



#### **Item Name**

PFEA – Grant Amendment – Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund Allocations to School Districts

#### Recommendation – Action Item

It is recommended that the State Board of Education authorize the State School Superintendent to amend the CARES Act grant allocation with Local Education Agencies (LEAs), approved by the Board on July 23, by the amount of \$571,592 for a cost not to exceed \$14,605,294 in Federal Funds for the purpose of offsetting expenses related to COVID-19 for newly eligible LEAs.

#### Supports the Following Education Goal or Goals in the Agency Strategic Plan

Ongoing Operations

#### Rationale

LEAs were granted CARES funds in July to help offset the equitable services amount they were required to set aside. As a result of court rulings that overturned the non-regulatory guidance pertaining to equitable services issued by the United States Department of Education, there are additional LEAs that are having to set aside CARES funds for equitable services. This grant amendment will allocate funds to the LEAs that are now identified as having to set aside funds for equitable services after the approval of this grant in July.

services amount they were required to set-aside in the original CARES Act allocation.

PFEA - Grant - Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA - CARES 2)

#### Recommendation - Action Item

It is recommended that the State Board of Education authorize the State School Superintendent to receive a grant from the United States Department of Education in the amount of \$1,892,092,618 in Federal Funds for the purpose of supporting schools as they are dealing with the effects of the COVID-19 Pandemic, and allocate \$1,702,883,356 to Local Education Agencies (LEA) in the manner required by law.

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Georgia schools to get over \$4 billion from latest federal stimulus



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### American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

ARPA will provide <u>approximately \$4.3 billion to Georgia (\$3.8 billion directly to Local Education Agencies) in dedicated K-12 education funding</u> to assist in COVID-19 relief and recovery.

- State educational agencies will be required to set aside funds to address learning loss and provide summer enrichment and afterschool services.
- School districts will be required to use 20% of their allocation toward addressing learning loss.
