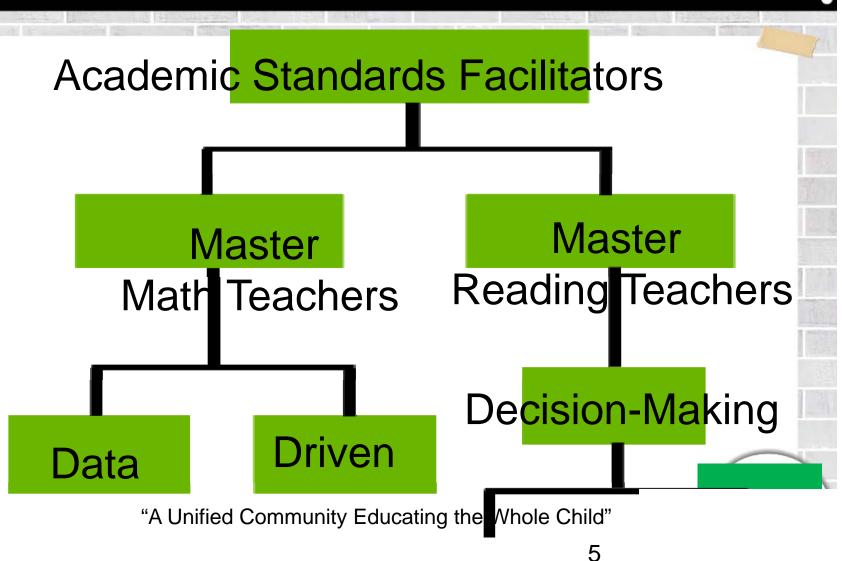


 Year 2 of Elementary Transitional Bilingual Program (K-2)

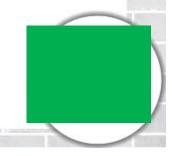

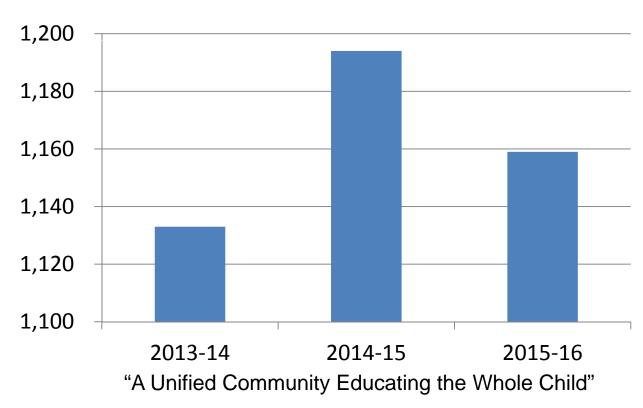

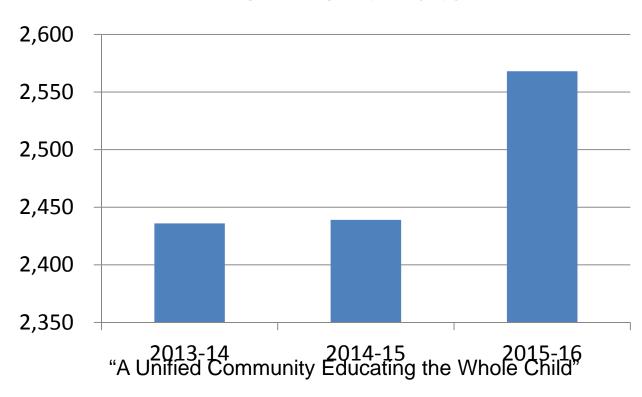

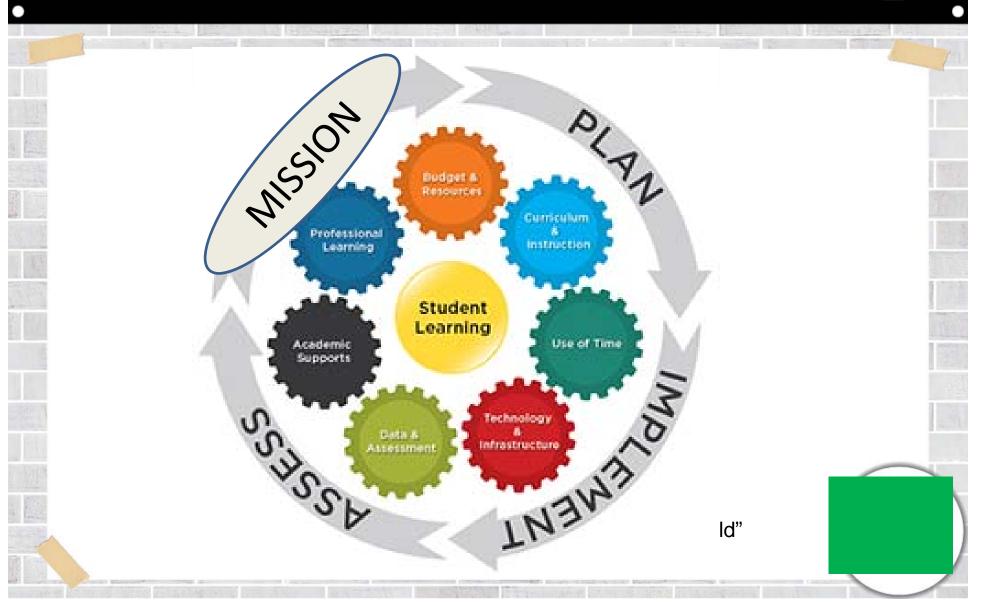

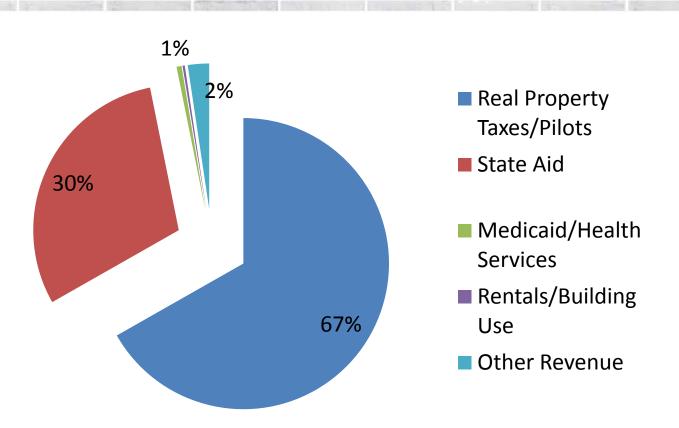

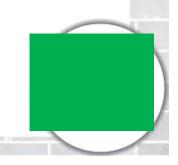
#### Use of the EXCEL Funding balance:

## **Budget HIGHLIGHTS Summary**



Foundation Aid, if fully funded, would provide an additional **\$20 million**. As of today the district will be receiving only **\$264,847**.



## **Budget HIGHLIGHTS Summary**



Preliminary Budget 2016-17 budget reflects these challenges. Revenues fall short of expenses by \$1.2 million.



## **Budget HIGHLIGHTS Summary**



Increasing student achievement to where it must be, the district will need about \$4.9 million in addition to the above \$1.2 million current gap.
