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
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
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

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Veterans Park New Playground Coming Soon

arple Township is excited to announce that the construction of the new all-inclusive playground has begun. The Township is pleased to have the opportunity to enhance the recreation activities for our community and this



playground will be one of the most advanced recreation sites in the area. This new addition to the Marple Township Parks Program will provide our community with a safe place where children of all abilities can play together and are developmentally appropriate for children with and without disabilities.

The Marple Township received \$425,000 in grants from Delco Greenways Grant Program, Department of Conservations & Natural Resources, Greenways trails & Recreation Program, along with donations from Broomall Rotary Club and Marple Township Parks and Recreation Fund. We know our residents will enjoy using this space and we look forward to seeing children of all abilities and all ages playing here together.

Unfortunately, during this new initiative, the Township must close the existing playground so that our contractors can prepare the new site and begin construction of the new park area. The good news is we are optimistic the new playground will be completed by November of this year.

The Delaware County Emergency Rental Assistance Program is Offering Township Residents Help

ith the end of the Federal Moratorium on Evictions, the Delaware County Emergency Rental Assistance Program (DELCO ERA) stands ready as a vital resource to help qualified low-income renters with emergency rent and utility assistance.

Since April 1, 2021, DELCO ERA has received 7,000 applications, approved and/or funded 2,600 grants for a total of \$19.5 million.

"We are grateful to the U.S. Treasury and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for their confidence in DelCo ERA with the \$37 million allocated for ERA 1 and the \$11.9 million down payment on ERA2," said Delaware County Councilman Kevin Madden. "Each day 50 to 60 households register for DelCo ERA. Our network of Community Partners and our investment in our production system means that DelCo ERA has the capacity to effectively serve our residents in need.

DelCo ERA can assist qualifying households with up to twelve months of back rent and utilities and up to three months of future assistance. Registration for the program is open for both tenants and landlords at delco-era.com.



DELCO ERA is fully equipped to move quickly to help qualifying applicants facing eviction. Tenants and landlords are strongly encouraged to register for assistance at delco-era.com. Applications from tenants experiencing or facing eviction are processed at the highest priority.

In an effort to support residents or landlords without access to the Internet or devices to apply, In-Person Application Intake Sessions are held every Saturday at The County's Upper Darby Office, (20 South 69th Street, Upper Darby) on the fourth floor. Loomis is Glowing and Growing!

oomis Elementary School recently hosted a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on July 28th to celebrate the newly renovated, updated, and expanded school building located in Broomall. Originally built 63 years ago in 1958, the school's latest project was completed in Fall 2021.

The project involved a 9,960-square-foot, one-story addition to the existing elementary school, which provided several new offices, small-group instruction rooms, a conference room, a multipurpose room, six new classrooms, as well as an expansion to the existing cafeteria. The cafeteria kitchen was gutted and revamped, creating more counter space, while adding a walk-in freezer, walk-in refrigerator, a storage closet, and deeper sinks. The original Loomis stage remains in the cafeteria and is used for assemblies and performances. However, after sanding and staining, the stage looks like new, complete with a lush new curtain, projector, large retractable screen, and upgraded sound system.

The Loomis Library received new bookshelves and carpet making it a wonderful space to pick the perfect book to read and a

great place for collaboration and peer-to-peer learning. The Loomis gymnasium was renovated with a new durable gym floor, basketball backboards, and orange padded walls that boldly and proudly showcase the Loomis name.

The school building received new floors, new windows to allow for natural light to flow in, ADA-compliant bathrooms, student cubbies, storage cabinets, and SmartBoards throughout making the learning and working environment inclusive, functional, and absolutely beautiful.

The new and renovated Loomis Elementary School will assist with meeting the district's vision and goal of providing students with equitable opportunities so they are best prepared for middle school and future college and career readiness.

Loomis Elementary will be hosting an Open House for community members or any former Loomis students and staff to see the new and improved school. The Open House will take place on Wednesday, October 6 from 6pm-8pm. We hope to see you there!



Culbertson Construction Project

fter several planning meetings and preparation, the renovation project for Culbertson Elementary School began in June of 2019 when the contractors arrived on school grounds to begin Phase I. During this first phase, the classrooms in our main hallway were completely renovated. The first and second grade rooms were given new ADA compliant bathrooms, new windows, a new HVAC system, new floors, new cabinetry, new cubbies for our students, new interactive boards, new floors, and a brand new lighting system. In addition to the classroom renovations, our cafeteria and kitchen was also in the beginning stages of being renovated. The cafeteria renovation began with

the removal of the existing stage, old windows, and all of the kitchen appliances. During the course of the next three months, the contractors were able to knock down the wall behind the stage and enlarge the cafeteria by an additional twenty feet. By September of 2019, Culbertson had many of its classrooms renovated, a brand new cafeteria with all new appliances, new windows, a rebuilt stage to include a state of the art lighting and sounds system, as well as a new HVAC system.

During this same time frame, Culbertson also started Phase 1A of the project. Phase 1A of the project included the addition of a brand new wing of classrooms. Within this wing, Culbertson added

10 additional classrooms. Each classroom includes new windows, HVAC systems, interactive boards, cabinets, cubbies for our students, as well as handicapped accessible ramps for easy access for all students and visitors. Culbertson was ecstatic to announce that after eight months (February of 2020), we were able to open the additional wing of classrooms to our 4th and 5th grade students. In February of 2020, the students and staff were able to enjoy a day where they were able to walk through the new wing and have a question and answer session with the architects and some of the contractors. This was a great day for our Culbertson students in helping with their transition to their new classrooms.

In June of 2020 Culbertson's construction project started Phase Ill of the renovation project. During this phase, several classrooms, library, gymnasium, and large group instruction area were renovated. In our gymnasium we added brand new windows, backboards and rims, colorful padding around the gym walls, and a new floor. Our library was packed up and stored in our administration building. While everything was painted, they installed new carpet, new bookshelves. In addition, the library also received a new interactive board along with new furniture for our students. The last part of this phase was the restructuring of the large group instruction area. This space was transformed into seven different office areas and four additional classrooms for our teachers and students.

In September of 2020, the Culbertson Elementary School had been fully renovated and the construction project was complete. As many of us know, when taking on a project of this magnitude, there are many people involved, multiple planning meetings throughout the process, and various moving parts. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the people involved in making this a reality for our students. First and foremost, we would like to thank the Marple Newtown School Board of Directors, both our current Board Directors and those who served as former Board

Directors in the beginning stage of planning for this project. A special thank you to our Superintendent, Dr. Tina Kane, Joseph Driscoll, Business Administrator, and Jake Gallagher, Director of Operations, for all of their hard work, support, and dedication. Thank you to our architects from Bonnett Associates and our general contractor, Sean McManus. Lastly, we would like to thank all of our staff for their flexibility, patience, hard work, and dedication towards our students. During this project our teachers and staff did not miss a beat with our students. Some of the teachers relocated classrooms midyear where others needed to pack and unpack materials several times, and regardless of the situation, they never allowed the construction process to be a distraction to our students' learning. Overall this project was a tremendous success for the Culbertson Community. We look forward to building a better future for our students in our state of the art elementary school for many years to come.

Sustainable Newtown

n May 2021, the Board of Supervisors passed a resolution declaring that Newtown Township will participate in the Sustainable PA Community Certification Program and commit becoming a more sustainable municipality.

Back in 2015, the Township Board of Supervisors entered into a contract with Practical Energy Solutions to perform an energy audit. The audit results recommended that the Township move to utilizing LED lighting, change to a geothermal heating and cooling system and increase insulation throughout the building. The Township underwent a remodeling of the Township building in 2016 and 2017 and focused on ways to be more sustainable and save money. The Township changed the entire HVAC system in the Main Building from a Water Chiller with over 30 different heat pumps and air handlers to a more efficient geothermal HVAC system. Not only has this saved on electricity and natural gas usage, it has saved a significant amount of water. The Township implemented a LED light system in all areas of the interior and exterior building.

During that same time, the Township joined numerous other municipalities in the Delaware Valley Region to request bids for a project to replace all township-owned street lights with LED light fixtures and bulbs. Again, this has saved a significant use of electricity.

Over the last couple of years, the Environmental Advisory Commission (EAC) has been exploring ways for the Township to enhance its protection of the environment and create a culture of sustainability. The EAC along with the Township staff recommended participating in the Sustainable PA Certification program. The Township Board of Supervisors recognized that this program would not only help the Township be more sustainable, but assist with achieving several of the outcomes outlined in the 2020 Strategic Plan.

The Sustainable PA Certification program is divided into 10 categories, 26 areas of impact and 130 best practices, actions or policies. Sustainable PA also has five levels of Achievement: Associate, Bronze, Silver, Gold and Platinum.

Best practices include; (1) working with other municipalities to achieve economies of scale and, hopefully, a reduction in environmental impact; (2) financial management that looks to the



future and prepares for the unexpected; (3) good communication that ensures the community is aware of environmental initiatives and encourages their participation in these initiatives. They focus on energy savings, green infrastructure and maintaining open space. The practices look at walkability, bicycle accommodations and public transportation. There are many additional practices to be investigated and potentially implemented. Each best practice is assigned a point value from one to four by the Sustainable PA Certification Program. These points are obtained when a municipality initiates a practice and documents proof of the practice. The total earned points dictate the level of achievement for the municipality.

To achieve this significant undertaking, the Township has assigned each of the 130 Best Practices/Actions to a Township staff member and to a Township committee, commission, board, and in some cases non-profit organizations. These non-profit organizations are those whose missions are aligned with the Township's mission to accomplish such tasks. The Township has also assigned Suzanne Wolanin, the Township's Administrative Services Director/Human Resource Director, with the task of spearheading the Township's focus and resource allocation to becoming sustainable. Stay tuned over the next few months as the Township determines which best practices it has already implemented, and which new ones it will implement.

Stormwater Audit

irective #2 of the Strategic Plan speaks to supporting environmental initiatives. The third outcome under Directive #2 requests that, "Stormwater is managed to maintain a sustainable community by reducing flooding and supporting healthy streams and rivers." In an effort to assess how well the Township is implementing best practices for Stormwater Green Infrastructure, which influences water quality, the Board of Supervisors has entered into an agreement with Pennsylvania Environmental Council to audit of Township Ordinances and Policies. This in-depth audit will look at the Township's existing ordinances and Policies to see if there are barriers to the implementation of Green Stormwater Infrastructure. Upon completion of the audit report card, the PEC will make recommendations for how the Township can improve upon existing ordinances and policies. The goal of the Board of Supervisors is to have a complete evaluation that will allow the Township to celebrate where it meets or exceeds best practices for stormwater and to develop an improvement plan to implement best practices where the Township is not currently doing so.

Many farmers markets experienced an increase in new customers drawn by the fact that products sold there pass through a limited number of hands, and that many farmers markets are held outside.

"I not only get to share recipe ideas, but I get to learn how all these families are incorporating our beef into their weeknight tacos or weekend trips to the shore," says Jodi Gauker of Gauker Farms. "I love food with a story."



he past two years brought about changes to every element of our lives, forcing us into a new reality. Educators, students, and parents across the globe scrambled to reinvent the school day—what was once a reliable constant in our daily lives. Parents adjusted work schedules to act as a teacher's helper, they set up mini classrooms in a corner of their homes to create a workspace that was adequate for their children to learn, and tried providing a sense of normalcy in what was a far-from-normal time.

Students of all ages learned a digital way to communicate with their peers and their teachers, blowing the screen time recommendation limit out of the water with daylong online learning. Teachers reinvented ways to connect with their students, recreating a classroom in their own home, working tirelessly to develop ways to not only educate, but entertain students who struggled with online learning.

No one came out of a year of online learning unscathed, but as the great Albert Einstein once said, "In the midst of every crisis lies great opportunity." Where Virtual Learning Falls Short

Yet, even as students received access to adequate technology, there was a learning curve for students, teachers, and parents alike. Teachers needed to quickly learn how to adapt lesson plans to an online platform, while learning the new technology themselves. On the other end of the computer screen, students and parents scrambled to install learning platforms, locate the mute/unmute button, and learn best practices on how and when to use the camera.

It was almost overnight that virtual learning was adopted and considered the way for the near-term future. While many schools returned to hybrid or in-person learning, there are still challenges that schools are addressing for technology and the future of education.

Trends for 2022:

- Increased access Policy makers, school administrations, and teachers say there's no going back to the way things were prior to the pandemic. Although many districts are going back to in-person learning, the need and desire for a more structured option for virtual learning is clear. Requests for grants to increase access to technology and a reliable and safe infrastructure are being submitted by administrators to provide their student populations with the option for virtual or hybrid learning.
- Greater focus on data privacy and cybersecurity -Devoid of the safety of protected private school networks, data privacy and cybersecurity continue to be a concern for school administrators. Ensuring the safety of students and faculty is a top priority, but it's been challenging to manage.

Victories of Virtual Learning

Remote learning also had its successes. The change to virtual forced students and teachers to quickly master and adapt to a new way of learning—a way that will now be a viable option for the future of education.

Teachers found groups of other educators who were going through the same trials, sharing best practices, finding mentors in the field, and becoming a stronger community through the process. Younger generations were helping older generations adjust to using new technologies, while students were finding new and unique ways to maintain their social relationships through virtual means. Online learning opened new opportunities for students to learn at their own pace, provided access to resources that may never have been available to them in a physical setting, and gave the entire world a crash course in a new way of learning that would have otherwise taken years to achieve.

Trade and Technical Schools

Trade school enrollment continues to increase since the early 2000s, but a steep decline in vocational education in the 1980s and '90s led to a shortage of skilled workers across the nation. Plus, over the past 30 years, the cost to attend a four-year college has increased by 213 percent, leaving some students wanting to avoid the hefty price tag of a four-year degree.

- Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) Working under the direction of doctors and registered nurses, LPNs are responsible for updating patient charts and keeping doctors and nurses up-to-date on patient health changes. LPNs work long shifts and can work in a hospital, outpatient facility, nursing home, or other caregiving facility.
- HVAC Technician Installing, repairing, replacing, and maintaining systems are all part of an HVAC tech's role. Heating, ventilation, refrigeration, and air-conditioning systems are required to properly maintain workplaces, hospitals, and homes, among other buildings.
- Home Inspector Ensuring the safety of a home or building is the main job of home inspectors. They are required to be familiar with all types of systems that are in a home including heating, electrical, plumbing, and the overall structural system of a home. Being a home inspector requires you to be physically fit and capable of climbing ladders and crawling through small spaces during inspection.
- **Plumber** Not only responsible for unclogging toilets and drains, but plumbers also often install and repair gas supply lines as well. It's critical to understand the flow of these systems and to problem-solve and troubleshoot when issues arise within them.
- Electrician Training to become an electrician takes about as long as it takes to get a bachelor's degree and a license, but this job training pays for itself along the way. If reading blueprints and installing or repairing wires and other electrical components interests you, this career might be electrifying.
- Landscape Designer If you enjoy the outdoors and gardening, look into landscape design. These professionals offer plans on designing outdoor spaces for residential and commercial settings that take into account

environmental challenges, features that are meant to be emphasized, and overall aesthetics.

- **Respiratory Therapist** Respiratory therapists work with patients who have breathing difficulties, and also aid in emergency situations such as drowning, heart attack, or shock. They assess patients' respiratory needs and make sure they're receiving proper care through breathing treatments.
- Dental Hygienist Smile! Your career could be in making teeth brighter. Dental hygienists work to clean teeth, take x-rays, and educate patients on oral health. They are also ranked among the most satisfied workers. You'll need an associate degree to pursue this career.
- **Ultrasonographer** After obtaining an associate degree, sonographers go on to prepare patients for procedures, review and process images for physicians, and administer ultrasounds. They are also responsible for operating imaging equipment.

Types of Educational Loans

Getting into college is one of the most exciting times of a student's life and is the first step in shaping a variety of careers. Many colleges and universities offer a myriad of grants or scholarships to assist with paying for postsecondary education, but often these are not enough. Student loans provide financial assistance for students to cover the costs associated with attending a college or career school, including tuition,

Need-based loans are provided to students who are unable to pay the amount needed to cover all costs to attend college. Need is determined by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), which can be completed online at no cost. Need-based loans are available as a Federal Perkins Loan, awarded to students with the highest need, or a Federal Direct Subsidized Loan, provided interest-free while in college.

If FAFSA determines that a student is ineligible for a need-based loan, non-need-based loan options are available as a Federal Direct Unsubsidized Loan or Federal Direct PLUS Loan. Unsubsidized loans allow the borrower to add interest to the total amount borrowed after graduation, but beware: this leads to owing even more money when it comes time to start paying off the loan. Direct PLUS Loans provide graduate students or parents the opportunity to borrow the total cost of attending college, minus other financial aid received.


Unlike the loans mentioned above that are sponsored by the federal government, state and private loans are sponsored by banks, colleges, foundations, and state agencies. The U.S. Department of Education manages all college loans available by state and requires students to be in-state residents or enrolled in a college in that state. Private loans are an option for borrowers but come with terms and conditions that may not be as favorable as federal loans. Private loans also require a cosigner who is responsible for repaying the money if the student fails to do so.

- Graduated plans are payments that start out lower and increase every two years, also ensuring that loans are paid off within 10-30 years (based on loan). This plan assumes you'll continue to make more money as you continue your career path, so additional money is allotted to repayment as you go.
- Extended plans may be made in a fixed amount or a graduated amount and ensure payment in full within 25 years.
- Income-based plans take 10-15 percent of your discretionary income, and are recalculated each year.
 Once you are married, your spouse's income will also be considered if filing jointly on tax returns. Any outstanding balance on the loan will be forgiven after 20-25 years.
- Consolidate for ease. If you have multiple federal loans, consolidating them into one can make repayment easier. But there may be fees or other conditions associated with consolidating, so be sure to do your research.
- Is forgiveness an option? Some programs offer loan forgiveness if you meet certain criteria or work in a particular field. People in government, nonprofit, and other public-service jobs may have the remainder of their loans forgiven after 10 years of service. Additional forgiveness options are available for nurses, teachers, AmeriCorps and Peace Corps volunteers, and some state and private programs.

Managing Debt After College

Student loan debt continues to increase and has become a burden on both graduates and the U.S. economy. There are a variety of loan repayment options for students. Here are some tips on how to approach repayment:

- Figure out what you'll owe and start to save early. Creating a budget early will allow you to build a solid foundation for repayment after graduation. Setting aside money each month toward future savings for repayment will set you up for success come graduation day.
- Understand your repayment options. There are several different options available to start paying off student loans based on the type of loan you received. Common federal loan plans include standard, graduated, extended, or income-based.
 - Standard plans are payments in fixed amounts that ensure that loans are paid off in 10-30 years (these payments are often very high for new graduates).

Duportail House

n 1740, a Welsh Quaker named John Havard, Jr. built a stone farmhouse on a large William Penn land grant, amid the fertile fields of Chester County's Great Valley. During the Continental Army's encampment at Valley Forge in 1777-78, the Havard family played host to a guest from France, General Louis Lebègue Duportail. Recruited by Benjamin Franklin, Duportail served as the Army's chief engineer, designing fortifications at Valley Forge that could enable Washington's troops to hold off a potential attack by the British army, which was encamped in nearby Philadelphia.

Fortunately, those defenses were never tested. After the departure of Washington, Duportail, and the Continental Army, the house and surrounding farm remained in the Havard/Davis family until 1903. In April of that year, the property was purchased by Lawrence McCormick, who was the general manager of the elegant Bellevue Stratford Hotel in Philadelphia. The property became known as Cressbrook Farm at this time because watercress grown in the streams on the property was used in the kitchens of the Bellevue Stratford.

It was during renovations of the house for McCormick that General Duportail's original map of the Valley Forge defenses was found in the attic rafters. Since 1908, the map has been in the collections of the Pennsylvania Historical Society.

In 1926 the property was acquired by Henry L. Woolman, a University of Pennsylvania alumnus who subsequently donated it to the university. Penn proposed to build a suburban campus for some of its undergraduate students, with administrative headquarters at Duportail House, but these plans were put on hold during World War II and eventually abandoned.

In 1974, the Fox Companies purchased the land from the university to become part of an 865-acre planned community development known as Chesterbrook. When the development was finally approved in 1978, Fox was able to repair some of the Duportail structures. In 1985, the buildings and three acres of the original farm were conveyed to the nonprofit organization that continues to manage the property today.

On an inside wall of the barn at Duportail are inscribed the words "The Federal Barn 1792," as well as "Jonathan Moor his work" and "John H. Moor 1792." While the 1792 date of construction means that the barn was not in place at the time of General Duportail's visit, it is nonetheless an historic site, being the only known bank barn in Pennsylvania to be signed by its builder. In poor shape by the time the property was acquired by the Fox Companies in 1974, repairs were made to the stonework prior to the barn's new lease on life in the hands of the nonprofit Duportail House organization.

As with any 200-year-old structure, maintenance is an ongoing challenge for the Federal Barn. With the roof in need of replacement, a structural engineer was hired in 2011 to recommend any steps needed to ensure the barn's physical integrity. As a result, the Duportail board of directors hired Highline Construction of Christiana, Lancaster County, to make significant repairs in early 2012.

Owned and staffed by Amish craftsmen, Highline reinforced the foundation at the rear of the barn and replaced several beams that had reached the end of their useful life. Because of the team's experience in working with old barns, they were able to locate similar beams that had been salvaged from other barns, complete with the axe marks found on hand-hewn lumber.

Both Duportail House and the Federal Barn are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Duportail is located at 297 Adams Drive, Chesterbrook, PA 19087 and is open to the public each Sunday, 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., except holidays and during special events. Duportail House and the Federal Barn can accommodate weddings, corporate dinners and picnics, small meetings, bar and bat mitzvahs and large special celebrations with up to 160 guests depending on usage and time of year.
