

The form requires tribal ID, enrollment number, name and address of parent of parent/legal guardian of child, and a signature of parent/guardian that verifies accuracy of info

JOM Program Requirements

Educational Plan: An annual plan is submitted by TYEP Manager Annual Reporting Needs Assessment: An annual needs assessment is submitted to TYEP Manager Student Eligibility.



Eligibility

Your student (k - 12) qualifies if they: are enrolled in a federally recognized tribe OR can prove they are a descendant of a federally recognized tribe AND must have forms on file with TYEP
