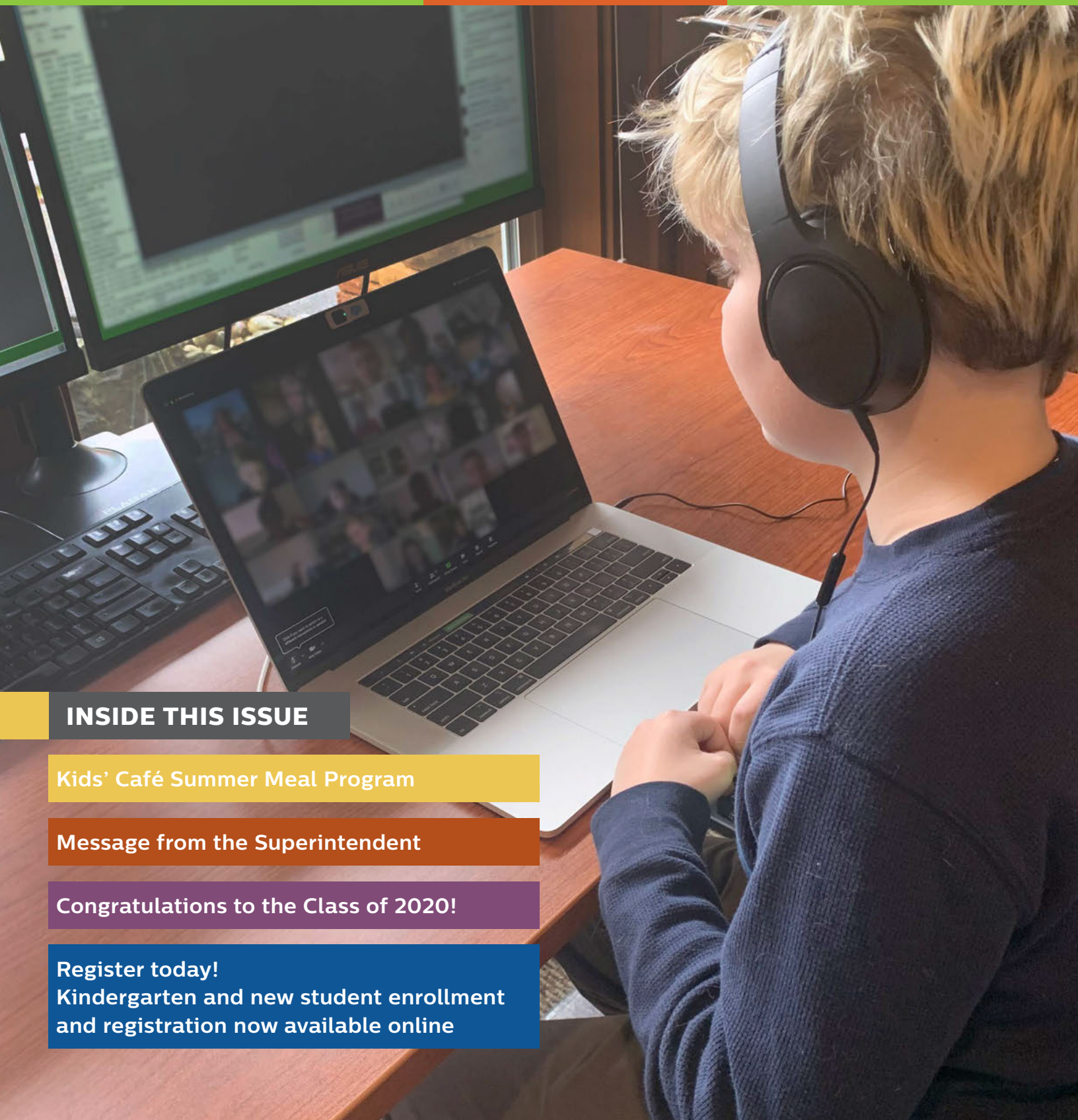

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Message from the *Superintendent*

Dear families and friends,

COVID-19 has forced all of us to navigate uncharted waters. In mid-March with the closure of all schools across the state, K-12 education had to quickly transition from traditional teaching models to an online remote model. This change was not simple, and I am incredibly proud of the hard work and dedication everyone has extended to make sure our students have been able to access valuable learning throughout this global health crisis.

Despite the fact that our schools and classrooms have been closed, we remained steadfast in our goals of delivering learning through remote access, providing safe and supportive environments, wisely allocating resources, engaging with our families and community, and planning for the future. I am proud of our work to meet the challenges and to take care of our students, staff, families and each other.

- Access to learning – Early in this crisis, more than 3,000 laptops and other devices were distributed to students so they could engage in remote learning with their teachers and classmates. Our teachers, staff and administrators have played an important role in educating our students during this challenging time. However, this was a joint effort, and none of this would have been possible without the support we've received from parents, families and our community.
- Meal distributions – During the closure, each day more than 4,000 meals are being distributed (along more than 40 district stops) to more than 2,000 district students. Special thanks to district food service, transportation and classified staff for making this monumental effort possible! We are also fortunate that our Kids' Café will be able to continue delivering meals throughout the summer months. - Childcare – We are grateful to our community partnerships with the Boys and Girls Club of Snohomish County and the YMCA of Snohomish County. Thanks to these two amazing organizations, free childcare opportunities have been made available for our district first responders and health care workers.

I would like to call your attention to one group that has been particularly impacted by the school closures – the Class of 2020. I know it has not been easy, and I would like to recognize this group for its perseverance, dedication, and tenacity. Inside this issue of School Views you will see a listing of our more than 840 graduates from AIM High School, Glacier Peak High School and Snohomish High School. Congrats Class of 2020! We are proud of you for your individual and collective achievements, and I am certain you will do great things!

K-12 education is a core institution of our society, and we've been called upon to completely reinvent our model and meet the needs of our students, families and communities. I am confident we will get through this and will be stronger as we move forward.

Thank you for your ongoing support of our students, staff and families. As always, please stay safe and healthy!
