





THE 5 P'S



PUNCTUAL

- Lateness leads to lost learning.
- Punctuality is expected. Be on time to every lesson.
- Arriving repeatedly late to lessons or study slots, not only compromises your own learning but also that of others in the class.
- Please refer to the separate whole school policies and Sixth Form contract for further information

PRESENT

- Attendance to lessons is fundamental to success in the Sixth Form and is compulsory.
- Students must make every effort to attend all timetabled subject lessons.
- Compulsory attendance also includes tutor time, societies, Character Education, assemblies, and all timetabled study periods in the Sixth Form study room.
- Aim to be in college every day, we need strong attendance and commitment to learning.
- If you cannot make it into Sixth Form, for example through illness, a parent/carer must phone in and report absence to the school telephone line or via the Sixth Form Team as early as possible.
- It is the responsibility of the student to catch up on missed work if absent.
- If you have an appointment booked which cannot take place outside of school hours, a note or evidence must be provided.
- It is important to limit the hours worked part time outside of Sixth Form to a reasonable level that doesn't restrict progress in your Year 12 and 13 studies.

PROFESSIONAL

- Be polite.
- Treat everyone with respect and maintain a professional level of conduct within the school.
- Sixth Form students must be aware of their duty as role models and image portrayed to younger students in and outside of school.
- We expect you to set a strong example in terms of getting involved, behaviour and attitudes to the school as a whole. We expect exemplary behaviour from our Sixth Form Students.
- We do not allow smoking or vaping in or near the school grounds.
- Professional and smart dress code is required at all times.
 Lanyards must be worn for safeguarding.
- We have the rights to sanction or ask students to go home if they do not adhere to the dress code or professional standards of behaviour as expected.

PROACTIVE BE

- Use your time for independent study effectively. Ensure you are organised and plan study time.
- With the greater freedom awarded in the Sixth Form comes a greater sense of responsibility and ownership for learning. Being proactive and having self-discipline will be important to managing your studies.
- Students are expected to work to the best of their ability and follow guidance of teachers.
- Students have opted for the subjects they are studying so must complete all classwork and home learning set. Seek guidance if needed.
- Attend extra opportunities of revision and intervention sessions.
- Be equipped with class resources, subject specifications, textbooks and create revision materials.
- A minimum of 5 hours private study per subject, per week.
- Also consider what is your vision for the future and A Level success?
 Support material available.
- Check the systems and habits you have in place for learning. Support material available.
- Practice. Complete past papers and dedicate plenty of time to consolidation and revision.

POSITIVE with your attitude and effort

- Approach your Sixth Form A Level journey with a positive attitude and showing consistent effort.
- Learn from your mistakes, move forward. Reflect on feedback.
- Be willing to try something new if needed.
- Participate in any additional opportunities provided to best support your learning and progress.
- Sixth Form students are expected to behave in a manner that prioritises their learning above all other distractions.
- Whilst mobile phones can be useful for checking home learning and internet searching, but use appropriately. See the mobile phone policy.

Sixth Form Expectations

STUDY ROOM



We aim to provide you with a learning environment that positively contributes to everyone's ability to study. Therefore, when using the Sixth Form study room, we expect you to be considerate to others and ask for your co-operation in upholding the following expectations.

NOISE LEVELS

The Sixth Form Study room will have allocated periods which will be designated to two types of noise zones, "Silent" and "Quiet" study periods.

- When arriving, we ask that you please pay attention to what level of noise is permitted for the allocated period. Adhere to the noise 'zone' expected levels of interaction. This is to maintain an environment conductive to intensive study and ensure students are aware of their conduct while here.
- Please treat the Sixth Form study room space as a "Silent" Study zone, unless otherwise signposted.
 This includes when entering and exiting the room to 'sign in and out' for safeguarding.
- On occasion, we may adjust and alter the noise zoning provision from time to time to accommodate the needs of students, e.g. there will be more dedicated "Silent Study" time during exam season
- Use laptops and mobile phones with consideration (headphones to be worn and sound must be inaudible to those nearby). Refer to the mobile phone usage poster for more information.

"SILENT STUDY" ZONE

- Adhere to the "Silent" study expectation throughout the duration of period 1 & 2 daily.
- Please respect the direct instruction of the Sixth Form Learning Mentors and students who have chosen this allocated time slot to enhance everyone's learning experience.
- The noise volume is to be silent. No conversations.
 Studying with no disturbance.
- Encourage yourself to put your mobile phone away, "out of sight, out of mind" to avoid distractions. Devices set to silent.
- Ideal for working alone. Revise in silence, consolidation time and researching.
- Independent and focussed study time with no interruptions.



"QUIET STUDY" ZONE

- Adhere to the "Quiet" study zone after breaktime.
 Period 3, 4 & 5 daily. Also expected during afterschool study unless otherwise stated.
- Studying with minimal disturbance. Ideal for individual, quiet study alone or alongside others.
- The use of mobile phones is allowed for study purposes and if inaudible to others.
- Conversation is acceptable between pairs and small groups but please keep conversation noise levels low volume, 'quiet' and to a minimum. Conversations about work.
- Ideal for retrieval practice to test each other.
- Be considerate to others who may still wish to work silently.

If you need help encouraging a peer to comply, please tell your Learning Mentors. Talk to your Learning Mentors should you require any other support with your learning.



*Note: The Sixth Form Learning Mentors, Heads of Year and Head of Sixth Form may remind you of these expectations if we see that you are not using the space appropriately. Failure to adhere to the Sixth Form study room code of conduct and expectations may result in warnings, sanctions, removal, and/or further disciplinary action







SOCIAL AREA EXPECTATIONS

- Follow staff instructions first time, every time.
- Only the allocated year group may use the social area.
- Sit on chairs, not tables.
- When the social base is full, please use the canteen, space outside or the hall.
- Food and drinks are allowed in the Sixth Form social space, the canteen, hall and outside space as per the whole school
 rules. No eating and drinking allowed in the Sixth Form study room, on corridors or adjacent classrooms so please finish
 here first.
- Put any litter in the bin and straighten chairs and tables before leaving.
- Move promptly out of corridors.
- Use toilets in your allocated block.
- No posters or flyers to be put onto the walls unless approved by the Head of Sixth Form or Heads of Year.







Sixth Form Dress Code



We expect students to adhere to the smart, professional dress code within Southam College Sixth Form. All students are required to wear a skirt/dress/trousers and shirt & tie/blouse/formal top, as well as smart shoes. For safeguarding, it is compulsory for students to wear a lanyard.

Further details on appropriate items follows:

Trouser

Suit type trouser. Subtle sober patterns allowed such as pinstripe. Tailored fit acceptable.

Belts should be one colour (Dark grey/dark brown or tan/black).

Not allowed: Denim/chinos/leggings/skin tight trousers/Shorts.

Skirts & Dresses

Formal, tailored suit type skirts and dresses, including pencil skirts. Sober colour/patterns e.g. pinstripe. Skirt/dress must be no more than 10cm above the knee.

Not allowed: Items that are excessively short, Denim. Low neckline/Strappy dresses /Play suits/Jump suits.

Shirt/Blouse/Formal Top

A shirt and tie or blouse or smart work style top that covers the shoulders.

Formal lightweight knitted jumper or cardigan over shirt/blouse.

Sober colour/subtle patterns.

Short Sleeves are permitted.

Jackets are optional.

Not allowed: T shirts/polo shirt/sports shirts/military style shirts/lumberjack shirts/strappy tops/cropped tops/halter neck tops/off the shoulder tops/sweatshirts with sport logos.

Shoes

Formal/smart. Must be of leather or suede material/look.

Smart boots of a sober colour are permitted.

Heels permitted on shoes and boots if of a suitable height.

Smart 'ballet' pumps are allowed.

Smart boots of a sober colour are permitted.

Not allowed: Walking boots/Biker boots/trainers/flip flops/canvas shoes/canvas pumps/ converse style'.

Other Aspects

Tights should be one sombre colour without pattern.

No hats, caps or headgear of any kind to be worn in school.

Hair colour to be one natural colour - see your HOY before you dye your hair.

No Hoodies/sweatshirts are permitted.

All items of dress, including outdoor coats, should be clean, and should not be adorned with slogans or in any other way be likely to cause offence.

No visible body piercing other than to the ears, or one single small nose stud. No visible tattoos. Any jewellery worn should be reasonably small and not excessive in quantity. Entirely clear plastic retainers are permitted for piercings that are not in ears or single nose stud.

We are respectful of religious attire that students wish to wear.

Within this dress code the school reserves the right to determine if an article of student dress is acceptable to be worn.

Consequences for not adhering to the dress code: Tutor monitoring and verbal warning > A warning issued via breaktime on Class Charts > Letter sent home and Dress Code Report for a week > Last warning letter given > Remain in Sixth Form Area > Parent/Carer Meeting and required to go home to address dress code.

Clear and obvious disregard for the dress code will result in immediate isolation in the Sixth Form Area.




