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SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Parents, Guardians, Families and Community Members,

As I write this communicate to you, it's hard to believe that we are in week seven of the school year already. The summer season quickly passed us by and we are already well into the fall season – chillier weather, fall foliage and the continuous raking of leaves and twigs into large green plastic bags that once adorned the front and back lawn. If anything, it's great exercise and fresh air.

Halloween pumpkins and jack-o-lanterns will have come and gone only to be replaced by strings of multi-colored holiday lighting and decorations comprised of snowflakes, gingerbread men and peppermint swirled candy canes hanging from pine trees.

By the time you receive this message, we will have closed out, or come close to closing out, the first marking period of the school year. To date, we will have completed approximately 10 weeks of school.

Much has occurred since my last writing and much is coming our way as the school year progresses into the new year.

This year we began our educational pathway back to the 2022-2023 school year by having our staff attend two professional development days held on August 31 and September 1, just prior to the Labor Day weekend.

One of our major presentations to start off our school year was having our staff attend the Liz Murray, **From Homeless to Harvard** presentation held at the Stanley Theater on September 1. The professional development session was an awesome opening day workshop – so powerful, so meaningful and as relevant for our staff and our mission as a school district to, "Educate, Engage, and Empower Students to Excel in an Ever-Changing World."

I wanted to share with you a brief of what the Liz Murray presentation entailed.

The child of drug-addicted parents who routinely ate from dumpsters and sought refuge at all-night subway stations to survive, Liz Murray was homeless at age 15 and fending for her life. Determined not to be defined by her circumstances, she recognized education as the key to a fresh beginning and a whole new way of living. She earned her high school diploma in just two years and won a scholarship to Harvard University that would turn her bleak circumstances into a future filled with limitless possibility. With sincerity, maturity and graciousness, Murray takes audiences along on her personal journey from street smarts to classroom triumphs, instantly becoming an inspiration to both student groups and business audiences alike in need of the motivation to overcome their own obstacles.

This particular presentation, for our staff, touched wonderfully on the following:

- Growth mindset
- Students coming from challenging economical situations
- Personal and situational environments
- Relationships and how critically important they are for our students
- The power, influence and effect teachers, staff, administration and Boards of Education can have on our students

As we continue to lay the groundwork in providing a multitude of excellent academic and extracurricular programs and activities for our students here at Oriskany, it is equally important to equip our students with the support and skill sets needed in facing life's everyday obstacles and challenges. MESSAGES FROM THE PRINCIPALS

The 2022-2023 school year is off to a great start. Our Back to School Night was a tremendous success. We had 7th and 9th grade orientation, as well as Chromebook orientation for all new students. The night ended with a meet and greet with all of our staff. For me, it was wonderful meeting so many new people and getting to know our community. During the first week of school, I was able to meet with each grade individually during their class meetings. We went over expectations and procedures for the year. I spent my first month getting to know the staff here at the Jr./Sr. high, as well as getting acquainted with all 241 students in grades 7 through 12.

We have also had an outstanding fall sports season with our teams, coaches and fans. Parental support here at Oriskany is positive, supportive and encouraging. I am really impressed by all 102 student athletes on the field and in the classroom. Our football team, cheerleading team and boys varsity and modified soccer teams have been combined with Westmoreland. This year's Spirit Week was September 19-24 and included a variety of activities designed to promote school spirit and a sense of community. Spirit Week was capped off with a pep rally on Friday night and Maroon and White Dance Saturday night. It was great to have the community back at the pep rally this year.

It has also been encouraging to see the 21 clubs that the Jr./Sr. high has to offer. This year, Mr. Lallier started a Robotics Club for the first time. Also, Mr. Buck is in the process of creating a Sports Management Club. The club aims to educate athletes and non-athletes on the behind the scenes operations of athletics. This involves the oversight of nearly all aspects of an athletic program. For instance, the Sports Management Club will have knowledge and be hands-on with facility management, event planning, game day operations, inventory management, understanding and formulating budgets and purchasing. The club will take part in marketing and social media, videography and photography. TATF also had a blood drive on September 30. There is currently a blood shortage and each donation could possibly save a life. The blood drive collected 21 units of blood, with five first time student donors!

Each day, students are encouraged to stay during the student activity period from 2:30-2:55 p.m. in the afternoon. This is a great way to pre-arrange support from one of their teachers and catch up on any work they need to complete. Additionally, the Academic Enrichment Program will begin soon for an opportunity to provide students with in-person academic support. An email/phone notification will come out with the starting date of the program. Students will be provided support from certified teachers from 3:00-5:00 p.m. every Tuesday and Thursday in the Jr./Sr. high school library. Food is provided, and there will be a late bus at 5:00 p.m. I hope that students take advantage of these supportive programs that we offer to benefit their academics.

The Student Council invited all Oriskany students, teachers and staff to walk around the village on October 26 in support of Bully Prevention Month.

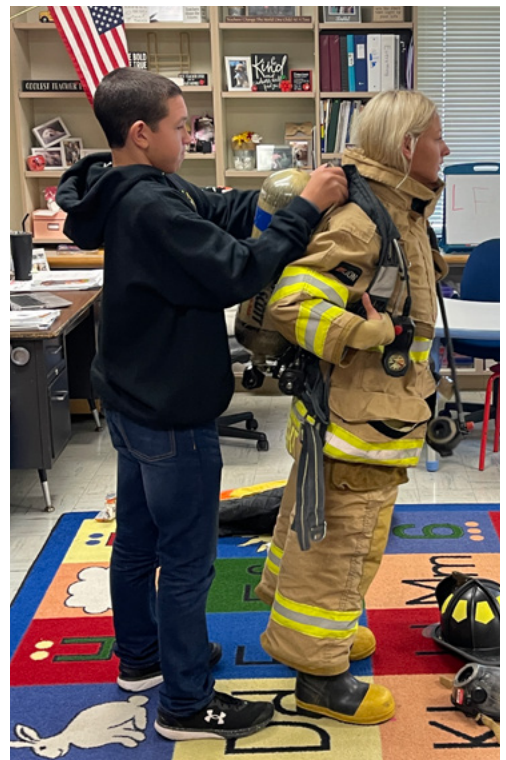

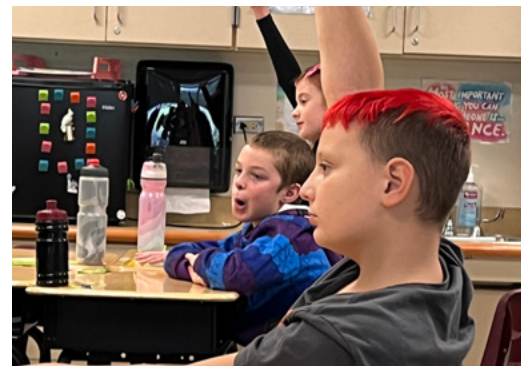
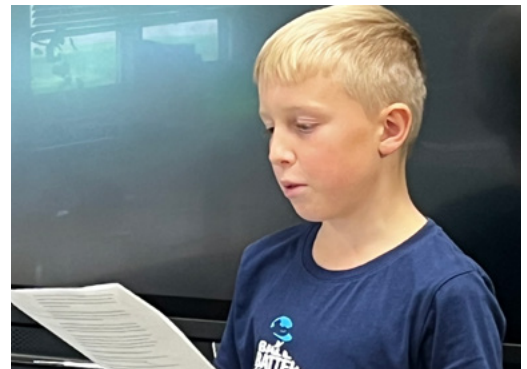
Fifth Grade

Each spring, students like Gabrielle prepare a solo to perform at the New York State School Music Association (NYSSMA) Solo Festival in front of an adjudicator and receive a rating. Those scores are used to determine which students will be accepted into the various All-State performing ensembles. The chosen students represent the best school musicians that Herkimer, Oneida and Oswego counties have to offer.

The festival will be held November 18 and 19, and includes two vocal ensembles and two instrumental ensembles. Gabrielle will be performing with the treble choir. She is the first student from Oriskany selected for this festival since 2015. She will work with Jr./Sr. High School Choir Director Mrs. Gutowski to learn the music before mid-November, and guest conductor Morgan Jolley of Ithaca College will prepare and polish the choir for the performance. Festival organizers shared with students that “we have chosen some challenging music with the belief that you will rise to the challenge and with the faith that each of you has the personal and musical integrity to follow through with this responsibility.”

The culminating concert of the festival will be held at Little Falls High School on Saturday, November 19 at 3:00 p.m. Tickets will be sold at the door and will cost \$4 for adults and \$3 for students. Congratulations to Gabrielle and the other student musicians on this honor!



Commended Students Named in the 2023

NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

As announced by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, Ryan Donohue, the son of Edward and Kimberly Donohue and a high school senior at Oriskany Jr./Sr. High School has been named a Commended Student. A Letter of Commendation from the school and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) was presented by Principal Andrew Kennedy.

About 34,000 Commended Students throughout the nation are being recognized for their exceptional academic promise. Although they will not participate in the 2023 competition for National Merit Scholarship Awards, Commended students placed among the top 50,000 students who entered the 2023 competition by taking the 2021 Preliminary SAT/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT).

“Those being named Commended Students have demonstrated outstanding potential for academic success,” commented a spokesperson for NMSC. “These students represent a valuable national resource; recognizing their accomplishments, as well as the key role their schools play in their academic development, is vital to the advancement of educational excellence in our nation.
