SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

TIME/PLACE: A meeting of the Douglas County School District No. 4 Board of Directors was convened on Wednesday, April 10, 2024, at 6:00 p.m. in the Roseburg High School Media Center, 400 W Harvard Blvd, Roseburg, Oregon, in person and available via Zoom link.

ATTENDANCE: Board members and Cabinet members attended in person, with Rev. Johnson intending to attend via Zoom. No media representatives announced themselves.

CALL TO ORDER / PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: Board Chair, Rodney D. Cotton, called the regular meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and invited Director Ann Krimetz to lead the Pledge of Allegiance. Chair Cotton also advised the audience that Board meetings are recorded for future viewing and to please silence their cell phones. Anyone wishing to be part of Public Participation was asked to complete a card at the entrance to the room and cards will be collected prior to Public Participation. Our Zoom link is available for family and friends unable to attend the student and staff recognitions. Patrons may also contact board members via email.

Chair Cotton thanked Principal Dave Vickery and his team for setting up the space tonight, central office staff and Technology Coordinator Matt Hill for taking care of the technical pieces. Principal Vickery earlier led the Board on a tour of the campus, spending time in the CTE building.

PRINCIPAL REPORT - Roseburg High School

<u>Mission Statement: Roseburg High School is a place of opportunity to attain knowledge and become productive, independent citizens who live PRIDE!</u>

Principal David Vickery led a tour of RHS and reviewed student assessment data. He shared details of comprehensive action plans within specific areas being addressed in 9th Grade on Track, Language Arts, Math and Graduation rates that are being monitored throughout this year. He also publicly thanked the elementary and middle schools for preparing students for high school, where his staff is ready to take it from there! He reminded everyone to remember that children are all human beings and staff are doing their best to help them succeed in accordance with our Strategic Plan, which grounds their work moving forward. Dave shared the RHS vision for student learning experience:

RHS students experience a safe, equitable and positive environment where students belong, take risks, collaborate, persevere, and engage in meaningful, relevant learning in order to meet their personal potential. Students are empowered, curious learners, effective problem solvers, and critical thinkers who achieve their goals, strive for excellence, celebrate success and are prepared to contribute to their communities throughout their lives.

RHS prioritizes a Professional Learning Theory of Action. Dave pointed out that by prioritizing learning opportunities, providing support and feedback, and fostering meaningful discourse among teachers, we can create an environment that encourages substantive student conversations and intellectual engagement that increases opportunities for students to self-assess and take ownership of all phases of their own learning throughout the school. With 40 advanced placement and dual credit classes, he shared that staff are preparing to increase that to over 50 classes being offered for the 2024-25 school year. He gave kudos to P-20 Coordinator, Brett Steinacher, for his efforts in making this happen for our students. CTE programs in business and marketing, health occupations, hospitality, tourism & recreation, carpentry, early childhood education, manufacturing, agriculture and resources, automative and drafting are providing awe-inspiring opportunities for kids to work on areas they will want to continue to pursue. Along with CTE, athletic and club activities involved students outside the classroom as we strive to have something to offer every student. When asked about student assessment data, Principal Vickery confirmed that he would not be satisfied with anything under 99.9% but was quick to point out that with his front row seat, he gets to see first-hand how hard students are working and how much they want to improve. He is very proud of what we are doing to support these kids.

Chair Cotton thanked Principal Vickery for hosting tonight and sharing highlights of the RHS experience.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE REPORT:

Leadership students Hannah Heuberger and Sylvia Eckman shared that students are applying for leadership positions for next year. Prom planning is in full swing, along with homecoming activities including Volleybuff. Recent results of lacrosse, softball, baseball, tennis, and track were reported. Next year's incoming freshman class was invited to campus last week for the annual PRIDE Night. They learned about electives and opportunities available to RHS students. This weekend, over 1600 track and field athletes will participate in the Jim Robinson Twilight Invitational, while the baseball team hosts a double-header on Saturday. For the 14th year, RHS band has qualified for competition at state. The band program collaborated in a concert with our middle school programs this week. Four staff members were each awarded Fund for Teachers Grants from Ford Family Foundation to enhance curriculum experiences.

INTRODUCTION OF S+B JAMES CONSTRUCTION COMPANY VICE PRESIDENT, TERRY MACKEY

Superintendent Cordon introduced Terry Mackey, a Vice-President for S+B James, noting that they have been voted one of the top 100 Oregon businesses. Mr. Mackey has proven to be a problem-solver with direct and transparent communication skills. Our Building & Sites Committee had requested that Mr. Mackey attend a board meeting, providing them with an opportunity to meet and ask any questions. The firm will be involved with upcoming construction projects including security vestibules, the RHS Arts storage facility, and Hucrest restroom. Mr. Mackey expressed excitement for the RHS CTE programs, noting that construction is an aging industry, and if students can master a trade, they can go anywhere and get a job. He further assured the Board that S+B prides itself on finishing projects on time and hopes to continue to partner with the district and support our local community. Superintendent Cordon gave a shout out to district administrators Cheryl Northam and Tracy Grauf as well as S+B's team for meeting our expectations of completing projects on time and on budget.

REPLACEMENT OF RHS FIELD LIGHTING

With existing outdoor field lighting no longer meeting the needs of our student athletes, the Board was asked to approve a request to purchase lights and installation from Musco Sports Lighting at a cost of \$300,500 made possible through Energy Trust of Oregon incentives and grant funds through Senate Bill 1149 and SIA.

Director Steve Hammerson moved to approve the purchase of replacement field lighting for RHS as presented. Director Andrea Miner seconded, and the Motion passed unanimously. Director Miner received confirmation that no funding will be required from our General Fund.

REPORTS

CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION - March 20, 2024

Committee Chairman, Michael Leone, reported that the committee met March 20 to discuss reading and math data at the middle and high school level. Dr. Jill Weber provided an explanation of the numbers, and Mr. Leone shared that, as Principal Vickery mentioned earlier, while the numbers aren't where we want to be (here or nationally), there is a plan for improvement and Dr. Weber is on it! Committee members were informed that data is used by teachers to develop lessons and meet the learning needs of individual students. Administrators use data to review grade level and systems growth. The goal is always to ensure our students graduate with a plan for their most successful future. Assessment requirements at all levels were discussed. Remaining state assessments will be taking place following spring break. Next year, formative math assessments for high school students will be added to better focus instruction.

The state's Early Literacy Grant will support summer learning for elementary students who need additional literacy support during summer months. And our science teachers are in the process of piloting the three selected options as we look to maintain consistency throughout the K-12 student experience.

SUPERINTENDENT REPORT (slide deck follows)

Leaders from the Oregon Dept. of Education recently toured some of our classrooms and the CTE building at RHS to learn more about our incredible programs, hoping to replicate their success in other districts. Superintendent Cordon shared exciting events and experiences being enjoyed by our amazing students. RHS FCCLA and FBLA students competed at state, with some qualifying for national competitions. Sunnyslope School hosted Family Literacy/STEAM Night featuring community partners. And our middle schools are partnering in "The Little Mermaid Jr." production this month. RHS students learned about timber industry careers during a tour of the Swanson Group facility. On April 17, our Budget Committee begins meeting to review the proposed 2024-25 budget reflecting fiscal responsibility of "living within our means," prioritizing student learning while chipping away at our long-term facility's needs.

Parents have communicated frustration with our main communication platform, so District Communications Coordinator Chelsea Duncan will assist us as we transition from OneCall Now and Remind for mass alerts and notifications and direct messages between school staff and families, to our new main communication platform, ParentSquare in 2024-25. Messaging will begin this month and continue into Fall. Jared also gave a shout out to board members who were involved in the process of adopting new employee agreements beginning with the 2024-25 school year. These new contracts are resulting in increasing interest from prospective hires.

On May 8, the RPS and UCC Board will meet in a first-ever Joint Work Session at UCC. A new committee will be searching for solutions to prevent racist incidents in our schools. However, our entire community will need to join in this effort in order to be successful.

In May, the Board will meet with a Woolpert Group representative to begin working toward an updated long-range facilities plan. We will also receive an update from Phoenix Charter School. Open enrollment for the upcoming school year begins April 22nd. The board was reminded of upcoming middle school student performances of the Little Mermaid happening April 25-27. And the RHS theatre presents The Addams Family performances April 18-26. Get out and see the amazing things our students are doing!

BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORTS

Director Steve Hammerson shared that it made his son's day when the STEAM robot visited Hucrest and actually danced. He also gave credit and thanks to the Fir Grove librarian who organized a recent student appreciation luncheon. It was amazing talking with the kids, and the visit was a joy.

Director Andrew Shirtcliff extended thanks to the RHS students and staff for the recent PRIDE Night held at the high school. He is the father of an incoming freshman, and it was really fun. His daughter enjoyed seeing the excitement in other students who took advantage of the event.

Director Andrea Miner thanked Russ Bolin for coming out of retirement and taking the principal position at Fullerton IV Elementary and continuing in this position next school year.

Director Ann Krimetz thanked Principal Vickery for inviting us to tour his school. She enjoyed the student artwork on display, sharing her amazement at how talented they are! She also applauded the hard work happening in Curriculum and Instruction, and also for staff wanting what is best for the kids. It's reassuring to see the care taken in selections to assure content is engaging and factual.

Director Michael Leone announced that there is a softball double-header this weekend!

Chair Rodney Cotton wondered if there is a centralized calendar that could be created so that we don't miss out on the activities happening around the district. He noted how creative our STEAM Team is. The district does have web sites for each school, but we will continue to work to keep everyone in the loop on what is happening. He also pointed out that just being around our students tends to make you feel younger and more optimistic. Mr. Cotton shared his celebration of his fifth-grade teacher, Mrs. Dorothy Wilson, who he credits for saving him. He reflected that each of us have had teachers who made an impact on our lives, and we honor them on National Teacher Appreciation Week!

ADJOURNMENT: With regular business before the Board concluded, and with no objections, Chair Cotton adjourned the meeting at 7:23 p.m. The next meeting will take place at Umpqua Community College, 1140 Umpqua College Road at 5:00 p.m. and will also be available via zoom link.
