




Calligraphy Practice

The AP Biology class completed a lab on cell communication. For this lab they tasted different foods (sugar, broccoli, salt, sauce, and lemons), with their normal taste buds. They then retasted the foods after washing their mouth with an herbal tea. This tea disrupts the cell communication and alters the taste buds. For example, sugar and sugar products can no longer be tasted after consumption. This tea is sometimes used by diabetics for this exact reason. Students completed the lab and then had a discussion on why exactly this disruption occurs, based on information obtained in this unit. They did confirm that the tea did not make the broccoli taste any better!













After weeks of preparation 6 students from the music department traveled to Clinton on January 11th to audition for the OCMEA Jr. High All County Festival. 






Oriskany Alumni Association Student of the Month...
