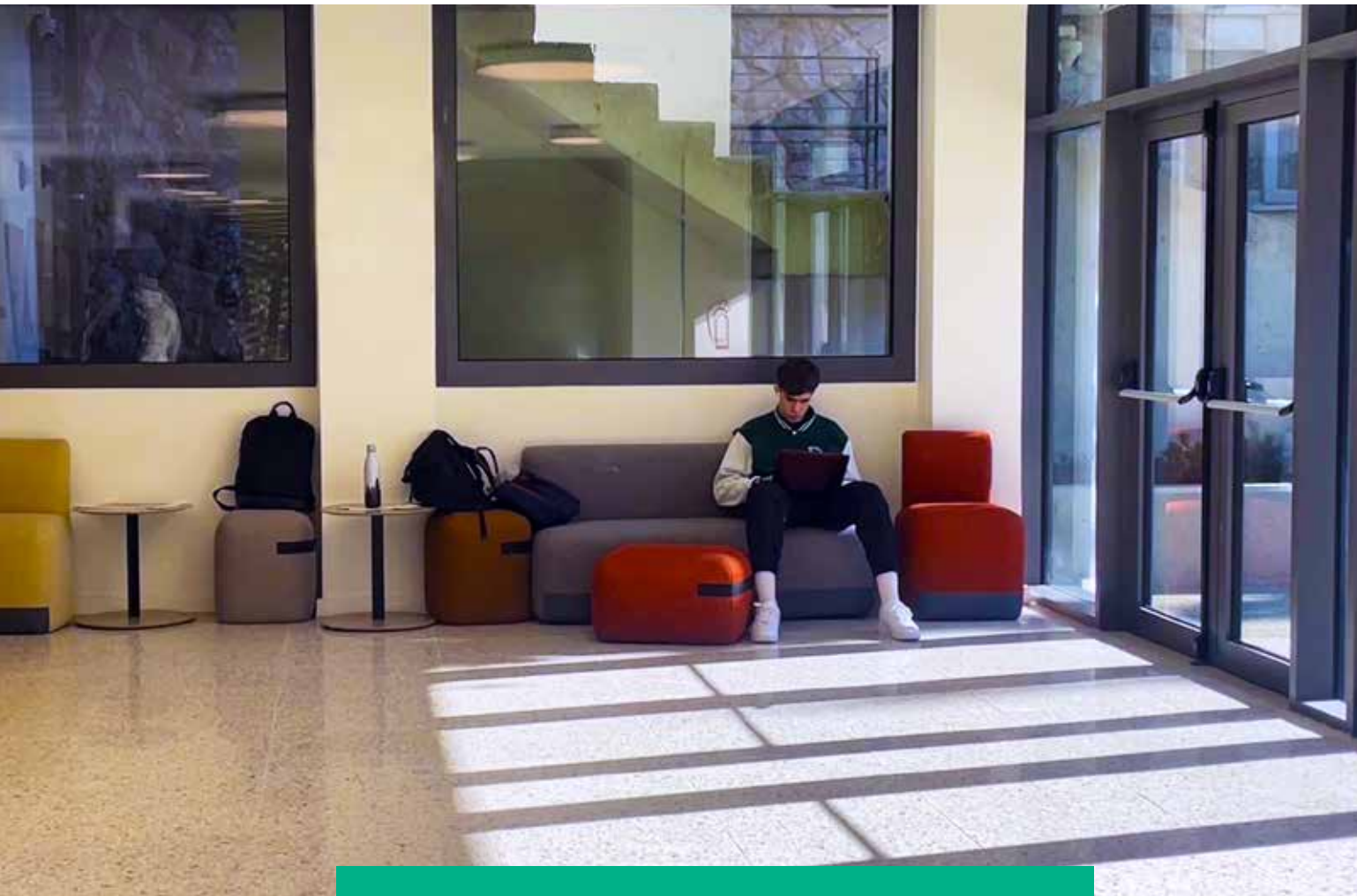
What is the IB Diploma Programme

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme - IBDP is an increasingly popular international qualification for secondary education, currently taught to more than 180,000 students every year, in 3,189 schools and in 149 countries. It is one of the three educational programmes designed and supervised by the International Baccalaureate Organisation (IB), a non-profit educational institution based in Geneva, Switzerland. The IB Diploma is a two-year course for 16-19 year-olds in 11th and 12th grades. At our school it is taught entirely in English. The IBDP is offered only by those schools that comply with the strict academic requirements stipulated by the IB.

The IBDP is an academically challenging, rigorously assessed and balanced educational programme, incorporating successful 21st century teaching strategies and designed to prepare students for effective participation in a rapidly evolving and increasingly global society. Its flexibility allows for adaptation to the diverse needs and personal interests of each student. The IBDP is an alternative option for study in the 11th and 12th grade: students may transfer to the IBDP upon completion of 10th grade (1st grade Lykeio) in a Greek or foreign school.

Successful completion of the IBDP leads to the award of the "IB Diploma", a widely recognised and well-appreciated qualification for university entry in most countries around the world.

The Greek government has recognized the International Baccalaureate Diploma and by law (2327/95, 2817/00) has granted its equivalence to that of a Greek Lykeio Diploma ("Apolytirio"), provided that students meet specified expectations related to Greek Language, Literature and History. This allows IBDP students, if they wish to do so, to sit for the Greek Panhellenic examinations and be eligible for entry to Greek universities, one year after their graduation from the IBDP.



IBDP graduates possess much more than content based knowledge. They are well trained in managing their study time, in critically evaluating and handling information, in research skills, and in essay writing and presentation skills.

Suitability to study in the IBDP

The IBDP at Anatolia and Pinewood is open to students of all nationalities provided they have an adequate command of the English language (at least “advanced” level), satisfactory academic scores in 9th and 10th grades and can demonstrate they are motivated and ready to adopt the work habits suitable for the demands of the IB curriculum. The Diploma programme aims to develop inquiring, knowledgeable and caring young people, who are “lifelong learners” and help create a better world, and “who understand that other people, with their differences, can also be right.” *(Adapted from the IB Mission statement)*

A student applying for enrolment in the IBDP accepts the IB philosophy as described in the IB mission statement, is eager to strive to develop the IB Learner attributes and able to adjust their approach to learning to suit IBDP objectives.

Why choose to study the IB Diploma Program?

The IBDP offers a wide variety of subjects, many of which may not be available in other academic programmes, is flexible and can be tailored to the academic and career interests of individual students. Students create their own curriculum, selecting courses from 6 subject groups. They also select the breadth and depth in which they wish to study each course (Higher or Standard Level).

The result is a programme of study that is truly personalized, well balanced across different disciplines, and which should include 3 subjects at Higher Level and another 3 subjects at Standard Level. At the same time, since the IBDP curriculum structure is common worldwide, internationally mobile students may transfer from one IB school to another without major disruption.

World-wide university recognition of the IB Diploma as a rigorous and balanced programme of study means that IBDP students hold an advantage when applying to universities. In addition, they prepare for university study in the best possible way: IBDP graduates possess much more than content based knowledge. They are well trained in managing their study time, in critically evaluating and handling information, in research skills, and in essay writing and presentation skills.



Why the Anatolia & Pinewood IBDP?

As core values, Anatolia and Pinewood aspire to cultivate in students the intrinsic drive and essential qualities required to evolve into principled and responsible global citizens. Moreover, our shared mission is to nurture them as active, critical thinkers, and open-minded lifelong learners.

Founded in 1886, Anatolia has long been considered one of the most distinguished educational institutions in Greece. Simultaneously, Pinewood, established in 1950, has successfully served the international community in northern Greece for three-quarters of a century. Authorized to offer the IBDP since 1997 and 1999, respectively, each school has extensive experience in IBDP program delivery, expert support for academic and university counseling, and current initiatives to promote student wellbeing.

Anatolia & Pinewood are the only schools in Northern Greece authorised by the IB to offer the Diploma Program.

Our Shared Vision

Separate SL and HL Classes: Recognizing the importance of personalized attention, our schedule is built around separate Standard Level (SL) and Higher Level (HL) classes in numerous subjects. This approach allows for tailored instruction to address the specific needs of each level.

Expanded Subject Offerings: In our unified program, a broader range of subjects is offered, providing students with additional course options to align with their academic interests. This also includes more secure offerings for traditionally low enrollment courses.

Small Class Sizes: A maximum of 15 students per class ensures that appropriate teaching and learning strategies can be effectively developed.

Scholarships: The school's scholarship program (average of more than €200.000 for DP students) ensures that worthy Greek and international students, regardless of financial circumstance, may enrol in the Anatolia & Pinewood IBDP, either as day students or in our long-standing boarding school.

Through all of their activities within the IBDP, students endeavour to develop the IB Learner Profile attributes. IB learners strive to be:

Inquirers We nurture our curiosity, developing skills for inquiry and research. We know how to learn independently and with others. We learn with enthusiasm and sustain our love of learning throughout life.

Knowledgeable We develop and use conceptual understanding, exploring knowledge across a range of disciplines. We engage with issues and ideas that have local and global significance.

Thinkers We use critical and creative thinking skills to analyse and take responsible action on complex problems. We exercise initiative in making reasoned, ethical decisions.

Communicators We express ourselves confidently and creatively in more than one language and in many ways. We collaborate effectively, listening carefully to the perspectives of other individuals and groups.

Principled We act with integrity and honesty, with a strong sense of fairness and justice, and with respect for the dignity and rights of people everywhere. We take responsibility for our actions and their consequences.

Open-minded We critically appreciate our own cultures and personal histories, as well as the values and traditions of others. We seek and evaluate a range of points of view, and we are willing to grow from the experience.

Caring We show empathy, compassion and respect. We have a commitment to service, and we act to make a positive difference in the lives of others and in the world around us.

Risk-takers We approach uncertainty with forethought and determination; we work independently and cooperatively to explore new ideas and innovative strategies. We are resourceful and resilient in the face of challenges and change.

Balanced We understand the importance of balancing different aspects of our lives – intellectual, physical and emotional – to achieve wellbeing for ourselves and others. We recognise our interdependence with other people and with the world in which we live.

Reflective We thoughtfully consider the world and our own ideas and experience. We work to understand our strengths and weaknesses in order to support our learning and personal development.

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Curriculum Structure



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The Diploma Programme model is represented as a circular shape, divided into concentric parts, highlighting the interconnectedness of the different elements.

The diploma structure moves progressively outward from the IB Learner Profile and Approaches to Teaching and Learning at the heart of the Programme, to the core requirements of the Extended Essay, Theory of Knowledge and Creativity, Action, Service (CAS) that are surrounded by six academic areas, all of which are encircled by the key IB philosophy of

International Mindedness. All IBDP students have to fulfill the core requirements and choose to study one subject from each of the six subject groups. It is not compulsory to choose a subject from the 6th group (The Arts) which may be replaced by a subject from groups 1-4. At least three subjects have to be taken at higher level (a minimum of 240 teaching hours) and the others at standard level (a minimum of 150 teaching hours).

To be eligible for the IB Diploma every student must fulfill three core requirements:

Theory of Knowledge, Extended Essay and CAS.

1. Theory of Knowledge (TOK)

Theory of Knowledge is a two-hour per week course in which students are encouraged to critically evaluate the process of acquiring knowledge from different perspectives. Beginning with the key question, "How do I know?", the course aims at helping students become familiar with the problems associated with the construction, validation and advancement of knowledge, along with the value systems that we employ when making knowledge claims. At the same time it aims to develop each student's ability to view knowledge claims critically and to compose effective arguments.

2. The Extended Essay (EE)

The Extended Essay serves as a crucial part of a student's exposure to an essential aspect of academic life: research. Each student undertakes a 4000-word essay in the discipline of his/her choice before the end of the first year in the IB Programme, brings it to completion by the middle of the second year and presents their work to a group of IBDP faculty. The essay is accompanied by the student's reflections on the process followed. Depending on the subject chosen, the student is assigned a particular teacher as supervisor.

3. The Creativity Activity Service Programme (CAS)

In addition to their academic duties, students need to participate, for at least two hours a week, in activities which contribute to the development of their personality and interests. These fall under three categories:

- Creativity usually stands for involvement in artistic expression
- Activity stands for sports, expeditions, local or international projects
- Service encompasses community and social service activities

With the help of the CAS supervisor appointed by the school, students are expected to devise a Programme of activities customized to their interests and get actively involved in them. They also collaborate with classmates to investigate, act and reflect upon a longer term CAS project. Part of the CAS Programme may be satisfied by participation in the school's extracurricular Programme. Students must have completed their CAS obligations in order to be eligible for the IB Diploma.



Choice of subjects

The IBDP, in addition to the core requirements, comprises six subject groups. Most subjects are offered at two different levels, Higher Level (HL) and Standard Level (SL). A subject taken at Higher Level would involve more teaching hours, extended curriculum and more rigorous assessment compared to the same subject taken at Standard Level.

Students study six subjects, choosing one subject from each of Groups 1-5; their sixth subject may be chosen from Group 6 or any other subject group. Students who choose to study two Language "A" courses from Group 1 are not obliged to also select a Group 2 subject. Three subjects must be at Higher Level and three at Standard Level. Their selection of subjects should be based on their interests, their aptitude and the requirements of universities they intend to apply to.

Students and their legal guardians are strongly advised to discuss subject choices with IBDP administrators before making their final decisions.

When choosing language courses (groups 1 and 2) the school plays a central role guiding students towards selecting a course that is suitably challenging for them.

The school reserves the right to withdraw any of the subjects listed or to offer more subjects depending upon demand. If fewer than 7 students enrol in a particular subject, the school will notify parents and may withdraw the subject or charge additional fees.

Group 1: Studies in Language and Literature

The courses in this group are based upon the advanced study of both literary and non-literary texts in the language that each student is most proficient in (for most students this is either English or Greek and often a combination of both. If both Greek and English “A” are chosen, the student does not have to study a Group 2 subject). A student whose native language is neither Greek nor English may still study “Language A – Literature” as a “Self Taught - School Supported” candidate.

Group 2: Language Acquisition

All Diploma candidates have to take a second modern language at a level which, depending on their previous exposure to that language, may be either Language A from group 1 (if they are highly competent), Language B (if they have some previous experience in the language), or Ab Initio (if they are beginners).

Group 3: Individuals and Societies

Students should choose a Group 3 subject based on their interests, their aptitude and the requirements of universities they intend to apply to. Environmental Systems and Societies may be taken either as a Group 3 or as a Group 4 subject.

Group 4: Sciences

Students should choose a Group 4 subject based on their interests, their aptitude and the requirements of universities they intend to apply to. Environmental Systems and Societies may be taken either as a Group 4 or as a Group 3 subject. The IB recognises that few universities may require three science subjects and allows this option if the student demonstrates the corresponding university requirement.

Group 5: Mathematics

Students choose the level (Higher or Standard) at which they wish to study mathematics. Candidates asking to take HL Mathematics will have to pass a placement test administered by the school in June. At Standard Level, they also choose between two available “strands” (Applications and Interpretation or Analysis and Approaches). The choice should be made based on their interests, aptitude and requirements of universities they intend to apply to.

Group 6: Arts and Electives

It is not compulsory to choose a Group 6 subject. Students may either choose an Arts course or select any additional subject from Groups 1, 2, 3 or 4. Students with a special interest in the Arts may study two subjects from this group combined with “Environmental Systems and Societies” as their group 3 and group 4 subject

Assessment in the IBDP

Assessment in the IBDP is “criterion-referenced”. Students are assessed on the basis of their ability to demonstrate knowledge and understanding, analysis and application, evaluative and synthetic abilities, and the use of subject-specific skills and techniques. A wide range of assessment tools are used including, but not limited to, oral and written examinations, experimental or mathematical investigations, research projects, self-evaluation, oral commentaries, and written assignments. The focus on assessing skills rather than content learnt and the use of a variety of assessment tools ensures a more holistic approach to assessment.

The IBDP uses a grading scale of 1-7. (7=Excellent, 6=Very Good, 5=Good, 4=Satisfactory, 3=Mediocre, 2=Poor, 1=Very poor, N=Grade not awarded)

Up to 3 additional points can be awarded on the basis of students’ achievement level in the core requirements (combination of grades in TOK and EE). The maximum possible IB Diploma score is thus 45 points, while the minimum passing requirement is 24 points. The IBO stipulates other “conditions” for eligibility to pass the IB Diploma. These conditions are outlined in the school’s “Handbook of Procedures” and include completion of the CAS requirement.

Academic Integrity

Anatolia & Pinewood IBDP endorses an Academic Integrity Programme which is essentially positive, humanistic and proactive, while at the same time informative regarding what constitutes academic misconduct and its consequences. A proactive and humanistic approach is one which gives emphasis to cultivating and nurturing on an on-going basis positive human qualities which are linked to integrity as an overall quality of character. These include self-respect and self-confidence; trust, honesty, respect, sincerity in one’s dealings with others; responsibility as a member of a community (in this case a learning community) to the well-being of that community. Members of an IB community need to be clear and on a common wavelength about what constitutes academic misconduct and what procedures are in place for handling breaches of Academic Integrity when they occur.

University Recognition

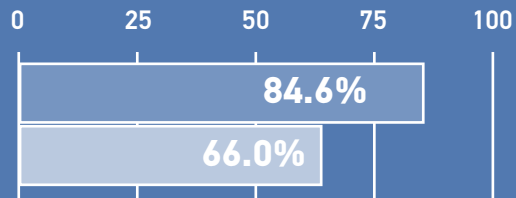
The IBDP is well known, widely recognized and highly valued by universities all over the world as an honors programme. Holders of the IB Diploma gain admission to the best colleges and universities. Anatolia & Pinewood have a history of placing some of its best students at top universities abroad, in the U.S., Canada, the UK, and EU countries.

Most distinguished universities consider the IB Diploma to be a strong credential for admission due to the programme's academic rigour, focus on development of key life skills and balance across disciplines.

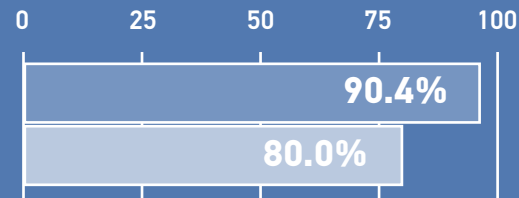
For this reason, acceptance rates for IB Diploma graduates tend to be higher than those of students holding other high school diplomas.

IB Diploma graduates may receive credit from US Universities, in recognition of the knowledge and skills gained in IB Higher Level courses. This enables students to either graduate sooner, reducing the overall tuition costs; or to explore more university courses either in their chosen field of study or in pursuit of diverse fields (*double majors/minors*).

○ DP students ○ US National Average 2013

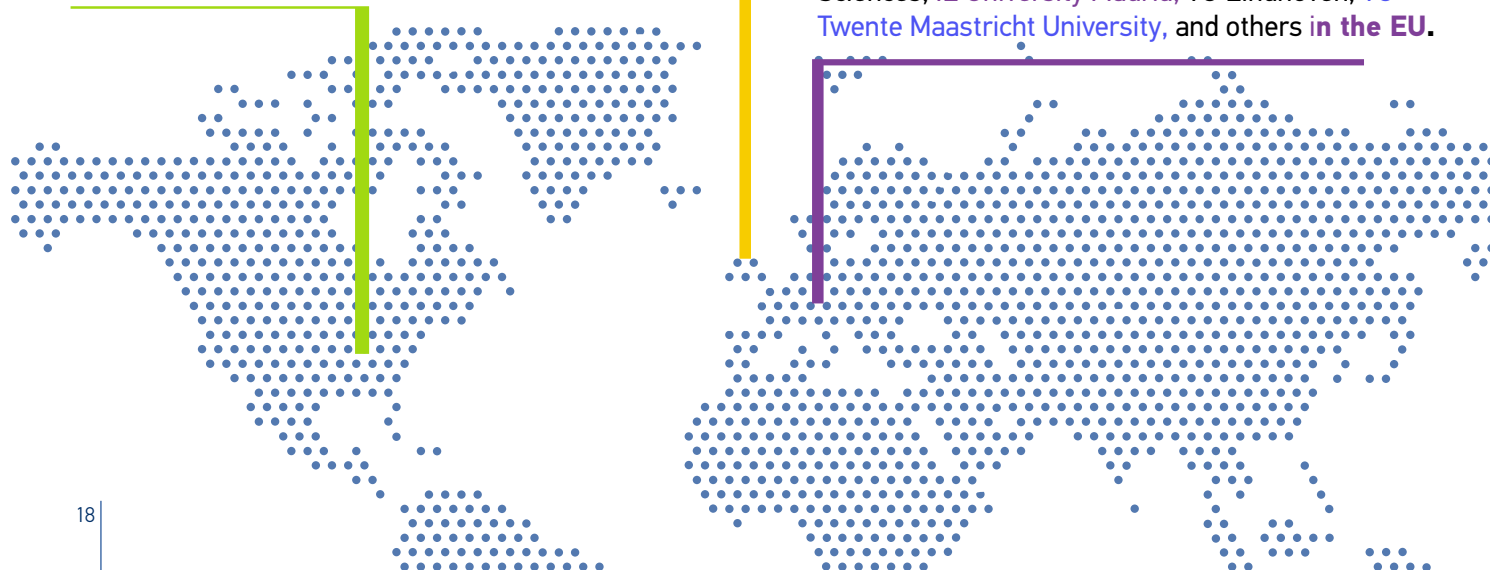

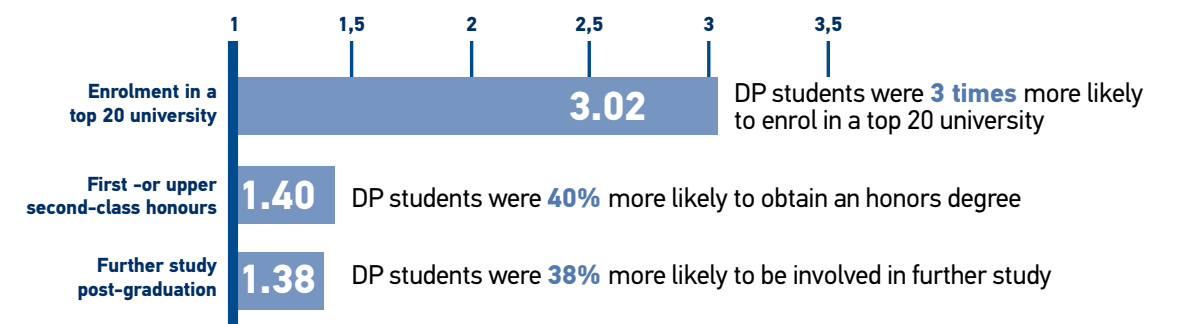
Anatolia & Pinewood IBDP students benefit from the guidance of highly experienced university advisors from within our institution, experts with extensive knowledge in university application preparation. Leveraging their expertise, our university advisors provide individualized support for students throughout the application process.

In the UK and the rest of Europe the IB Diploma is usually accepted on its own for university entry without need for further English language proficiency tests. Most universities make conditional offers specifying grades to be achieved and/or subjects to be taken.

Some universities in Europe (France, Germany) may request a language test if the student applies for a course taught in the local language.

As shown in the chart, “DP students were 3 times more likely to enrol in a top 20 university in the UK compared to matched A-Level students”.

In the UK, DP students were more likely to achieve many positive **higher education outcomes** compared to matched A level students

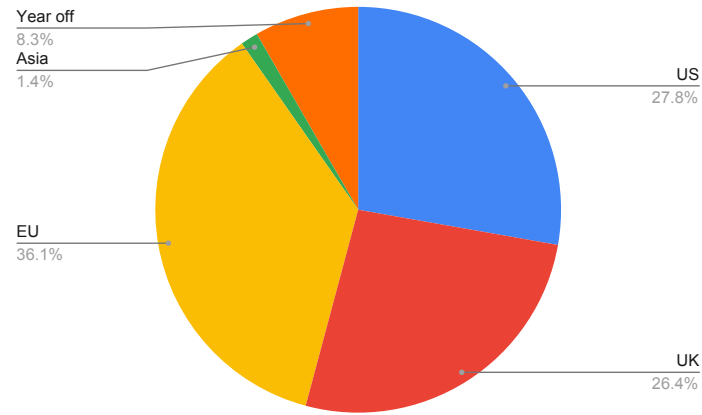

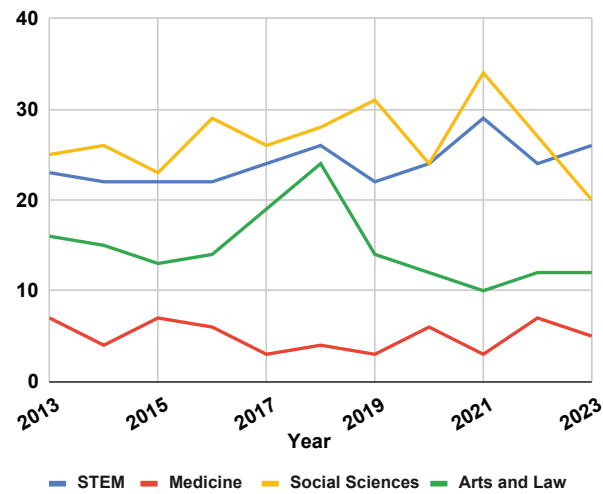

University Placement

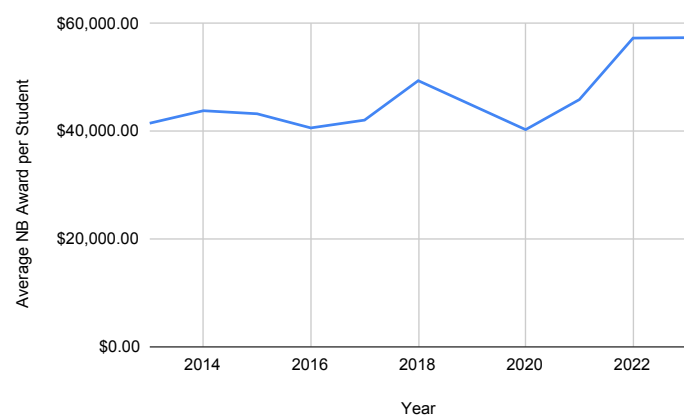
2023 - % of students matriculating to each region

Need-based financial awards at US universities



Our school's IBDP graduates attend universities in various countries although the majority choose to study at universities in the US, the UK or the EU.

They have chosen to study a variety of scientific fields, based on their interests.

Consistently, over more than eleven years, 100% of the school's IBDP students have had their financial need met at their top three schools. In the period from 2013-2023, the total sum of need-based aid at US higher education institutions across all four years for 161 students requesting need-based aid is \$30,246,372, averaging \$7,561,593 total aid per year. Last year, in 2023, 16 IB students received need-based aid to US colleges and universities, averaging \$57,286.25 per student annually.

Tuition fees in foreign universities

Tuition costs at US universities and colleges can range from \$50,000 to \$65,000 annually. Colleges and universities in the US draw a distinction between need-based and merit-based financial aid.

Merit-based aid is grant aid based on the overall strength of a student's application, taking into consideration their academic prowess and extracurricular achievements.

Need-based aid is granted based on an applicant's level of financial need, according to their family's financial profile. Need-based aid is determined by the estimated financial contribution declared by the student's family. After review of the family's financial documents (taxed and untaxed income, assets, benefits, etc.) need-based aid is allocated accordingly.

Anatolia & Pinewood IBDP university advisors work alongside students and families to complete all financial aid applications accordingly.

Most universities in the UK charge fees ranging from £11,400 to £38,000. At present, EU students are considered to be international students. The average cost of tuition is estimated to be around £22,200 per year. Typically, undergraduate degree courses in England, Wales, and Northern Ireland last for three or four years in Scotland. Several UK universities are beginning to offer a variety of financial assistance ranging from discounts for EU students to bursaries or scholarships. The latter are sometimes exclusively for students studying the IBDP.

Many public Dutch universities charge a statutory fee of EUR 2,314 annually.

Public French, German, and Italian universities offer undergraduate courses in English and in the local language and charge a relatively low registration fee. Tuition fees may vary based on the country, the university, and the course offered.
