ATHLETICS

From an athletic standpoint, the Soo High School has had one of the most successful seasons in its history. The students, faculty and townspeople were very liberal with their support for all the athletic teams which were turned out by the school.

First came football, then interclass basket ball. Next came spring practice in baseball, then the interclass track and field meet and last the trip of the High School track team to Marquette to participate in the interscholastic championship track and field meet for the championship of the upper peninsula. We will take the different branches of athletics in the above order.

FOOTBALL IN 1912.

The football game got an early start last fall and was ready for work with other teams in the last week of September.

The first game played was with Munising High School on September 28. During the first few minutes of play the Munising crowd seemed to have things all their own way and scored two touchdowns and kicked goal successfully before the Soo boys knew what was going on. After a severe calling down between periods, the S. H. S. team woke up and did some playing. At the end of the game the score stood 37-14 in favor of the S. H. S.

One week later the S. H. S. team went up to Newberry to play our time honored enemies of the N. H. S. This time the team did not have strong lunged backers to root for them and in spite of the callings they received they were beaten by a score of 33-6.

On October 12 Newberry played the return game at the Soo. It was expected, from the remarks of the football team, that there would be some football played on that day. The S. H. S. team had been vowing vengeance all the week and now it was up to them to make good. They did. When time was called the score was 18—0 in favor of the Soo High School.

One week after the game with Newberry, the Cheboygan High School team came to the Soo to play. They came by boat, and, as the boat was very small and the waves very large, Cheboygan's warriors did not feel very well. The S. H. S. team went after them with great glee and before the referee could stop the game the score was 37—6 in favor of the S. H. S. team.

On October 25 the return game was played at Cheboygan. This time there was no sickness on either side, and it was an even chance. However, when the last whistle blew, the score was 13—0 in favor of the Soo High.







THE RIFLE CLUB

It is impossible for the careful observer to review the passing year of 1912-13 without noting the great advancement in the social activities and in the line of sport of the high school.

Perhaps the least considered and certainly the most important of these last is the Rifle club. Few outside of the members, realize its significance as a school organization. Few know that this organization is affiliated with the National Rifle Association, that the members of this club competed with, and defeated some of the leading high schools of the United States. On February 22, the rifle team defeated the team of the St. Louis Tech with a score of 894-762. On March 1 the Soo team defeated the Business High, Washington, D. C., team with a score of 898-797. Later the High School team defeated the teams representing Utica Free Academy and Tucson, (Ariz.) High, and, nearer home, the Osborn Rifle Club.

This organization gives the Soo High School a greater field of activity than it has had heretofore. It causes the school to be put before the eyes of some of the larger institutions of the country and to be observed outside of the county or the Upper Peninsula. It is true that a rifle match with Washington, Philadelphia or Springfield is not as exciting as a football game with Cheboygan or Newberry, but the results are equally important.

Considering the fact that this is a new movement, entirely different from former activities, it has been handled remarkably well, and has been fairly successful.

The club officers and instructors, especially Captain Patterson and President Walsh are extended the hearty thanks of the members of the club for their interest and work in placing this organization upon a par with those of the big high schools of the country.

THE CICERONIAN SOCIETY

The Ciceronian Society is a literary organization for Senior and Junior boys.

Its object is to train the members in public speaking and in parliamentary law. Meetings are held every two weeks in the school building at which a regular program is carried out. The program consists of a debate by six members, extemporaneous speeches, declamations and humorous speeches.

Officers are elected for a term of one month and nobody is eligible for re-election. This provision gives every member an opportunity to gain experience in conducting the meetings.

A committee selects the subjects for the program before the meeting at which it is given. This insures a thorough preparation and necessitates an exhaustive study of the current events.
