ASBSD Board Recognition Program - ALL

The ASBSD Board Recognition Program is designed to recognize school boards for their dedicated and ethical service to the students of South Dakota. Very few, if any, school board members serve for the attention and accolades of board service. However, ASBSD recognizes the time, effort, and commitment put forth by Board members not only in regular board meetings, but also through activities and training opportunities offered through ASBSD, and demonstrated leadership through local, state, and national meetings, committees, and assemblies. This program will recognize board members' participation in outside activities, board development and training, and demonstrated leadership at various areas and levels.

How does the recognition program work?

By participating in ASBSD activities, training opportunities and demonstrating leadership at the local, state and national level, board members accumulate points to achieve awards. For each level of award, Gold, Silver, and Bronze, point totals are counted in three separate categories. In order to qualify for any board award, some points must be earned in all three categories.

We describe them as ALL; ACT, LEARN, LEAD.

ACT: Activities in this category demonstrate participation at various board functions. Examples would include attending Annual Convention, Delegate Assembly or the NSBA national convention. This category is measured, and points are assigned, as to the functions a board member has attended.

LEARN: Activities in this category center around board member training opportunities board members have attended and completed. Examples would include attending face to face training sessions for board specific workshops or participating in ASBSD regional events, webinars or online courses. Points are assigned based on the learning opportunity and participation.

LEAD: Activities in this category focus on leadership events or activities where board members take on a leadership role or participate in leadership training. Examples would include serving as state board officer, attending the President's Workshop, or representing your District at ASBSD's Delegate Assembly. Points are assigned based upon the position or role held and activity participation.

Points are totaled throughout the fiscal year (July1-June 30), but GAVEL Training counts for a total of three years for three trainings (past, present, and future) under Learning Opportunities.



Scoring Example

In the course of a fiscal year (July 1-June 30), your school board had three members attend the ASBSD-SASD Annual Convention, and you had a board member attend ASBSD Delegate Assembly, your Board would earn 85 points in the **ACT** category.

In the same year, your Board (7 members) had GAVEL Training (School Board Governance) in your District on-site, three other Board members participate in a Wednesdays with Wade meeting, one attend a New School Board Member Workshop and one take part in a School Law Webinar. Your Board would earn 400 points in the **LEARN** category.

Also, in that school year, your Board appointed a Delegate and a LAN member (Legislative Action Network). Your Board would earn 50 points in the **LEAD** category.

The Flandreau Flier Booster Club has been working with Daktronics and area businesses to purchase two video boards, one to be installed in the high school gymnasium and one in the elementary gymnasium. It is our goal to have the video boards installed and functioning by the beginning of the 2023-24 school year.

The 11'x15' video board footprints will be a "wow" factor for Flandreau Public School when fans, students, and community members enter our gymnasiums. The video boards will be used at basketball games, volleyball games, and wrestling competitions. The video boards will not only be used at athletic events, but also will be a benefit for the school during concerts, PE classes, pep rallies, graduation, and other community events held at the school. The usefulness of the video boards move beyond the gyms. In the classroom, high school students will get hands-on experience in learning the curriculum provided by Daktronics, will have the opportunity to create creative content for the video boards, and will learn how to operate the video boards. Furthermore, the revenue generated from advertising will funnel back into the Booster Club and used to support Flandreau's athletes, teams, and facilities.

The Flandreau Flier Booster Club has a long-standing history of supporting the school and it's high school athletic programs. More recently, we have started supporting youth teams that correspond to Flandreau High School sanctioned sports. This support is consistent year after year. To give you an idea of what this looks like, here is a list of ways the Booster Club has supported Flandreau athletics this past year, the amount totaling \$9,042:

- \$3,000 to the two summer strength and speed coaches
- \$1,917 for the 2021-22 HUDL video service. For the 2022-23 school year, this amount is projected to increase by \$650.
- \$560 for a tent frame for the Cross Country/Track teams
- \$1,365 to three youth basketball teams for winter tournament entry fees
- \$200 towards the girl's basketball fan bus
- \$500 to the boy's basketball team when they made it to State in Rapid City
- \$500 to Track for athlete of the week awards and team food
- \$500 to Wrestling for year-end awards and camps
- \$500 to Football for team camp

Looking to the future, the Booster Club will continue to invest in the student athletes through monetary assistance for the teams and through potential projects that could include a facelift for the Booster Club Stadium and a video board for the football field.

The Booster Club board and organization is composed of excited, ambitious, and active members. Monthly meetings are being held in which community members are attending and volunteering to get involved in various ways. On August 16th,

the Flandreau Flier Booster Club hosted it's inaugural Fall Sports Rally & Membership Drive and collected 104 Booster Club memberships (this includes both family and individual memberships). The turnout was amazing! Many families from the community gathered together in support of our athletes, coaches, and teams. Excitement is building around the Flandreau Flier Booster Club, as made evident by the great turnout at the event and the number of Booster Club memberships generated. The Booster Club has recently implemented a Remind system in which communication regarding sporting events and local happenings is sent out to those who have signed up. Furthermore, the Booster Club has an active social media presence to keep fans informed about upcoming events and opportunities to cheer on the Fliers! To fuel school pride, the Booster Club rented a "Welcome Flandreau Fliers" sign that was placed in front of the school for the first day of school. It was fun to see many pictures taken around the sign. By the time this material is shared with the school board, the Booster Club will have hosted a homecoming tailgating party too. Get ready, more plans are on the horizon for events to kick off our winter sports!

Booster Club members have spent time making numerous contacts and have had great conversations with businesses and individuals who are excited to support the video board project. Currently we have 19 of the 20 advertising partners secured for a dollar amount of \$58,000 pledged per year for 5 years, or a total of \$290,000. Payments from the advertising partners will be collected beginning on August 1, 2023. In the meantime, we are asking for the school's help in making the purchase so we can move forward with installation. The numbers are outlined in the contract below.

The Booster Club proposes that the school purchases the boards directly from Daktronics, saving the Booster Club \$14,073.54 in taxes. The Booster Club would then reimburse Flandreau Public School the entire amount paid for the 2 videoboards over the course of 5 years. This is a great opportunity for a partnership between the school and the Booster Club. The Booster Club has gone to the effort of securing sponsors for the video boards and working through the details with Daktronics and an electrician so the school, in turn, can benefit from using these video boards throughout the entire school year and beyond!

The Organization hereby executes an agreement for the indirect purchase of two (2) video boards from Daktronics.

I. The School

- A. The School agrees to purchase the two video boards from Daktronics in the amount of the submitted bid from Daktronics of \$224,826.08. Payment schedule would be as follows:
 - 1. 30% downpayment (\$67,447.83) to begin process
 - 2. 60% due before shipment of the videoboards (\$134,895.64)
 - 3. 10% due 30 days after shipment of the videoboards (\$22,482.61)
- B. The School agrees to pay for the cost of electricity to run the video boards on a daily basis.
- C. The School agrees to provide instructor(s) to teach the curriculum provided by Daktronics.
- D. The School agrees to provide IT support for the video boards and will manage the video board content.
- E. The School agrees to set up the equipment necessary to run the video boards and score boards on game days.

II. The Booster Club

A. The Booster Club agrees to repay the School on the following schedule:

5.	August 16, 2027	\$44,826.08

- B. The Booster Club agrees to pay for electrical work necessary for the installation of the video boards, estimated at \$13,855.00.
- C. The Booster Club agrees to pay for any maintenance of the video boards.
- D. The Booster Club agrees to pay for any software updates related to the video boards.
- E. The Booster Club agrees to maintain and manage the contracts with the advertising sponsors.
- F. The Booster Club agrees to pay a stipend to the operator of the video board, amount to be determined.
- G. The Booster Club agrees to collect and receive all revenue from the advertising sponsors.
- H. The Booster Club agrees to support the school's athletic programs and facilities through the revenue generated from the video boards, with specifics to be worked out between the Booster Club and the School's Athletic Director.
