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

Student attendance at school every day matters and parents play a vital role to support their children in making the most of their educational opportunities.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Foundation for Learning

Understanding Absences Excused vs. Unexcused



EXCUSED

Parent/Guardian Notifies School on the Day of Absence

- Illness verified by a note from parent and/or physician up to 10 absences.
 Any absence for illness beyond 10 will require a note from a physician
- Illness verified by a note from a medical provider
- Recovery from an accident verified by a note from physician
- Death in the family

Pre-Arranged Excused Absences

- Professional Appointments (medical, dental, legal) when students return with an authorized dated statement
- Court Appearance
- Celebration of a bona fide religious holiday
- Maternity
- Page for General Assembly
- Election Day Worker
- IN National Guard Active Duty
- Civil Air Patrol
- Military-connected Family
- Exhibiting/Participating in the State Fair

UNEXCUSED

Students should have ZERO Unexcused Absences

Unexcused absence is defined as any absence not covered under the definition of excused absence or an absence that has not been verified by a parent or guardian within 24 hours.

CONSEQUENCES

In addition to all building level provision in the student handbook:

If a student is having 5 days of unexcused absence within a 10-week period, a truancy prevention plan will be put in place for the student as required by law.

All absences are monitored, and disciplinary action may result.

Students reaching 10 unexcused absences or 18 absences for any reason will be referred to the Dubois County Prosecutor, the intake officer of the juvenile court of the Indiana Department of Child Services (DCS) and the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles if applicable.

Soft skills are crucial in the modern workforce as they enhance communication, collaboration, and overall productivity. These skills, such as effective communication, empathy, teamwork, and adaptability, enable employees to build strong relationships with colleagues and clients alike. In a dynamic and diverse workplace, soft skills facilitate smoother interactions, conflict resolution, and innovation. They are equally vital in leadership roles, where emotional intelligence and the ability to motivate and inspire others are essential. Ultimately, mastering soft skills not only fosters a positive work environment but also contributes significantly to personal and professional growth.

In response to feedback from Dubois County employers regarding deficiencies in soft skills among recent hires, Hub19, the Dubois County Career and Innovation Hub, convened a committee to address this issue comprehensively. Collaborating closely with educators and industry partners, the committee identified nine essential attributes expected of graduates. Subsequently, during the following summer, a group of nearly thirty educators came together to meticulously craft grade-level exemplars tailored to each of these identified attributes.

The nine identified attributes are as follows:

BALANCE: Self-manage by becoming self-aware and socially and emotionally healthy.

PREPARE: Learn and apply both academic content and personal finance skills and explore multiple career paths.

EXCEL: Commit to personal growth, a strong work ethic, and a drive to succeed and persevere.

CONTRIBUTE: Serve others.

COLLABORATE: Work as a responsible team member and build unity.

COMMUNICATE: Listen and share information to exchange ideas effectively.

DESIGN: Create, innovate, problem solve, and think critically.


RELATE: Empathize with others and develop character, compassion and kindness.

INITIATE: Take action and lead positively.

In grades K-6, students are actively engaging with and developing a foundational understanding of the nine core attributes. They are learning the significance of these concepts and their relevance to future personal and professional achievements. Students in grades 7-12 at Greater Jasper Consolidated Schools are equipped with electronic portfolios, designed to showcase their academic achievements and personal growth. Both middle and high schools are collaborating to enhance students' portfolio management skills.

By documenting their experiences through hours logged, projects completed, and visual artifacts, students compile comprehensive "hyperportfolios." These portfolios serve as tangible evidence of their accomplishments and are shared via links for purposes such as scholarship applications, job opportunities, and college admissions. This initiative exemplifies Dubois County's commitment to preparing students to excel in their future endeavors, whether in employment, higher education enrollment, or enlistment in military service.

ENROLL - ENLIST - EMPLOY

Jasper Middle and High School staff members guide students in grades 7-12 to choosing an appropriate path toward **Enrollment** in post-secondary education, **Enlistment** in one of the branches of the armed services, or **Employment** with an industry partner. Students utilize in their Preparing for College and Careers course and during homeroom a tool called Naviance. Naviance is a comprehensive college, career, and life readiness (CCLR) platform that helps middle and high school students discover their strengths, explore college and career interests, create actionable goals and find their best-fit path after high school. Counselors and teachers spend time with students dissecting their Naviance results to gain a better understanding and develop a future plan. Students also participate in the 7th Grade Reality Store, 8th Grade Career Cruise, 9th Grade Tour of Opportunity, 10th/11th Grade College Fair, 11th Grade Job Fair and 12th Grade Senior Decision Day. Our industry, military and post-secondary partners show up for these events to give students an education we can not provide inside our school walls regarding the opportunities available after graduation.

JMS Preparing Students for JHS



From elementary school to middle school to high school, it is important for each building to prepare students for their next level of education. Jasper Middle School makes it a priority to ensure that all students are being prepared for their new journey at Jasper High School.

Stella, an outstanding 8th grade student at Jasper Middle School, has taken advantage of the resources that JMS has to offer. She has taken multiple classes of the high school level such as Spanish I and Biology I Honors. Students taking high school level classes as an 8th grader not only prepare for them the workload that they will be receiving in high school, but also allows them to take advancement placed (AP) classes in high school. Stella has written how Jasper Middle School has helped her prepare for her next level of education.

"My name is Stella. I'm an 8th grader at Jasper Middle School. When looking into the future, there are many things to prepare for. However, I feel much more prepared after my 3 years at Jasper Middle School. Not only do I feel prepared for my classes, but I also feel ready for sports, extracurricular activities, and things outside of school. Though I know my high school classes, such as chemistry and geometry, won't be easy, my teachers throughout the years have taught me well. Not only did they teach me the material, they taught me how to develop study habits and how to manage my time. Sports have encouraged me to go out of my comfort zone. They have taught me how to better cooperate with others and become a leader. Sports taught me the need for balance between playing and practicing. Finally, they helped me to grow, not only as a player but as a teammate and a friend. After participating in many clubs throughout middle school, I am extremely excited about all the new opportunities that await at JHS. I am excited to learn about all the extracurricular activities I can participate in. These activities can help me make new friends and help me in the future. THE TRANSITION FROM JES TO JMS

Transitioning from elementary school to middle school is a significant milestone that while exciting can also be filled with a lot of anxiety and uncertainty. Some of the new experiences that students look forward to are more independence, more freedom in choosing their classes, and making new friends.

As fifth graders, our students get to experience a small taste of what sixth grade students will experience. The fifth grade teachers at Jasper Elementary School departmentalize for subjects. Our students can switch classes and teachers daily. Although this is on a much smaller scale than at JMS, JES students get the feel for moving from class to class.

As the end of the year nears, there are special opportunities for our students to learn more about JMS. One of these opportunities is for Mrs. Flamion, the JMS School Social Worker, to visit JES to ease some of the anxiety of our students. While at JES, she meets with students and explains her role.

Our students are also given an opportunity to tour the Middle School. Being that we are located on the same campus, our students can walk with their classmates to JMS. During this tour, JMS staff members walk the students through the area where the sixth graders' classrooms are going to be. The students are also shown the inside of a locker. While they are there, Mr. Hubster meets with all the students and then gives them a synopsis of what a school day looks like, and discusses some of these freedoms.

By staying focused, getting support when needed, and keeping a positive attitude and mindset, students can make the most out of their experiences at JMS and will have tremendous growth.










SECOND SEMESTER AT IRELAND ELEMENTARY


