# A Message from the Superintendent

#### Dear Wallkill Community,

The Wallkill Central School District Board of Education and Administration have worked diligently over the past several months to prepare the proposed 2019-2020 school district budget. As a result of the fiscal foresight of the Board of Education and Administration over the last several years, our proposed 2019-2020 budget will result in a tax levy that is either at or below the limit for the eighth year in a row. Because of this, the taxpayers in our community have received tax rebates from the State.

In preparing the budget, the Board of Education and Administration made it a priority to ensure that the budget addresses both the academic and social/emotional needs of our students. In doing so, the proposed budget maintains all programs and extracurricular activities for our students and keeps class sizes low. In addition, the budget includes having police officers stationed at each school building.

The District is proposing a 1.9% budget increase for the 2019-2020 school year that equates to a 2.68% tax levy increase. Since the proposed tax levy is **at the tax levy limit**, the proposed budget will require a simple majority of voters for approval (50% +1) instead of a super majority for approval (60% or more). Furthermore, the five (5) year average for our budget increase is 2.0% and the five (5) year average for our tax levy increase is 1.9%.

The fiscal health of a school district is defined as the ability

of a district to fund the level and quality of services expected by its citizens in good times and bad. The Board of Education and Administration have the responsibility of monitoring the fiscal condition of their district to ensure it remains fiscally healthy. School districts need to have adequate resources (fund balance and reserves) to address emergencies and unforeseen situations (i.e. reduction in State Aid) without interrupting or negatively impacting educational services provided to students. Due to multi-year financial planning and strong oversight of the budget, we have maintained/enhanced programmatic opportunities for students in the Wallkill Central School District, while at the same time recognizing the needs of our taxpayers.

This issue of *Learning at Wallkill* provides the public with valuable information on District program highlights, the candidates who are running for the Board of Education, and the proposed 2019-2020 school district budget.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all District residents for your continued support for our students.

# Frequently Asked Questions about the 2019-2020 School District Budget

#### What is the proposition to be voted on?

The proposition voters will cast a ballot for on Tuesday, May 21, 2019, will be:

**Proposition #1:** RESOLVED, that the proposed Wallkill Central School District budget for the 2019-2020 school year in the amount of \$76,524,146 be approved and the Board of Education of said School District be authorized to levy the necessary tax therefore.

# What is the percent increase of the proposed 2019-2020 budget when compared to the 2018-2019 budget?

The 2019-2020 budget increase is 1.90%.

#### What is the tax levy limit?

Essentially, it is an eight-step formula that each school district must use to calculate the tax levy limit. The result (the limit) is the maximum allowable tax levy (including permissible exemptions) that a school district can propose and would require only the approval of a simple majority of voters (50% + 1). Any proposed tax levy amount above the limit would require budget approval by a super majority (60% or more) of voters. # Is the Wallkill Central School District's 2019-2020 tax levy within the limit?

Yes, the 2019-2020 tax levy is within the limit; therefore, a simple majority of voters is needed for budget approval (50% + 1). The tax levy increase with permissible exemptions is **2.68**%. The average tax levy increase over the past five (5) years has been **1.9**%. Additionally, eligible taxpayers have received rebates due to the District being at or below the tax levy limit.

#### Does the tax levy indicate how much my taxes will rise?

No, the tax levy is the amount of money the school district can raise through property taxes. The amount an individual will pay toward the levied amount is the tax rate. Tax rates paid by individual taxpayers may differ greatly from one household to another based on such things as equalization rates and assessed property values. At this time, individual town tax rates are undetermined due to the lack of final equalization rates and total town assessed values.

#### How much State Aid is the District projected to receive?

The District is projected to receive \$29,585,172 in State Aid in 2019-2020. In addition, the District continues to balance its budget with reserves and fund balance.

# What strategies were used to have a tax levy within the tax cap and at the same time maintain and enhance our programs?

- 1. Reduction of four (4.0) FTE Teaching positions through attrition due to a decline in enrollment.
- 2. Reduction of one (1.0) FTE Teaching Assistant position through attrition.
- Reduction in the Teacher Retirement System (TRS) contribution rate.
- 4. Utility costs were stabilized due to bidding and the Energy Performance Contract.
- 5. Use of fund balance and reserves.
- 6. Multi-year financial planning.

#### What programs for students are included in the 2019-2020 budget?

- 1. Addition of one (1.0) FTE Special Education Teacher at Ostrander to support the Grades 5 and 6 inclusion model, resulting in two Special Education teachers being assigned to both grade levels. This will support larger inclusion numbers in Grades 5 and 6.
- 2. Addition of one (1.0) FTE Special Education Clerk to assist with clerical duties for 504, CSE, and CPSE meetings by eliminating one (1.0) Teaching Assistant position through attrition and re-allocating the funds.
- 3. The continued assignment of Police Officers in all five (5) school buildings.
- 4. Maintain all current programs and extra-curricular activities as a result of long-range planning.
- 5. Maintain low class sizes for K-12 to allow for enhanced learning opportunities (K-6 average class size of 20).
- 6. Maintain support services to address the social-emotional needs of our students.
- 7. Professional development opportunities to support classroom instruction and student learning.

#### What happens if voters reject the proposed budget?

If voters reject the proposed budget, the school district may put up a revised budget for a second vote or adopt a contingent budget.

# What additional programs/positions will be reduced if the budget fails twice (contingent budget)?

- Reduction of ten (10) instructional positions, resulting in larger class sizes and loss of programs for our students.
- All field trips (including Ashokan).
- All equipment (except for technology equipment for instructional purposes and equipment necessary for health and safety purposes).
- Charges to community groups that result in identifiable costs for use of buildings.

#### What is included, as allowed by New York State Education Law, in a contingent budget?

A contingent budget will allow:

- All regular transportation to and from school at current levels of more than 0.6 miles and to private/parochial schools for students residing less than 15 miles from their home to school.
- All legal obligations.
- All health and safety repairs.
- All expenses to maintain mandated educational programs.
- All other budgeted items as determined by the Board of Education.

#### Who can vote on May 21, 2019?

You must be registered in the School District register or for the general election. In order to register, you must be 18 years of age, a citizen, and a resident in the School District for 30 days. If there is a question on voting day at the polls, inform the people at the polls you would like a contested ballot, complete it, and registration will be verified the next day.

#### Where do I register to vote?

You may register in each school office or at the District Office from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. through May 16, 2019.

#### May I cast an absentee ballot?

If you are a qualified voter and expect to be out of town on business, are hospitalized, or are on vacation, you may request an absentee ballot. Applications for absentee ballots may be secured at the Office of the School District Clerk, 19 Main Street, PO Box 310, Wallkill, New York 12589. Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the School District Clerk prior to 4:00 p.m. on May 13, 2019, if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter. After May 14, 2019, and on or prior to 4:00 p.m. on May 20, 2019, applications and ballots must be picked up at the Office of the School District Clerk. All absentee ballots must be received by the School District no later than 5:00 p.m. on May 21, 2019.

# Sophomores Selected for State Leadership Seminar



LABS. These brightly colored, inviting spaces promote hands-on physical activity in an exciting and fresh way. ABL Labs, which made their debut in Wallkill this year, were inspired by research that links movement and physical activity to increased academic performance.

When in the lab, students rotate between various stations that focus on the ten foundations of learning readiness: balance,

cardiovascular fitness, nutrition, visual tracking, mindfulness and problem-solving, cross lateralization, rhythm and sequencing, gross motor skills, fine motor skills, and strength and endurance. Among the space's enticing equipment are patterned walking mats, monkey-themed tossing games, caterpillar-shaped tunnels, wobbly chairs, and over-under bars.

Brielle Faia, a Kindergarten student at Ostrander Elementary School, was excited to be in her school's ABL Lab. "My favorite part is the pattern mat where you have to cross your feet," she said.

The District has plans to expand the equipment in these labs to accommodate higher grade levels. By supporting healthy, active students, the District hopes to promote better learners as well.

# Middle School Afterschool Clinic Incorporates Technology, Sewing

witches, circuits, sewing—and monsters! All this, and more, could be found at an afterschool academic enrichment clinic held at the Middle School this spring. The clinic, offered by Technology teacher Adam Seelig and Home and Career Skills teacher Evonne Falk, combined technology with sewing. The students made their own felt monsters, which featured light-up eyes and mouths.

"We are sewing electrical circuits into designs," said Mr. Seelig.

"The thread is metallic, so it acts as the conductor to complete the circuit. There are tons of other applications for this technology, such as running vests that light up to make runners more visible."

On a recent afternoon, some students were busy cutting, gluing, and stitching, while others examined the circuits, which were made of batteries, lights, switches, and buttons.

The clinic participants thoroughly enjoyed the hands-on lessons. "This is my first time sewing," said Grade 8 student Cody Wilbur. "I also learned how to use a glue gun, and I'm going to learn about circuits and conductivity."

This particular clinic runs for five weeks. Other clinics have focused on a variety of educational themes, ranging from how to make a handmade instrument to how to use crochet as a way to draw attention to threats to the world's coral reefs.





# Elementary School Students in Talented and Gifted Program Participate in FIRST LEGO League


This year, 32 elementary school students in the District's Talented and Gifted (TAG) program participated in the FIRST LEGO League's regional competitions. The League challenged the TAG students, who are in Grades 4-6, to think like scientists and engineers.

Throughout the year, students met after school with their building coaches to program their robots to conquer the kind of obstacles that astronauts might encounter in outer space. Their challenges coincided with this year's theme: Into Orbit. At the various competitions, students were judged not only on their robots' design and performance, but also on the League's Core Values: discovery, innovation, impact, inclusion, and teamwork.

Leptondale Elementary School placed first in the Core Values section. Typically, teams demonstrate their Core Values using posters or PowerPoint presentations that highlight working together as a team, but the Leptondale team took a different route. Students performed a song and dance that they wrote and created themselves, and Grade 6 student Jonathan McLaughlin played the ukulele. "We enjoyed working together to get things done with the song and dance," he said.

On April 9, the students from all three teams came together for the first time to share their designs, ideas, and troubleshoot. In addition, they demonstrated their competition projects to members of the Curriculum Committee, which recognized the students for their efforts.

#### **IBM Engineers Collaborate with Plattekill Students**

IT'S NOT EVERY DAY THAT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL STUDENTS HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO BUILD THEIR VERY OWN ROBOTS IN THE PRESENCE OF IBM ENGINEERS. However, during Plattekill Elementary School's annual IBM Day, held on March 21, students in Grades 2-6 were given the chance to do just that.

"This year, the goal of their STEM [Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math] lesson was to create a robotic arm," said Principal Monica Hasbrouck. She noted that the number of females among the six visiting engineers underscored that engineering is an equal-opportunity career path.

The classes were divided into teams of four to five students. Working with a common set of materials—wooden rulers, rubber bands, binder clips, paper cups, pieces of foam, and paper fasteners—the teams attempted to construct a device capable of picking up a crayon, a Matchbox car, a ping pong ball, and various other items. After testing their designs, the teams brainstormed to determine what changes, if any, might make their robotic arms perform better.

Mrs. Hasbrouck said the day promoted collaboration, problem solving, and in-depth discussions.

"The students were truly engaged and excited to participate in this activity," she said. "They look forward to IBM Day every year!"

# Wallkill's Stellar Strings Program

Strings feature prominently in Wallkill's award-winning music program, which boasts two grade-level orchestras and an honors orchestra at the elementary level, as well as orchestras at the Middle School and the High School.

"Our students start in 4th grade and can choose violin, viola, cello, or bass," explained District-Wide Music Coordinator Kirsten Rolon, who spoke with pride about the number of Wallkill string musicians recognized by the Ulster County Music Educators Association. "This year, we had 22 Elementary students and 15 Middle and High School students in our All-County program," she said.

The string program began at the elementary level under the direction of Edie Duncan, who directs the Elementary School Orchestras. "The elementary group averages 150-180 students, and the Honors Orchestra has been racking up NYSSMA golds and first place finishes at our spring festivals," she said.

Prior to starting the program, Mrs. Duncan was a General Music teacher at Plattekill and an advisor to the District's Talented and Gifted program. At the end of many District meetings, she recalled, administrators would ask if there was anything the District could do to promote higher-level thinking. "My answer was always 'Strings!" Mrs. Duncan said, "because without them, we rob children of two thirds of the Western symphonic orchestra!"

Kiersten Lestrange, in her first year at Wallkill, is the director of the Grade 7 Orchestra, the Grade 8 Orchestra, and the Grade 9-12 Orchestra. "The work of my predecessors is evident in the work ethic, dispositions, and skill levels of the students in the String program," she said.
