

From the Administrator's Desk

I am hoping that this article will be both informative and descriptive regarding the many projects that have occurred in the District over the past couple of months or will be occurring as you are reading this. I'm writing this article on October 20th knowing that it will not be seen until November due to the fact that the District Mirror is printed off site and requires a three-week turnaround time before it is returned to us to be sent out. In order to keep everything in order, I will attempt to break topics down into relevant groups.

Building and Grounds:

- The dust collection with the fire suppression system in the wood room is installed but needs to be energized to ensure that it operates according to the fire code. Once this is completed, all of the machines will be able to be used at the same time and the sawdust generated can be safely removed.
- Within the paint room, the heater, the tracks for the garage door, and the air intake all need to be moved to accommodate the re-design of the original plan. The ceiling in the room will also have to be blocked off where the overhead door used to pass through. This will seal the room and keep dust out and allow paint fumes to be safely removed from the room.
- We are waiting on a meat cooler and meat rail in the processing room in the agriculture area. We are being told that this will be here in November. This cooler will be used throughout the year as students have opportunities to process food and safely store in an onsite freezer.
- The greenhouse needs to have a heater installed and a couple of leaks and open cracks filled before snow flies.
 Again, this will be important as we utilize the warmth and sunshine during the colder months to germinate plants in anticipation of spring.
- To the west of the football field and baseball diamond you will see new block dugouts, a cement slab that will contain four batting cages separated by a storage building, a new announcers booth/concession stand directly behind the backstop, and a large storage building just off the end of the football field to be used for storage during the winter and summer months and coach/athlete access during the football, track, softball, and baseball seasons. The fence will also be re-routed to include the shed inside the confines of the field and the scoreboard will be moved to the north to accommodate access to the shed. All of this was made possible by a generous donation from Mandy and Jordan Zimmermann toward the athletic complex that exists as part of the baseball and football fields.

Curriculum:

Teaching staff, especially at the secondary school, are
working at identifying and sharing learning targets with
administrators. This is being done as a means of ensuring
that what we are expecting of students lines up with what
we say we are teaching and the state standards as related to
the curriculum.

Evaluation:

 When students left in the spring of 2020 due to the pandemic, teacher evaluation was put on hold. We are now back on schedule as we attempt to make up for the lost years as it relates to providing important feedback to staff regarding the delivery and assessment of the instructional program.

Strategic Plan:

• We are in the process of working with twenty-five community members to identify strengths and weaknesses of the School District of Auburndale and build goals that support what is deemed important to the district. This plan will allow the district to prioritize the items that need to be addressed in a timely fashion and develop strategies on how they can be supported. We thank the community members who were recommended for this committee and the work they did to identify and prioritize the goals. I look forward to sharing that plan with you in the next newsletter.

Staffing:

Within our regional educational area, we are one member of a 32 member consortium of schools. Of the 32 schools making up our CESA, we were only one of two who were able to put a teacher into every open position prior to the start of the school year. Staffing with qualified, certified teachers continues to be the biggest challenge administrators across the United States, Wisconsin, and locally face. I'm proud of the fact that we were one of the two rather than one of the thirty who were unable to fill every position and therefore had to cancel classes, programs, or fill courses using alternative (virtual) options. If you have a four-year degree or know someone who does and may be looking for a career change, I encourage you or them to contact the school. I would love to speak to anyone regarding a career in education and explain the certification process to those interested.

Services:

I want to take the opportunity to promote the availability of the high school building for those wanting to exercise by walking hallways or using either the weight room or cardio room. If you are interested in hearing more regarding the times and access to these areas, please call the high school office at 715-652-2115 to get more details.

Health Office News

Tips for the winter season.

Make sure your child is dressed for the weather. Frostnip occurs before frostbite. Frostnip affects the areas of the skin that are exposed to the cold air. These areas will look flushed or white and will become tingly and numb. Frostbite occurs next with the skin becoming red, bluish-white and waxy looking. This can occur to areas not exposed to the cold air as well. Frostbite can lead to more serious complications and requires immediate action.

Frostbite Prevention

- Watch the weather forecast and dress appropriately.
- Limit your time outdoors and take warming breaks as needed. Frostbite can happen in minutes.
- Keep moving, as exercise increases blood flow.
- Know the early warning signs
 - o Numbness or tingling
 - Red or pale skin

Frostbite Care

- Remove child from the cold and place in warm dry clothing if available. Be cautious of the affected area, do not rub, as rubbing could cause more damage. If feet are affected, carry the child.
- Take child to hospital or call 911.
- If warm water is available (NOT HOT) place the affected area in the water. You may place warm compresses to the area for 30 minutes. If warm water is not available place blankets around the affected area.
- If there is the risk of the area being frozen again, DO NOT thaw. This could cause more damage to the tissues.
- Do not disturb any blisters that have formed.

If frostbite is suspected please get your loved one emergency help as soon as possible.

Here at Auburndale Elementary the children do not go outside once the weather or wind chill temperature reaches 0 degrees.

Please remember to send warm winter clothing including: hat, mittens, boots, and jacket to play outside.
