MVP Race at an End: Did Nikola Jokic deserve a third time award?

After a historic 2023-2024 NBA season, the MVP award--which was up for debate the whole year on who it should go to was awarded to Nikola Jokić, commonly known as *Joker*. This is Joker's third time winning this award, putting him in an elite category as only the ninth player ever to do so. But did he deserve this award?

Before we dive into the other contenders let's give the Joker his flowers because he really did have a special season. Putting up averages of 26.4 points, 12.4 rebounds, and 9 assists a game while playing 79 games this year. His team also saw a lot of success this year having 57 wins to 25 losses. He was also a very efficient scorer shooting 58.3% from the field but his game still has weaknesses: most notably his lack of defense.


If this award didn't go to Jokić, who would it have gone to? Many players had historic seasons this year such as Giannis Antetokonumpo, Jayson Tatum, and Lebron James. But there were really only two players who challenged Jokić, this being Luka Dončić and Shai Gilgeous-Alexander.

Let's start with who I personally would have given the award to, Luka Dončić. Luka averaged 33.9 points, 9.2 rebounds, and 9.8 assists a game. Before this year no player has ever averaged even 31, 9, and 9 for a whole season. His 33.9 points per game were also enough to lead the league in scoring while his 9.8 assists a game was a close second.

Another all-time season came from Shai Gilgeous-Alexander. SGA became only the third guard ever, the other two being Micheal Jordan and Stephen Curry, to average over 30 points a game while shooting over 50%. While not only being great offensively, Shai also shines where the other two lack: defensively.

He led the NBA in steals while guarding often the opponent's best player. Not only were his stats, but he also led his team to the best record in the west, which the other two also play in, this was a huge jump from last year when his team finished with a losing record.

Regardless of who won I think as fans we can just appreciate how many all-time greats this generation of basketball has.


