The New and Improved Vista View Middle School

Last fall, students returned to a new and improved Vista View Middle School, following a \$29 million modernization. Once all the finishing touches were completed, the Ocean View School District (OVSD) hosted a special ribbon-cutting ceremony that featured local dignitaries and tours of the new state-of-theart facilities.

The modernization project, funded through Measure R, a general obligation bond, called for a totally re-envisioned school, which required a complete overhaul of the campus. The exterior of the school and interior hallways are adorned with vibrant images that reflect the STEAM-focused (science, technology, engineering, arts, mathematics) learning environment of the school. The project scope included building new science classrooms, a culinary arts center with an outdoor garden, a technology rich media/library center, an esports technology classroom outfitted with advanced computers for competitive gaming, a custom lunch shelter, a new physical fitness course, and more.

The classrooms at Vista View have been thoughtfully designed to provide opportunities for innovation, hands-on learning, and collaboration with peers. The new facilities support Vista View's comprehensive STEAM program and a variety of stimulating electives, including Marine Biology, Environmental Science, Google Tech, Project-Based Learning Elective, Esports, Culinary Arts, Leadership, Media Tech, Visual Art, Guitar, Beginning and Advanced Strings, and Beginning and Advanced Band.

This magnificent new school delivers an exciting array of learning opportunities and activities for our students that will prepare them for success in high school and beyond.

Pediatric Orthopedic Surgeons Help Kids Heal Around Their Growth Plates



The bones of adults and children share many risks for injury, but children's bones are unique. Children have areas of cartilage located near the ends of their bones called growth plates, which are the last parts of their bones to harden. Because of this, growing kids can have a unique injury called a growth plate fracture.

Growth plate fractures are most common in fingers, wrists, ankles, and feet, but even occur in knees. These injuries are more common in boys because girls tend to finish growing earlier than boys. The risk of a growth plate fracture peaks in adolescence and is usually due to competitive sports or recreational activities. If not treated properly, growth plate fractures can stunt a child's growth or lead to crooked or uneven limbs.

Fortunately, pediatric orthopedic surgeons are specially trained to help children heal correctly after they have suffered a growth plate fracture. These surgeons complete additional training to operate on growth plates and soft tissue, providing specific care for children's bone and joint disorders. Besides growth plate injuries, pediatric orthopedic surgeons also treat a wide range of pediatric injuries to ensure children can heal and grow properly.



On a crisp December morning, the City of Westminster and the Orange County Department of Education celebrated the opening of a new park honoring the historic case of Mendez v. Westminster, which put an end to forced segregation in California's public schools while laying the foundation for the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark Brown v. Board decision.

City officials, local dignitaries, students and community members turned out in force for Mendez Tribute Monument Park's dedication ceremony, marking the completion of a five-year collaborative effort. But a few days before its official opening, I had an opportunity to preview the park with Sylvia Mendez, a civil rights icon whose story is central to the case.

Nearly 80 years earlier, in 1943, Gonzalo and Felicitas Mendez sought to enroll Sylvia and her two brothers, Geronimo and Gonzalo, Jr., at 17th Street School, known then as "the white school." Despite being American citizens who spoke English — the family lived and worked on a Westminster farm — they were turned away and directed instead to Hoover Elementary, a campus designated for Mexican American children.

Sylvia Mendez was just 8 years old at the time. She would later describe Hoover as "a terrible little shack" with dirt for a playground.

The Mendez family ultimately hired an attorney and teamed up with four other Orange County families who had similarly been denied access to their neighborhood schools. Their case, Mendez, et al v. Westminster et al, argued that 5,000 children throughout the county were unjustly harmed by unconstitutional segregation policies.

In 1946, U.S. District Court Judge Paul J. McCormick ruled in favor of the five families, and his decision was later upheld by the U.S. Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. The case ended on April 14, 1947 — one day before Jackie Robinson broke baseball's color barrier with the Brooklyn Dodgers. Seven years later, the Supreme Court declared segregated schools unconstitutional in its sweeping Brown v. Board decision.

Box 5544, Huntington Beach, CA 92615 Gonzalo Mendez died in 1964 at age 51, and his wife Felicitas passed in 1998 — but not before urging her daughter to share the family's story far and wide.

On Monday, Nov. 28, bronze statues of Gonzalo and Felicitas were unveiled for the first time in the new quarter-acre park, which also features a large textbook monument and statues of two students, symbolizing the children impacted by the court's decision. Surrounding these displays are drought-resistant plants, a dry creek bed and interactive stations with content from OCDE's staff of professional educators, who also developed lesson plans and activities for teachers.

As the towering likenesses of her parents were revealed, Sylvia Mendez and her siblings stood front and center. Other invited guests took photos and applauded.

"I'm just so happy," Sylvia said. "I know my mother and family are looking at us from heaven, and they are so happy. Thank you for honoring them."

In this season of gratitude, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Mendezes, along with the Estrada, Guzman, Palomino and Ramirez families, all of whom fought for access and equality on behalf of generations of students they would never meet. As Felicitas Mendez said, they were taking action not just for their own children, but para todos los niños — for all children.

Integrating Art into Literacy

As the most effective learning takes place when children have hands-on learning experiences, our objective this month was to focus on art while also integrating literacy. During this month, our Westmont State Preschoolers participated in our winter showcase, where they created two art pieces and performed a winter song. When it came

to literacy, we focused on two winter books that were the student's favorites.

Both of the books exposed the children to learning about friendship and winter. Students were able to make predictions about what friendship means before reading the stories. During the reading, students were asked questions, and afterward, they revised their predictions. Our students not only had the opportunity to learn new vocabulary and comprehend the story but they also integrated art. The children also created a piece of art that reflected winter and characters from stories. They enjoyed the processes of drawing and painting.

On Dec. 22, our students performed for their families, and their families were then invited to the multipurpose room to view their children's art display. Families had a blast when they were able to see that their children are quite the artists, and the students were proud when showing their family members. Before dismissal time, family members were invited to spend quality time with their children and work together on a small piece of artwork. One parent stated that doing this activity brought back memories of their own preschool years.

Having integrated art into literacy not only gives our students the opportunity to continue developing their literacy but also allows them to further develop their critical skills, language and social skills, and fine-motor skills. As a result, our families discovered that knowledge is retained longer in our brain when a piece of art is integrated and new memories can be created together.

Students at Golden View study phenomena on the farm to help build their understanding

Our students are involved in real world, hands-on learning through our composting program onsite. They apply their knowledge of decomposition by collecting "browns" and "greens" from our farm for the compost pile and cleaning up trash that will not break down over time.

Students learn about the process of turning organic waste into compost by creating amounts of green and brown items with water, air and high temperatures. In addition, our students participate in the Project Zero Waste Program that is offered by Inside the Outdoors. This program allows the students to measure and weigh the amount of food waste that is being produced at the lunch tables each week in hopes of decreasing the amount of food waste that is entering our landfills. Students use special bins to collect leftover food waste at the lunch tables that can be used in our compost bins as well as our red wiggler vermicomposting bins. The worm tea is collected from the worms and used to enrich our soil in our garden beds.

We love that our students get real world, hands-on science experiences here at school every day!



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
