Andy Thompson


Interim Transportation Supervisor

A MESSAGE FROM THE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

As we bid farewell to our 2022-23 graduating student-athletes and welcome our returning and new student-athletes, I would like to reflect on a few accomplishments from the 2023 spring sports season. A few highlights from the season include a student-athlete on the golf team shooting a 33 in a match, a softball pitcher breaking the career strike-out record and the track team winning against tough competition. Additionally, our baseball team won sectionals and was a runner-up in regionals, and all of our varsity spring sports teams earned the New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA) Scholar-Athlete award. We wish our seniors the best of luck in the next chapter of their lives, we know they are ready for it.

During the start of the varsity baseball season, it was slow, but quickly turned around causing the team to be the most dominant and balanced team in Class D. The baseball program was under the command of first-year Head Coach Eric Enos, who was assisted by his son and Oriskany alumni Matt Enos. The teams' collaboration throughout the season earned the Class D sectional title and runner-up at the state regional tournament. The team was welcomed home after winning the NYSPHSAA Sectionals with an escort by the Oriskany Police and Fire Departments from Exit 32 near Cider St., through the Village of Oriskany, to the high school.

Junior Gavin Howd shot a 33 at the Westmoreland Golf Course this season and became one of five golfers representing Oriskany at the Regional Golf Tournament. Gavin honored Oriskany CSD by making it to the second round of the state competition.

Senior softball pitcher Juliet Tagliaferri broke the all-time strike-out record with 315 strike-outs. Juliet's record shattered the previous which was held by Jennifer Buehler at 268 strike-outs.

An ongoing goal of athletics is to have all of our teams earn the Scholar-Athlete award. To receive the Scholar-Athlete award, the team's average GPA for 75% of the roster must be greater than or equal to 90.00. For the sixth consecutive sports season, all of our varsity teams have earned the Scholar-Athlete award. Our school will earn the School of Distinction status by having 100% of its varsity teams qualify for and receive the Scholar-Athlete team award during their respective sports seasons. This will be the second year in a row that Oriskany Central School has earned this prestigious award.

During the month of June, seniors Juliet Tagliaferri and Jack Tamburino were honored as student-athletes at the SRC arena in Syracuse by NYSPHSAA Section III for having the highest GPAs of Oriskany student-athletes.

Another accomplishment for the Oriskany Athletic Department and student-athletes was having our own Kaelyn Buehler sit on the NYSPHSAA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC). The SAAC was developed to give student-athletes a voice within the NYSPHSAA. Over the course of the school year, the committee discussed topics relevant to high school student-athletes and developed ways to maintain a positive athletic experience. Each committee member is expected to exemplify leadership while providing feedback on NYSPHSAA special programs, including but not limited to, Scholar-Athletes, Sportsmanship, Life of an Athlete, Student Leadership and Community Service. Congratulations Kaelyn and thank you for representing the Oriskany Athletic Department.

The NYSPHSAA has added a new spectator regulation to the NYSPHSAA guidelines that follows spectator regulation. The Oriskany CSD abides by these regulations and has included them in the athletic handbook. Congratulations to the students who earned their HSED in the 2022-23 school year!

Welcome back to Oriskany Central School for a new academic year, 2023-24! For families who are new to Oriskany, welcome to our "family." We welcome Ms. Emma Rogers to our Special Programs team; Emma will be teaching at the Jr./Sr. high school and remotely with the alternative high school.

Our summer has been busy with preparations for an exciting year ahead. Our goals for the new year are to extend our programs into community connections and look for disability awareness activities and information throughout the year. Additionally, we will continue our outreach to all families in and out of District programs to participate in OCS extracurricular school activities.

As we continue to navigate the post-COVID-19 instructional world, a group of K-12 general education teachers, special education teachers and a social worker participated in a summer book study for "Help for Billy." This group prepared for a difficult but amazing journey building resiliency and hope from strong connections with caring adults and students, using trauma-informed strategies in our classrooms.

At the elementary school, we are creating a "Therapy Suite" to facilitate our integrated therapy group model. Speech therapy, occupational therapy and physical therapy will collaborate on scheduling and integration. In addition to individual sessions, students will work on multiple therapeutic goals at one time, increasing their time in the classroom and gaining skills for success.

Grades three through six will be implementing Sonday Essentials as a Rtl Tier II intervention. The Sonday System Essentials Program is

a proven multisensory phonics instruction, implemented in general education classrooms to help quickly identify those students who could benefit from reading intervention. These 20 minute lessons will be implemented during scheduled Rtl time.

Both the elementary and Jr./Sr. high schools are shifting to a six-day cycle. This will also shift in students' Individual Education Program (IEP) services. Daily recommended services will continue, but be reflected on the IEP 6/6 days. If a service is proportional, please look for information in the mail to accurately reflect the service recommendations.

Additionally, our RtI Teams will experience some shifts. Our kindergarten through six instructional support teams will be facilitated by Mrs. Stephanie McLaughlin, school psychologist, and the seven through 12 team will continue to be facilitated by Ms. Claudette Cronauer. If you have questions or concerns regarding your child's programs, please first reach out to their classroom teacher/school counselor and then case manager for 504/CSE students. Mr. Kennedy, Mrs. Mucurio and I are always available.

CSE & 504 Annual Review meetings will continue to be held in the month of your child's birthday at the site of their program, if available. I look forward to an amazing year.

FOOD SERVICE INFORMATION

The Child Nutrition Programs are operated in each building by the OHM BOCES School Food Service team. We are pleased to announce that in the 2023-24 school year, we will be operating under the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) -- meaning all meals are FREE to all students!

The OHM BOCES strives to provide students with tasty, nutritious, fresh, foods that appeal to students and the school community. We have continually exceeded federal and state guidelines for all required nutrients and increased our offerings of fresh fruit and vegetables. Farm to School items and programming are improving our students' connections to fresh food and resources. The menu balances student preference, commodity foods, and locally sourced foods that are fresh, fun and encourage students to explore new flavors and new preparations.

Each student has their own meal account with an assigned pin number. Please be sure to help your children learn their numbers, especially if they are new participants. You can also use this account to make payments for a la carte items; checks made out to OHM BOCES Food Service, or online prepayments (ezschoolpay. com) are preferable, though cash in a labeled envelope is also an option.

Because we are operating under CEP this year, families do not need to fill out free/reduced meal applications. However, it is helpful to your school if you complete the income collection form available at ezmealapp.com. PDFs and hard copies are also available. Eligible families may qualify for benefits such as waived test fees.


While complete meals are FREE, single items like milk will still be charged to student accounts. Milk this year will be \$0.75. Other a la carte items such as frozen yogurt, baked chips and whole grain cookies will be available for purchase most days in the school cafeterias. Prices on those items range from \$0.75-\$2.00. There is no charging of a la carte items, meaning students must have a positive account balance or cash in hand in order to purchase.

Please sign up for an ezschoolpay.com account! This is an excellent way to monitor your children's meals and a la carte purchases. These accounts are free to set up and use, and you can even set up email reminders for when a balance gets low! If you choose to use them for prepayment, a small fee is incurred with each transaction.
