From the Administrator's Desk

I am hoping that this edition of the District Mirror is received with the warm and seasonal conditions that are occurring as I am writing this the last week of February. I will admit that the changing of seasons this year is one that I don't recall happening in my recent memory. No snow in January and February with temperatures in the 40's, 50's, and even 60's at times. For those accustomed to the brutality of central Wisconsin winters, this is something no one would have predicted.

In school, as spring begins, we use this time to begin preparing for the next school year with budget, staffing, programming, curriculum, and calendar discussions and decisions that have to be made. I want to explain a couple that were the topic of many discussions thus far.

In October and November, we looked at the possibility of expanding our 4K program from all day, 2 days/ week to full days, 5 days/week as most of our neighboring districts do or are currently expanding to next year. With the new legislation coming from the state surrounding the reading expectations of elementary students and studies done that correlate with higher achievement from everyday/all day 4K, we felt a need to inquire if the community would be in favor of this change. A survey was sent out to thirty eight families who have a child who will be eligible to attend 4K next year to determine if they would support a change from 2 days to 5 days/week for their child. Of the thirty eight surveys mailed, twenty were returned. From the surveys collected, twelve were in support of the 5 days/week change while eight preferred to keep it as it is currently being run. Eighteen surveys were never returned. Based upon this response, the School Board elected to not change anything this year but may revisit this again in the future as more information is collected. It is important

to recognize and acknowledge that we currently have 40 students signed up for Pre-K for next year which is the lowest number of students for any grade level in our district at this time. For comparison purposes, this year's Pre-K class which will be moving to kindergarten next year is 64 students.

One of the challenges of working in public education is having to balance what is best for the community and what is best for our students, staff, and employees. This was evidenced by our desire to change the school calendar for the 2024-2025 school year. Each year, every public school district in the state receives a school report card that measures student academic achievement, student growth, and other education program data collected each spring. This is then shared with the students, families, and community as a means of providing evidence that the local school system is meeting the educational standards as set forth by the state. Auburndale elementary and secondary schools consistently score in the "meets expectations" but trends have developed in math and reading that demonstrate that we have work to do at selected grade levels, within selected groups of students, and students having exceptional educational needs. In order to address these concerns, implement the new state required third grade reading promotion policy, and match our classroom learning targets with the Wisconsin state standards in all grade levels, we need to find time to do this. Since most, if not all, of this work requires collecting student learning data when students are present, this needs to be done while students and staff are in session. It was our intention to shorten one day of the week one hour to provide staff the opportunity to address student learning needs and align our curriculum with the state standards across all grade levels. Our current calendar or schedule does not have professional development or in-service days scheduled for this to happen outside of a day in October and another in November. We could have added more professional development/in-service days -continued on next page.

(cont.) during the year but this would move back the last day of school well into June which I think we all agree would not be best for anyone. Based upon the feedback and concerns expressed by the community and parents regarding the late start calendar, we returned to the normal starting and ending times that have been in place for years. Building administrators carved out a little time during our school day in each building to free up staff to meet to discuss the items mentioned, as well as, added some additional in-service time during the year. It is our hope that this time will allow us to meet the expectations and changes that the state has initiated and anticipates will occur. Very few people embrace change as a positive thing when it becomes an inconvenience. We understand that and are hopeful that we can adjust our staff schedules to meet the demands of the state without resulting in hardships for our families. Thank you for supporting, questioning, or seeking clarification regarding these matters and how they affect all of us.

The last thing I want to bring attention to is our facilities. In 1998, twenty six years ago, the residents of this community made a commitment to build and renovate the school buildings. In 1998, the three wings at the elementary school were added that currently house our Kindergarten through 5th Grade students. That year, the wrestling space, Tim Anderson Gymnasium, library, lobby, locker rooms, and the rubberized track were built. Like your homes, the life expectancy for the roofs, boilers, air handlers, and flooring is 25-30 years. Roofs are beginning to leak, flooring is wearing thin, and our buildings are not being as energy efficient as they were when everything was new 26 years ago. The asphalt base on the track is like any road surface in Wisconsin. The rubber surface that covers the asphalt is designed to last 8 -10 years. The original surface lasted from 1998 to 2011 (13 years) when it was replaced with the current rubberized surface (which is 13 years old). We have been very fortunate to have two rubberized coatings to last twenty-six years when realistically we should have had three or four in that expected time. The current surface is peeling, worn thin, has cracks, and has lost its elasticity and needs to be replaced soon in order to continue to host track meets on it. We have two science rooms in the high school built in the 60's that have the original flooring, pipes, furniture, and counters that are failing and need replacement. In 1998, the residents made commitment to build and renovate the aforementioned additions with the understanding that they would need attention and upkeep in the future. Over the next couple of years, the school will once again be asking the residents of the community to support these projects that the residents set in motion in 1998. I will be sharing more on these matters once the cost, timelines, and details are determined. As always, contact me with questions or concerns.

The Lumina Foundation's A Stronger Nation Report reported that 60 percent of our national workforce,

aged 25–64, will need a post-secondary credential by 2025 to meet the demands of industry and provide a stronger personal economic future. In response, the Wisconsin Technical Colleges, the UW System, and the Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and Universities created the 60 Forward Initiative, agreeing on the goal of increased postsecondary attainment of 60 percent by 2027. Currently, Wisconsin's post-secondary attainment rates vary by county but range from 24–62 percent.

Mid-State's partnerships with Auburndale High School help to support this important national initiative to increase our state's post-secondary attainment rate. The initiative will result in **increased earning potential and economic mobility** for students and a skilled workforce for Wisconsin's employers.

There are no drawbacks or cost for simply being admitted to Mid-State. Only the benefit of additional options and ease of entry should your child decide to enroll.

Even students who already have post-graduation plans will also be admitted providing seamless transfer back to the Mid-State district if their plans change. Our data indicates that just **over 50 percent of high school students attend a technical college 1–2 years after they graduate from high school,** and a large share of them start at a university and then transfer to a technical college.

How long have you worked in the School District of Auburndale: Since 1999




- Family: Wife Betty and two children, both Auburndale graduates, James ('05) and Katie ('07)
