Why Focus on Behavior?


Poor Behavior in schools can be costly:

- Lost teaching time
- Property Damage
- Disrespect, discouragement, and frustration
- Low student & staff morale
- Lower academic outcomes
- Divisions between school and parents

Addressing behavioral issues and improving school climate should form the core of any school improvement plan.

What is the Purpose of PBIS?

The goal of PBIS is to provide the foundation for good education.

- Regain the teaching time currently spent managing misbehavior
- Maximize on task time and academic achievement for all students.
- Increase positive and civil social behavior.
- Increasing family engagement in schools.

Long Term Outcome of PBIS Includes:

- Enduring, positive changes in behavior.
- Reduction in the need for serious disciplinary measures such as suspension and expulsion.
- Increase graduation rates.
- Improvement of post- high school outcomes for all students, including those with challenging behavior and educational disabilities.

What Can You Do at Home to Help Your Child Demonstrate PAWS Behavior?

- Review PAWS expectations with your child. Everyday ask your child about his/her day at school.
- Make sure your child is ready every day.
- Ensure a good night's sleep.
- Provide a quiet time and space for your child to do homework nightly.
- Keep in touch with your child's teacher(s).
- Encourage your child to use appropriate language and tone.
- Practice positive phrases with your child, such as, "Thank you," "Excuse me," "Please," and "I'm sorry."
- Be a visible part of your child's school day.
- Attend PTO meetings, Parent Teacher Conferences, and other school activities as your schedule allows.
