## Assembly Bill 247 (Muratsuchi), as introduced Sponsors' Letter of Support

Dear Chair Muratsuchi,

On behalf of the 58 county superintendent of schools and the California School Boards Association, which includes county boards of education, we write to respectfully request your support for Assembly Bill 906 (Gipson). AB 906 supports the students we serve by ensuring access to robust services and supports while being served by county juvenile court and community schools.

This year in particular, AB 906 is both critical and timely as the Legislature focuses is on preserving educational programs, prioritizing equity, and supporting the LCFF.

### AB 906 supports the students we serve in juvenile court and county community schools.

The educational leaders our organizations represent are proud to serve students through year-round juvenile court schools and county community schools. Under the Education Code, these schools are administered by county superintendents and are governed by county boards of education. These schools are an important safety net for students facing unique barriers to academic achievement and social-emotional well-being.

In general, a juvenile court school provides public education for students who are incarcerated in facilities operated by county probation departments. A county community school provides opportunities for students to prepare for post-secondary education, meet graduation requirements, access quality prenatal and parenting education, receive health and services, and more. (In California, county community schools are distinguishable from Community Schools, a designation under the California Community Schools Partnership Program, enacted in 2021, though the two types of programs often provide similar Whole Child services.)

Often, students enrolled in a juvenile court or county community school:

- Have higher rates of trauma requiring mental health support.
- Unable to receive specialized supports in comprehensive setting.
- Are significantly more likely to qualify for special education supports and services.
- Enter with credit deficiency and significant unfinished learning.

In both settings, these schools are designed to support the achievement of all students through individualized academic, social-emotional, and career-technical education courses of study. The teachers, paraeducators, and staff serving our students are highly specialized. They often serve multiple grade levels, in multiple subjects, and use restorative and inclusionary practices. Students frequently attend juvenile court and community schools for a short period of time and ultimately return to a comprehensive school. For most students, the goal is to eventually return to a comprehensive high school setting after receiving academic and other services at a juvenile court or community school.

## Students referred to juvenile court and community school students are underserved by an exclusively attendance-based funding model.

The Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) provides resources to juvenile court schools and county community schools on the basis of a school's average daily attendance (ADA) during the current school year. This is different from how school districts are funded. The Education Code allows a school district's ADA to be smoothed over a three-year period to ensure stable funding and effective staffing may be achieved.

Because our schools operate year-round and have highly specialized staffing needs, costs are relatively fixed. But actual funding (based on ADA) is highly variable since students enter and exit the schools frequently throughout the calendar year. Attendance is based on referrals from probation departments, school districts, and families. The decline in referrals has outpaced statewide declining enrollment trends – which is positive – but it does not change the baseline need for these programs to continue offering high-quality educational services. Juvenile court and county community schools therefore experience significant revenue volatility, which impacts our ability to retain highly qualified and preserve the specialized services offered to students.

Additionally, much like a Necessary Small School, county programs must continue to exist for the benefit of students regardless of whether a school's ADA, particularly in lower-enrolled schools, is sufficient to core basic staffing and program needs. Higher enrolled schools face their own funding inadequacy as the per-pupil cost of a juvenile court or community school are generally much greater than in a comprehensive high school setting due to the need for additional services and smaller classes arising from required separation between specified students or groups of students for safety. In the end, many county offices of education backfill the insufficient LCFF revenue using local contributions, which may reduce revenue used for other state and local priorities. The result is funding inequity across the 58 counties, as the ability to backfill differs by county office.

In the end, our current system of funding juvenile court and community schools has a deeply unequal effect on California's ability to serve all students.

### AB 906 is essential to equitably serving students attending juvenile court and county community schools.

AB 906 will benefit students attending juvenile court schools and county community schools by establishing a base funding level that will support the unique staffing and programming necessary offered in these schools. By establishing base funding levels, smaller and medium sized programs will be able to maintain specialized staff and services for students. By augmenting the LCFF to reflect the historical cost ratio with school districts, AB 906 recognizes the greater level of services required in juvenile court and county community school settings. Finally, by authorizing juvenile court and county community schools to utilize the same methodology as school districts when calculating attendance, AB 906 will enhance county offices' ability to staff and plan according to students' needs.

## Resolution 2023-04 Resolution in Support of Funding for County Office of Education Operated Juvenile Court and Community Schools

WHEREAS, juvenile court and community schools are operated by county offices of education to provide public education for students;

WHEREAS, students enrolled in court and community schools need individualized academic, social-emotional learning, and career technical education courses of study; and

WHEREAS, juvenile court schools provide public education for students who are incarcerated in facilities operated by county probation departments; and

WHEREAS, community schools provide opportunities for students to prepare for post-secondary education, meet graduation requirements, college and career transition support, access quality prenatal and parenting education, and receive health and mental services; and

WHEREAS, students attending a juvenile court or community school have unique needs, including higher rates of trauma requiring mental health support; obstacles to receiving specialized supports in a comprehensive school setting; a need for specialized supports and services; credit deficiency and unfinished learning; and more; and

WHEREAS, the teachers, paraeducators, and staff at juvenile court and community schools are highly specialized, able to serve multiple grade levels, multiple subjects, use restorative practices and inclusionary practices; and

WHEREAS, students attending juvenile court and community schools are underserved by the current attendance-based funding model, known as "average daily attendance" ("ADA"); and

WHEREAS, juvenile court and community schools have unpredictable enrollment levels throughout a school year, while their specialized staffing costs remain consistent; and

WHEREAS, the ADA-only funding model does not support core and ongoing staffing needs and does not account for the variable enrollment and attendance of the court and community school model; and

WHEREAS, the ADA-only funding model does not account for the complexity of the realignment of the Department of Juvenile Justice affecting many counties; and

WHEREAS, an ADA-only funding model creates inequitable programs across the 58 counties.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Superintendent of Schools and the Yuba County Board of Education urge the State Legislature and Governor's Administration to support sustainable fiscal resources for the provision of public education and college and career transition for youth enrolled in juvenile court and community schools by establishing a funding formula that supports the provision of academic, college and career readiness, and social-emotional services.
