and her family's participation in fundraising events provided a big boost in the opening of Gigi's Playhouse almost five years ago and has been a part of its steady growth since then.

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HUGE IMPACT

Involving the 100+ Women Who Care Motown organization was a perfect fit for Gigi's, according to Kim.

"After having multiple conversations with the founder of 100+ WWCM and several of its members, I was able to advocate for Gigi's Playhouse at their November 2023 meeting," Kim said.

"For a small nonprofit like Gigi's, the donations totaling \$10,000 will make a huge impact on its ability to provide services and programs to individuals with Down syndrome in Metro Detroit," she added.

Elena clearly already is benefiting.

"Since Gigi's opening, Elena has participated in various programs offered there," Kim said. "I was inspired to become a volunteer after seeing how Elena was helped by the various programs and by observing how it gives her a community that supports and encourages her to be her best self."

Kim also went through volunteer training at the facility a couple of years ago, but due to the pandemic there was a lengthy suspension of activities. She's made up for that lost time and then some and has been an active volunteer for the past two years. She also volunteers at Friendship Circle in West Bloomfield, another organization that provides a range of services and programs for individuals with intellectual disabilities.

MISSION-FOCUSED

"I try to do what I can to promote awareness and acceptance of Down syndrome," she said. "All too often, people make assumptions about Elena and individuals like her because they wear their disability on their face. But part of being a Christian person, I believe, is to meet each person where they are in life, and to treat them with care and compassion."

She says her sister, without question, is someone who is so full of joy and love and that she doesn't judge others at all based on appearance or background. "I try to share that same openness when I am at Gigi's and interacting with all the participants. I've learned so much from being involved there. Being a volunteer also gives me the opportunity to be an upright citizen by being more fully active with the local Down syndrome community and by bringing more awareness to the community at large."

Going forward, she is hopeful that her involvement with Gigi's Playhouse encourages others to learn more about Down syndrome or other disabilities and to get more involved themselves.

THRIVING AT NOTRE DAME PREP

Meanwhile, Kim, who first came to Notre Dame Prep as a sixth grader, has thrived at the Oakland County Catholic school. She said a big reason she likes NDP is because it has so much to offer to its students compared to others.

"NDP gives students a unique experience that makes high school very memorable," she said. "My favorite classes so far have been art and freshman year English with Mr. Lilek. I've also been part of the swim team since freshman year and I participate in Michigan Youth in Government."

Among her other extracurriculars is the Culinary Club (she's the founder) that focuses on food and cooking, especially international cuisine. Kim's also a member of the school's Newspaper Club, the UNICEF Club, the Podcast Club and the Pre-Med Club.

A busy young lady, for sure, but not too busy to think about the next step in her academic journey.

"Although I am keeping my options open after graduation, I am interested in the University of

Michigan, Georgetown University, where my sister, Aria NDP'23, goes to school, the University of Notre Dame and UC Berkeley," she said.



Notre Dame Prep alums Julia Pagnucco and Raegan Kerr, both from the Class of 2016, were in Orlando, Fla., at the PGA Show, one of the biggest national events of the year for the business of golf. They were there to introduce The Garde, a women's sporting and lifestyle brand they both launched recently from "just a dream."

"Since high school, we have always talked about creating a fashion brand someday," Pagnucco said on the eve of the Orlando show. "Raegan and I have always bonded over our interest in fashion and wanted to create something that reflected our own personal styles."

Kerr played on the varsity golf team all four years at NDP and while she enjoyed the sport, her favorite part of golf had always been the fashion. Back then, according to Pagnucco, Kerr's best friend, creating a brand and business was "just a dream" they talked about but with no real idea of how they were going to make it happen. "Eight years later, after college and grad school, we realized that we were in a great position to act on that dream," added Pagnucco, who graduated from the University of Michigan in 2020 with a degree in computer science. "We felt it was a matter of 'now or never' and decided to go for it. Looking back, The Garde really is a culmination of everything we've been working toward, even before we knew what exactly that was. Now we are really excited to see where this journey takes us!"

THE FAIRWAY AS RUNWAY

The Garde is a made-in-the-USA women's sporting and lifestyle brand that Kerr and Pagnucco said is focused on updating traditional aesthetics with modern details. They believe they've hit the bullseye by "making the fairway the new fashion runway."

More from a recent press release: "Inspired by the intersection of game and lifestyle, The Garde designs functional but fashionable garments that allow women to easily transition from the golf course to the boardroom to happy hour. The Garde is carving a space for in-the-know women, offering a collection that challenges the status quo of traditional, outdated sportswear and opening doors for a new era of elegant athleticism." Pagnucco said their start-up is direct-to-consumer through their website, the-garde.com, and will soon be found in select retailers across the country starting in the spring.

"We also are planning a trunk show road trip for later this summer," she said, adding that all their clothing is made in New York City. "Keeping our development and production domestic was something that was important to us from the start."

IB INFLUENCE AT NOTRE DAME PREP

The two women said the Florida show went well and they're still trying to catch up. And while both of these young entrepreneurs are looking forward to big success with The Garde and long and rewarding careers in business, they can't help but look behind to what likely helped make that possible.

"When I was at NDP, like most of my classmates, I had no idea where I would be at this point in my life, but I know that my time there had a major influence on who I am as a person today," said Kerr, a graduate of Miami University and the Parsons School of Design in New York City. "I learned to stay true to myself, follow my passions, and to appreciate and lean on the people who have been there for you since the beginning. Notre Dame Prep faculty, staff and families are still our biggest supporters, even eight years later."

Pagnucco, who also works at Google as a software engineer, was equally appreciative of her time at 1300 Giddings Road.

"In high school, I actually thought I was going to be a doctor," she said. "Although my path changed quite a bit, what I learned at NDP was how to work hard and persevere."

She said the International Baccalaureate program definitely influenced her way of thinking and to always keep an open mind. "I think discussion-based learning helped me understand others' viewpoints, which was very important in college.


"The relationships I formed at NDP are still at the center of my life — Raegan still is my best friend and I met her there. I also am still very close with many others I met there, and I fondly remember all the teachers being amazing influences and resources.

"In my career as a software engineer and now as a new entrepreneur, I find my time at Prep gave me the tools to succeed — the math skills, the leadership skills, the critical-thinking skills, and most important, the confidence-in-myself skills!" +



SHAPING LEADERS:

A conversation with **MYIG'S GOVERNOR**



n the heart of Michigan's Youth in Government program beats the spirit of democratic engagement and leadership development. Notre Dame Prep senior Michael Kenny's four-year journey in the program encapsulates the transformative power of youth participation in shaping the future of governance. Kenny served as youth governor for the 2023-2024 school year.

Michigan Youth in Government (MYIG) is a student-run, student-led model government for teens across the state of Michigan organized by the State Alliance of Michigan YMCAs. Student delegations organize locally from September to April and participate in regional and state events culminating in a spring conference in Lansing. The program provides middle school and high school students with a unique opportunity to become acting state legislators, lobbyists, press corps representatives and lawyers. They simulate the positions of the actual state government.

From delegate to governor

For Kenny, politics was not always in the cards, he admits. The soon-to-be graduate filled his time at NDP participating in extracurriculars like Irish Investing Club, Creative Writing Club, Model U.N. and debate. He also hosted the school's YouTube comedy show, "Between Two Shamrocks." When he wasn't involved in those activities, his rigorous International Baccalaureate class schedule also filled his days.

"When I first joined MYIG, I was not the most enthusiastic about it, as it was fully online my first year in spring of 2021. As I heard the passion in the delegate's speeches, I wanted to learn more," he said. "I am so thankful that Dr. (LeAnne) Schmidt continued to push and encourage me to run for office."

Kenny said he fell in love with the program after being elected lieutenant governor his sophomore year and had the opportunity to preside over the junior and senior year delegate's Senate Chamber sessions.

"I witnessed these high schoolers disagree, passionately debate, and compromise on the Chamber floors but still be friends and grab lunch together right after. Seeing so many young people come together to share a common passion for change in our world today truly inspired me," he said.

Kenny was re-elected lieutenant governor his junior year before running for and winning the youth governor seat his senior year.

His ascent through the program mirrors a personal evolution for Kenny during his time at NDP, first as an underclassman with a lot of uncertainty to eventually finding his niche in leadership roles across the institution.

"It's been an incredible journey of growth and discovery," Kenny said.

Election triumphs and governing responsibilities

Kenny's road to governorship was a personal goal and a memory that he will cherish.

"Being elected governor was both a humbling and exhilarating experience," he said. As governor, Kenny embraced a myriad of responsibilities, from representing Michigan at national conferences to fostering cohesion within the MYIG community.

"My first duty was to represent the state of Michigan at the YMCA Conference On National Affairs, which takes place every year at the Blue Ridge Assembly in Black Mountain, North Carolina. There, I connected with and brainstormed with the other youth governors representing most of the states in the nation, crafting policy and working together to have a smooth year in Youth In Government," he explained.

Throughout the year, Kenny met with schools statewide to learn more about how they wanted to see the program evolve.

"I also worked with and spoke to multiple Michigan senators, representatives and committee members on getting the program grant renewed by the state," he said.

In November, Kenny helped organize and run the MYIG Fall Training Conference, where students across Southeastern Michigan introduced new members, elected Speaker of the House and Youth Governor candidates, and planned the spring conference.

"In April in Lansing at our spring conference, we spent four days working in the capital, and I received firsthand experience working in politics. This year, we introduced the Governor's State of the State address, where I recognized bill authors and policies that I would like to see in legislation moving forward," Kenny said.

From there, the youth governor worked with students serving as chief of staff and in the Governor's Cabinet, to communicate with bill authors, speak at press conferences, discuss bills for signing, and either pass or veto student-sponsored legislation.

"Something I worked on this year was integrating all the programs (Legislative, Model Judiciary Program, National Issues Forum, Press, Lobbyist and Legislative Oversight). To do this, I communicated with the heads of each program and learned what press coverage and schedule flexibility would help them feel seen in the program. On my last day, I gave a final closing address to the program, doing my best to instill a message of hope and perseverance for the program, encouraging the delegates to work together as a community to further our great state of Michigan."

Navigating the legislative landscape

After four years, Kenny said one of the biggest lessons he learned is how to compromise and work with others to accomplish a goal, even if he didn't always see eye to eye with bills that other student legislators authored.

"MYIG exposed me to the complexities of governance," he said. "From healthcare to gun violence to infrastructure, the issues we grappled with were diverse and challenging."

As governor, Kenny navigated the legislative landscape with a keen eye for feasibility and impact. "It was a balancing act," Kenny acknowledges, "but fostering dialogue and collaboration was paramount to advancing meaningful policy solutions."

The road ahead

While Kenny's tenure as youth governor has concluded, his commitment to effecting positive change remains steadfast.

"MYIG has instilled in me a deep sense of civic duty and responsibility," he said. "For aspiring participants, I offer this advice: seize the opportunity to engage and lead. MYIG has the power to transform lives and communities."

Kenny admits that politics may not be his true calling, at least for now. He is planning to attend the University of Michigan's Ross School of Business.

"As I bid farewell to MYIG, I leave behind a legacy of leadership and service," he said. "It's been an honor to serve alongside my peers and mentors, and I'm grateful for the friendships forged and lessons learned."

Social studies teacher finds a school environment that aligns with her own faith and mission in life

ewer than one in five Americans (18 percent) would encourage a young person to become a K-12 teacher, according to a recent survey by NORC (National Opinion Research Center) at the University of Chicago, a non-partisan, independent social research organization. Last year, Harvard University dropped its undergrad teaching program due to declining enrollment just one of many such closures that have accelerated since 2020, noted a Forbes article by Mark C. Perna, an educator, author and specialist in workforce management.

Meanwhile, finding those teachers who embrace the special mission that defines everything at Notre Dame Prep despite such a difficult environment remains a huge priority for the school's administration and human resources department. Fortunately, the classrooms of NDP, from pre-kindergarten through 12th grade, continue to be staffed by a group of faculty members who deliver the school's enviable academic program within a community that also guides young men and women into becoming good Christian people and upstanding citizens with the strength to live their conviction and a commitment to serving others.

Despite this, the Eastern


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IT'S ABOUT VALUES AND ETHICS

For NDP's Rachael Kroll, who began teaching in the upper school in December of 2021, it's been an "amazing" experience so far and one that seems perfectly aligned with who she is.

"The faith and school mission aspect of NDP is grounded in a very similar way to my own high school experience," she said in a recent interview. "I remember my high school years instilling certain values and ethics that I keep with me to this day. And I can tell that Notre Dame does the same thing."



"We were able to go to a conference at the University of Michigan and I really got to see the students grow in their confidence and ability to be an impactful part of democracy and change," she said.

As Kroll and her students looked to finish the school year strong, she remains steadfast in nurturing and advancing the overall raison d'etre of Notre Dame Prep.

"The school fosters an environment where everyone feels accepted, heard, challenged and called to be the best person they can be," she said. "Forming Christian people, upright citizens and academic scholars has a lot more to it than just those words. Truly living and understanding those words is how we all can become who we are called to be by God." +



Increasing the security footprint

n January of this year, Notre Dame Prep announced that it hired Kerry F. Horton II as its new full-time director of security and safety. Horton's extensive background in law enforcement, security management and his commitment to innovation and safety will play a key role in ensuring the safety and well-being of the school's campus community, said the announcement. In this newly created role, he leads all emergency and safety protocols on campus and works collaboratively with surrounding community and law-enforcement partners.

According to Andy Guest, Notre Dame Prep's head of school, the investment in a full-time security and safety officer position is a significant step in ongoing efforts to ensure that the school maintains a high level of safety for students, parents and staff.

"Kerry will work closely with school administration and lead our existing security efforts, which include a strong team of dedicated security professionals," added Guest. "Combined with our investment in a state-of-the art emergency communication system and more than 100 security cameras, I am confident that Notre Dame Prep is now one of the safest campuses in the state." Horton, a retired federal law enforcement officer with 26 years of service, brings a wealth of security experience to Notre Dame Prep after serving primarily within the Federal Bureau of Prisons, beginning at the Federal Correctional Institution in Milan, Mich. In 2001, he transferred federal agencies and was hired by the U.S. Probation Department and specialized in cases involving drugs, firearms and high-risk criminal activity in Wayne, Macomb, Oakland and Genesee counties.

He is a nationally certified safety instructor and during his tenure with U.S. Probation, was responsible for developing and facilitating training in the application of use of force, self-defense tactics, hand-to-hand combat, ground fighting, handcuffing, weapon retention, and various other law enforcement-related areas.

In December 2021, he retired from the federal service and began working at Premier Security Solutions as an armed school security officer and would eventually be promoted to his most recent previous position as a school security manager, where he assisted in the oversight of security operations in 18 school districts.

"I feel very humbled and blessed to have been chosen to fill this vital role at Notre Dame Prep," said Horton, who maintains an office on the school's Giddings Road campus. "I believe my past law enforcement experience and time already spent at Notre Dame together make me uniquely qualified to meet our school's security and safety needs. I have spent my entire professional career in public service and am excited for the opportunity to continue serving the members of our school community."

Horton earned his bachelor's degree in criminal justice and sociology from the University of

Michigan and a master's degree in criminology from Eastern Michigan University.

During the past two years with Premier, Horton has been actively involved in the security program at Notre Dame Prep, both as a security officer and manager. These experiences have allowed him to gain valuable insight into the security practices and needs at NDP, as well as developing positive working relationships with the various members of the school community.


"Even prior to accepting my new position with the school," he added, "I already considered myself a member of this community, which I am totally devoted to keeping safe."

Horton also noted that Notre Dame Prep's current security program historically has been strong and effective.

"To the credit of our school's leadership, NDP continues to treat security as a top priority and invests in any upgrades necessary to meet the needs of our school community," he said. "That includes maintaining high staffing levels of contracted security personnel on all campuses, the lease of a security vehicle and increased security markings on personally owned security vehicles for added deterrence, installation of additional cameras/video monitoring, electronic visitor check-in screening, and the expanded use of keycards on designated building entry points."


Horton said a big part of his job is to continually assess all campus facilities and established emergency procedures and make adjustments as necessary. He also plans to maintain the existing working relationship with local law enforcement agencies such as the Oakland County Sheriff's Office.

"Local law enforcement offers an added layer of support in maintaining an orderly campus, as well as being first responders to any critical incident that may occur. By keeping everyone protected and feeling safe, teachers can be comfortable teaching, students can learn and our school divisions can operate at their maximum effectiveness." +



González grew up in Detroit and





he National Intercollegiate Running Club Association (NIRCA) is the national governing body for club-level collegiate cross-country, road running and track and field clubs at more than 50 colleges and universities across the United States.

At the University of Notre Dame, Jonathan Karr NDP'20 has been a member of the NIRCA club since he was a freshman, serving as race coordinator last year and media chair this year. Endlessly upbeat and a man of faith, Karr, who runs every day, is a dynamo who's looking forward to the next lap of his life, likely a doctoral degree in computer science.

But Karr says all would not be possible had it not been for his Notre Dame Prep experience.

"I am so grateful for Notre Dame Prep paving the way for me," he said. "Notre Dame Prep's International Baccalaureate program, especially, laid a solid foundation that helped me succeed in college. And the experiences of Kairos and NDP's Catholic and Marist foundation guided me in deepening my faith even further throughout college."

He also credits his Catholic university in furthering his devotion to God.

"The UND community has helped me with my faith just as it was leading me to re-discover my passion for computer science," he added. "For example, at Notre Dame, I've been part of the Stanford Hall for all four years and served as the sacristan of the hall chapel. Each dorm on campus has a chapel, and at Stanford we're lucky to have daily mass. Also, having two Holy Cross priests and a Holy Cross brother in our dorm has helped me in my faith journey."

Research at the university level

Karr's longtime passion for computers also has led to a computer science major at Notre Dame with a cybersecurity concentration and minors in theology and engineering corporate practice. Additionally, he's been working on research with Dr. Paul Brenner, who is a senior associate director at Notre Dame's Center for Research Computing.

The research is funded by the U.S. Navy and supports \$27 million in funding for research in advanced computing, computational biology, cybersecurity, data science, software and systems engineering and artificial intelligence.

Karr adds that they've recently been doing work with natural language processing and knowledge graphs, which, he notes, has been a bit less strenuous due to the IB at Notre Dame Prep.

"In particular, the internal assessments component of the IB program was a big help in preparing me for such college research."

But he also credits his high school's multi-faceted extracurricular focus on STEM for his overall success in college.

"The Killer Bees' robotics team helped nurture my passion for data and computer science and even helped me in obtaining internships at Qualcomm for the past three summers," he said.

Running with former classmates

Current NDP Academic Technology Director Eden Konja also was influential in developing Karr's computer science skills in high school.

"As the CyberPatriot coach at NDP, Mr. Konja showed me how computer science skills can be applied in the real world," Karr said. "Additionally, he helped me obtain IT and Python certifications."

Meanwhile, as Karr finishes up at the University of Notre Dame, he said he's in the process of applying to computer science doctoral schools that hopefully will further his interests in data mining and its relationship with ethics, artificial intelligence and graph learning. He's also catching up with former high school classmates, like Jenny Ohlsson NDP'20, who runs cross-country for Oakland University's D-1 team.

"This year, the Notre Dame Running Club and Oakland University's NCAA team participated together in the Joe Piane Invitational, hosted by Notre Dame, and the Bradley University 'Pink' Classic meets," said Karr, who also served as captain of the NDP cross-country team during his senior year.



"So whether it's going back to high school cross-country practices during fall break or racing against former teammates like Jenny, I'm always grateful to remain connected to the Notre Dame Prep community." +

otre Dame High School alumnus John Trinkwalder knows the sacrifice his father made to send him to Catholic school. The investment, he said, is one for which he is forever grateful. Now, Trinkwalder wants to pay it forward. He and his fellow classmates have established the Class of 1962 scholarship fund to support rising freshmen at Notre Dame Prep.

Trinkwalder said the idea for a scholarship was born out of discussion with the school during the class's 60th reunion last year.

"I found out there were some students who

attend the school who struggle financially with tuition, so I decided to reach out to my classmates and ask everyone to donate \$100," Trinkwalder explained. "All of us from Harper Woods Notre Dame can relate to the sacrifices our parents made for us."

The class was able to raise \$3,200, enough to provide four scholarships to students transitioning from middle to high school. Trinkwalder said the criteria for the scholarship is simple: students must demonstrate a financial need, participate in school activities, and be registered parishioners at a Catholic church.



"Our class goal is to raise enough money to make sure the scholarship recipients will receive aid through their senior year," he said.

The scholarship is a testament to the class of 62's ongoing support of the Marist priests and Notre Dame Prep faculty and staff.

"My main interest is for these students to continue their education at Notre Dame," Trinkwalder said. "They may not realize it now, but the education they receive is so valuable. WORLD-CLASS ROBOTICS

Notre Dame Prep teams brought home two of the four awards won by Michigan schools in April at this year's VEX Robotics World Championship in Dallas.

The VEX Robotics World Championship, presented by the Northrop Grumman Foundation and the REC Foundation, began April 25 at the Kay Bailey Hutchison Convention Center in Dallas, Texas. The annual event brought together the top VEX IQ Robotics Competition, VEX Robotics Competition and VEX U teams from around the world to celebrate their accomplishments and participate in the games.

Four robotics teams from Notre Dame Prep traveled this year to Dallas for the event, which is the largest robotics competition in the world, with more than 100,000 in attendance this year. Although it is a huge event, it is not easy to get in; only a small percentage of active teams worldwide qualify to attend.

"Only four teams in Michigan won awards across all divisions in high school and middle school in April, and two of them were from Notre Dame Prep," said Jerry Palardy, NDP's robotics team mentor and coach. "We also are the only school in Michigan to have won awards last year and this year — actually, NDP has an awards streak going on four years!"

Since the Dallas event is an international event, teams from China, Columbia, Australia, Guyana, Germany, Japan, Kazakhstan, Canada, Mexico, New Zealand, South Korea, India, England, Ireland, Switzerland, Vietnam and many more, are regular competitors.



Notre Dame Prep's team 3333X, Caden Staniszewski (8th grade), William Platt (8th), Patrick Riney (10th), Krrish Patel (10th) and Chris Artinian (8th), received the Build Award for the second year in a row.

"Part of the experience for the kids is meeting and figuring out how to work with other teams that don't necessarily speak the same language," Palardy said. "NDP Team 3333Y "Wynaut," David Ma (7th grade), Graden Grech (7th) and Thomas Binkowski (7th), actually helped their Chinese partners overturn an incorrect ruling. David translated while Graden presented their case to the referee, and the call was reversed. It was an amazing thing to witness."

All four of the teams from NDP had been to the world championship before. Team 3333W, "Power of the Square," consisting of Brooklyn Haddad (11th grade), Dino Acciavatti (10th) and Kevin Carter (10th), made their fourth straight appearance at Worlds. It was the second year for team 3333T, "Tornado Troopers," Steven Carter (7th grade) and Juan Pablo Turrubiartes (7th), as well as team 3333X, "Xtreem Bot," Chris Artinian (8th grade), Krrish Patel (10th), Caden Staniszewski (8th), William Platt (8th), and Patrick Riney (10th). Team 3333Y also made their second straight Worlds appearance.

NDP DEBUTS NEW COMPUTER SCIENCE CLASS

Just 6 percent of high school students

in the United States take computer science classes. The numbers are even lower for elementary and middle school. That's according to a March 2023 story on EdWeek.org, which went on to say that computer science enrollment remains low nationally despite significant pressure from the business community.

But you wouldn't know that if you checked out Notre Dame Prep. Especially after a new class called Coding rolls out in the middle school next school year to join an increasingly robust computer curriculum at nearly every level at NDP.



"The coding class will be one of four rotating electives that NDP eighth-grade students will be taking next year," said Melissa York, who is teaching the class and also serves as a technology specialist and sixth grade math teacher. "These elective classes will be nine-week rotations. So every nine weeks, I will be working with a new group of eighth grade students and teaching them about coding. Other middle school teachers will continue to teach the other electives we offer in the rotating schedule for eighth graders."

At the upper school, Notre Dame Prep offers an Advanced Placement Computer Science Principles course for juniors and seniors and CSA, or Computer Science for Applications, for seniors in which they learn about Java programming. Fundamentals of Computer Science, Introduction to Computer Aided Design (CATIA), Intermediate Computer Aided Design (CATIA), and Advance Computer Aided Design (CATIA) round out the computer science curriculum. In addition, the first-in-the-nation engineering and empathy class, which debuted at NDP in 2019, utilizes an extensive array of computer software and coding for many of its projects. The course has become a favorite among the student body.

Notre Dame's computer science curriculum also feeds into the school's highly successful robotics program, which in turn helps to supplement the computer courses with real hands-on and tangible hardware representations of the software codes.

Meanwhile, Notre Dame Prep joined an elite group of schools and school districts across the country this year in Code.org's District Program, putting NDP on a list of only four such schools or districts in Michigan that include National Heritage Academies, Detroit Public Schools and Chippewa Valley Schools.

NDP EIGHTH GRADERS ARE 10TH IN THE NATION

A team representing Notre Dame Prep's middle school recently earned highest honors in the 2023-2024 WordMasters Challenge, a national vocabulary competition involving nearly 125,000 students annually. Notre Dame's eighth grade team scored an impressive 159 points out of a possible 200 in the second of three meets this year, placing 10th in the nation.

Competing in the difficult Blue Division of the WordMasters Challenge, the students were coached by Kelly Simon, who teaches sixth grade reading and writing and eighth grade English, and Christine Boan, who teaches seventh grade writing and eighth grade reading.

The WordMasters Challenge is an exercise in critical thinking that first encourages students to become familiar with a set of interesting new words (considerably harder than grade level), and then challenges them to use those words to complete analogies expressing various kinds of logical relationships. Working to solve the analogies helps students learn to think both analytically and metaphorically.



Although most vocabulary enrichment and analogy-solving programs are designed for use by high school students, WordMasters Challenge materials have been specifically created for younger students in grades three through eight. They are particularly well suited for children who are motivated by the challenge of learning new words and enjoy the logical puzzles posed by analogies.






