11th-grade Independent Reading Project


Book Sampling Zoom Activity

As a child growing up in the 70s and 80s on the Upper West Side, Patterson learns from her parents to celebrate her blackness and never hide from her identity. She gets guidance from generations of female activists on her mother's side, who inspire her to fight for acceptance and equality. It comes as no surprise that when her three-year-old daughter, Penelope, reveals that she is a boy, she embraces her child fully and does whatever she can to nurture his spirit. A beautifully written memoir that highlights the power of love.

He disagrees with doctors who say he's on the autism spectrum, though, because he can look people in the eye and is able to occasionally empathize with those around him. To him, life is all about getting by and sticking to a routine. His normal schedule is thrown way off when Kit Lowell, who has recently suffered from a family tragedy, joins him at his solitary lunchroom table one day. The two enter into an unusual friendship in which each is able to uncover deep-seated aspects of their own personalities they had been ignoring. Charming, poignant, and page-turning!
