From the Administrator's Desk

Strategic Plan Update

It is my pleasure to once again update you on the progress of various items identified in the District Strategic plan that we have been working on since it was adopted at the November school board meeting.

Student and Staff:

- We are in the process of finalizing a survey to give to students and staff regarding various culture, course, and learning/teaching strategies that are being utilized in our schools. It is our expectation that the information gathered will be shared with staff as we look to better meet the learning needs of our students. The final results will be shared with the board of education at the August board meeting.
- Principal's and teaching staff have been working together to ensure that evaluations are taking place in a timely, productive manner in such a way that constructive feedback and reflection become part of the evaluation cycle. We are fortunate to have teachers and administrators who participate in and see the value of this process.

Services:

- We are continuing to push out information regarding services available to community members, parents, and students needing resources during difficult times. This includes interpreters for non-English speaking parents/students, mental health services/support, collecting/distributing items through the CARE fund, supporting Helping Hands Daycare, increasing volunteer opportunities, and expanding our Personal Needs Program for students not having the basic essentials for comfortable living. If you feel you are in need of support or may need assistance, please contact the elementary or high school offices to get in contact with the person who can help you out.

Safety:

- We have completed active response drills and continue to review through monthly lockdown, evacuate, and "what if" discussions with staff and students to ensure that we are familiar with appropriate responses should we need to put them into place.

Technology:

- We have developed a survey and a form that identifies what technology needs our students are lacking in and what we can do to support their growth or completion of coursework beyond high school.

Community Relations:

- At this time we are reviewing the information, organization, and accuracy of what is listed on the school district website to ensure that it meets the needs of those looking for answers to questions they may have. It is our expectation that this will occur twice a year and create a more user friendly experience.
- We are also in the preliminary stages of creating an endowment fund that could be utilized to support students seeking financial assistance as they pursue post-secondary opportunities. Look for an update on this process in the June District Mirror.

Curriculum:

- Our teaching staff has spent hours documenting daily, weekly, and unit objectives for courses and subjects taught with the expectation that these can be aligned with state standards as we look to identify overlap and gaps in our curriculum. This will continue to be a point of emphasis as we move forward this year into next to ensure that our students are being held to a standard of learning that is measured and reported to the state.

Facilities:

- We are currently studying the utilization of space, classrooms, storage, and other areas in the elementary school to see if they can be arranged in such a way that increases the functionality of the building. We hope to have a plan in place with possible minor renovations and movement beginning this summer.
- We are excited to see the Jordan and Mandi Zimmerman project completed at the baseball and football fields with the erection of the shed, dugouts, and pressbox. Thank you to Jordan and Mandi for providing the generous donation to the athletic fields that will be utilized for years to come.

I will make an effort to provide more updates as they relate to the strategic plan in the next Mirror in June.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the qualified electors of School District of Auburndale, Wood, Marathon and Portage Counties, Wisconsin, that a referendum election will be held on Tuesday, the 4th day of April, 2023. The purpose of the referendum election is to submit the following question to a vote of the qualified electors of the School District:

“Shall the following resolution be approved?

RESOLUTION TO INCREASE REVENUE LIMITS

Be it resolved by the School Board of the School District of Auburndale, Wood, Marathon and Portage Counties, Wisconsin, that the school district be authorized to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes by \$600,000 per year for each of the 2023-2024 and 2024-2025 school years, for the non-recurring purpose of providing for the operational needs of the school district.”

A copy of the resolution directing submission of the question set forth above to the electorate and information regarding the School District boundaries may be obtained at the School District office located at 10564 School Avenue, Auburndale, Wisconsin.

Radon & Testing

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) is encouraging homeowners to test their homes for radon. Exposure to radon is the second-leading cause of lung cancer.

“Radon is an environmental health issue in our state. Approximately one in 10 homes have elevated radon levels across Wisconsin,” said Paula Tran, State Health Officer. “Reducing radon exposure and radon-induced lung cancer in Wisconsin depends on encouraging and supporting all Wisconsinites, including property owners and tenants, to be proactive about testing for radon.” Radon is a radioactive gas that is odorless and naturally present in the ground. Radon enters buildings through their foundations. Radon causes more lung cancer among non-smokers than secondhand tobacco smoke. “An estimated 21,000 lung cancer deaths per year among non-smokers are caused by radon, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Surgeon General, and approximately 962 of these deaths are in Wisconsin.”

Fortunately, lung cancer caused by radon is largely preventable. People should test their homes for radon. Both old and newer homes can be prone to radon. “Reduced-cost test kits are available through Radon Information Centers (RIC) in Wisconsin...” Test kits are also available from hardware stores and local public health agencies. If levels are elevated, a mitigation system should be installed to prevent the gas from entering the residence.

Referendum Information

At the January school board meeting, the board of education agreed to ask the residents of the School District of Auburndale permission to exceed the revenue limit by \$600,000 per year for the next two years in order to meet the operational needs of the school district.
