



Importance of student attendance



Did you know?

- Attending school on-time, all day, every day will give your child the best chance of graduating from high school.
- Starting in kindergarten, missing on average just two days a month, whether excused or unexcused, makes it more likely that your child will not meet academic standards in math and reading by third grade.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.
- By 9th grade, regular attendance is a better predictor of high school graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.

What you can do:

 Don't let your child stay home unless they are truly sick, such as fever, vomiting, diarrhea, or a contagious rash.

- Avoid appointments and travel when school is in session.
- Keep track of your child's attendance. Missing more than nine days, excused or unexcused, could put your child at risk of falling behind.
- Set a regular bedtime and morning routine as well as finishing homework and packing backpacks the night before.
- Have a back-up plan in place with family members, neighbors, or other parents for getting your child to school in case something comes up.
- If you are struggling to get your child to school for any reason, we are here to support you and work with you towards possible solutions.
 Please do not hesitate to contact the school office to schedule an appointment to discuss your child's attendance.

How to report your child's absence

An absence will be considered excused when a written note or phone call is received from a parent or legal guardian to the school attendance line/office within 48 hours of the absence.



Community support for and passage of the school district's February 2014 Levy for Instructional Technology Improvements helped ensure critical funding for district programs and priorities. Of the community's approximate \$8 million financial investment since January 2015:

- About 34% funded infrastructure including hardware and software support, repairs and maintenance, emergency response communications, networks, servers and storage.
- About 32% funded classroom instruction, equipment, desktop replacements, laptops, mobile computing carts, laptop peripherals, stands and cabinets, displays and LCD monitors, wireless keyboards and mice, microphones, SmartBoards, document cameras, projector refresh, bulb replacement and specialty furniture.
- About 20% funded support including contracted hardware and software support, systems engineer, technicians, digital learning specialists, building technology support and teacher training.
- About 9% funded academic software licensing including Office 365 and software and curriculum licenses.
- About 5% funded large-venue audio visual, including maintenance and repairs to equipment in commons, gyms and shared areas, and new installations at seven schools.


