HOW TO'S:

How To Be An Honor Graduate

To be an honor graduate, students must achieve a 3.3 CHS weighted GPA and achieve an ACT composite score of 20 or higher. He/she will be awarded a "gold cord" to wear during graduation ceremonies and will be invited to attend a special Honors Banquet, along with his/her parents, at the end of the senior year.

How To Be In The "Top 5"

 In order to graduate as one of the "Top 5" in the class, student must be an honor graduate with at least a 3.3 CHS weighted GPA, achieve a composite score on the ACT of 20 or higher, and schedule 8 courses in each of the four years of high school. Top 5 graduates must also schedule an advanced English and Math their senior year.



ACT

WHAT?

 ACT is a national test that assesses students' college-readiness. It is made up of four subtests: English, Math, Reading, and Science.

HOW?

Register online at act.org

COST?

- \$68 no writing sample or \$93 with writing sample
- 11th or 12th graders who qualify based on financial eligibility can receive up to four fee waivers. To determine eligibility, complete the fee waiver eligibility form on the ACT page of the CHS website, found under the Academics tab.

WHEN?

 Chalmette High School administers the ACT in October, December, February, and April each year.

WHY?

 Colleges determine acceptance and scholarships based on students' GPA and ACT scores. The higher the score, the more money offered.

CATEWAY MATHEMATICS AND ENGLISH COURSES

<u>What are Gateway courses?</u>

- For-credit courses in math or English to remediate skills
- Students enrolled in a Gateway course will take a corequisite course to support students through supplementary instruction dedicated to tasks that are connected to mastery of the skills and knowledge required for success in the gateway course.

How do I test out of Gateway courses?

- English ACT Subscore \geq 18; Math ACT Subscore \geq 19
- OR High School GPA \geq **3.0**

TOPS SCHOLARSHIPS

Benefits:

- Provides the amount equal to tuition at a Louisiana public institution OR
- An amount equal to the average public tuition at a private institution (In 2022, the amount was \$5718 per year.)
- TOPS may be received for up to <u>8</u> semesters.
- <u>TOPS does not cover fees including: academic</u> <u>excellence fees, energy surcharges, technology fees,</u> <u>books, room & board, parking fees or lab fees</u>



APPLYING FOR TOPS

•FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

- FAFSA is the form to fill out for all federal aid, including TOPS, Pell Grants, loans, etc.
- Website: www.fafsa.gov
- Must be filled out by July 1st for Fall entry into college
- Will need parent financial information

• Graduation Requirement! (Must be filled out no later than two weeks prior to graduation to be eligible to graduate.)



HOW TO KEEP TOPS

Credit Hours, GPA, and FAFSA


- Must maintain full time status each semester and earn a minimum of 24 credit hours during the Academic Year
- Must maintain a 2.5 cumulative GPA for TOPS Opportunity and TOPS Tech
- Must maintain a 3.0 cumulative GPA for TOPS Performance and TOPS Honors
- Complete your FAFSA by July 1st each year



FAFSA

Steps to Complete the FAFSA

- Create a FSA ID for yourself: fsaid.ed.gov
- Create a FSA ID for one parent: fsaid.ed.gov tax return is filed jointly, create a FSA ID for the parent listed first on the tax return.)
- Get your parental tax information from 2023
- Complete FAFSA at <u>www.fafsa.gov</u>
- FAFSA application opens December 2023.
- Complete the **2024-2025** application.





FAFSA

- CHANGES for the 2024-25 FAFSA

- NEW FAFSA Form 108 questions to 36 questions
- The student and parent's FSA ID must be created and processed 1-3 business days before starting the FAFSA.
- Both student and parent must log into the FAFSA using their own FSA ID to enter financial information to complete the FAFSA.
- All FAFSA forms will link to the IRS.
- New formulas will expand Pell Grant eligibility to more students and link eligibility to family size, household income, and their state's poverty level.
- Students may list up to 20 colleges instead of 10.



FAFSA

• What do I need to complete the FAFSA?

- 1. Your Social Security Number
 - If not a US citizen, alien registration number or permanent residence card
- 2. Parent Social Security Number
- 3. Your email address/password
- 4. Parent email address/password
- 5. 2022 Parent Tax Forms
 - If your parents are not married, use the parent who makes less money regardless of whom you live with.
- 6. Untaxed Income: worker's comp, child support, veterans benefits

We will offer two FAFSA nights for parents and students on January 11 & 25. FSA IDs must be created 3 days prior to start the FAFSA.

APPLYING FOR COLLEGE

- Links to all Louisiana colleges' applications can be found on our website.
- Students should begin visiting colleges and researching which colleges have their desired major. This will help narrow down your choices.
- You should apply to at least 3 colleges and do so by December!
- If applying to a private university or out-of-state college, you must complete a request for your transcript to be sent to complete your application.



COMMON APP

- All students applying to LSU must apply through the Common App at commonapp.org
- Common App is an application platform where students can apply up to 20 colleges using one application.
- Over 1,000 colleges worldwide are connected to Common App
- Counselors and teachers must be invited to your Common App to submit recommendations and transcripts
- Some universities require essays that students can upload to their Common App



SCHOLARSHIP NEWSLETTER

Seniors

- A scholarship newsletter is given out every other month with important information and deadlines.
- Criteria for university scholarships are given in the scholarship newsletter.
- National and local scholarships with criteria and deadlines are given.
- Important senior information regarding ACT and FAFSA are included in the scholarship newsletters.

APPLYING FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

- Deadlines to Louisiana universities are posted in the Senior Newsletter.
- Some deadlines are as early as November 15th
 - Most public universities determine scholarships based on GPA and ACT
 - Most private universities require a separate scholarship application to be considered. This application includes an essay and a resume of activities and awards. (Begin your resume now!)
 - If you need a teacher or counselor recommendation, ask at least two weeks before the deadline.



WHY IS MY ACT SCORE IMPORTANT FOR SCHOLARSHIPS?

The higher your ACT composite, the more scholarship money you qualify for.

• Most college scholarship minimum criteria is an ACT composite score of **23** and a GPA of **3.0**.

□ Narrow your list of colleges to between five and 10. If you haven't done so yet, download college applications and financial aid forms. Plan to visit as many of these colleges as possible or at least take a virtual tour online.

• Create a master list or calendar that includes:

- \checkmark Tests you'll take and their fees, dates, and registration deadlines
- ✓ College application due dates
- Required financial aid application forms and their deadlines (aid applications may be due before college applications)
- ✓ Other materials you'll need (recommendations, transcripts, etc.)
- **Apply for an ACT Fee Waiver** if you think you qualify. This could also waive college application fees!
- Take the ACT one more time: Many seniors retake the ACT in the fall. Additional course work since your last test could help you boost your performance. Plus you already know what to expect on test day.
- **Be sure** to have your ACT scores sent to the colleges you're applying to.
- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA): To apply for most financial aid, you'll need to complete the FAFSA. Oct. 1 is the first day you can file the FAFSA.
- Complete the CSS/Financial Aid PROFILE®: PROFILE is an online application used by certain colleges and scholarship programs to determine eligibility for their aid dollars.
- □ Prepare early decision/early action or rolling admission applications as soon as possible. Colleges may require test scores and applications between Nov. 1 and Nov. 15 for early decision admission.
- □ Ask a counselor or teacher for recommendations if you need them. Give each teacher or counselor an outline of your academic record and your extracurricular activities.
- **Submit** at least one college application by Thanksgiving.
- Ask counselors to send your transcripts to colleges. Give counselors the proper forms at least two weeks by the colleges require them.
