Out-of-School Time

- High-quality, engaging, and accessible before, during, afterschool, and summer experiences
- Our three biggest areas of work are...
 - After-School Academy: 21st Century Community Learning Centers
 - OST Partnerships: We currently partner with nearly 100 partner organizations serving our students in the OST space
 - Summer Dreamers Academy & Summer Program Coordination

Fast Facts:

- 300 in-coming PPS kindergarteners served
- Camper attendance was approx. 70%
- 6 locations (3 with Summer Dreamers & 3 in ECE Centers)
- Followed the Summer Dreamers model academics in the morning (Big Day for PreK) & enrichment in the afternoon (The Carnegie Science Center, Gateway to the Arts, WQED's PBS Kids, The Children's Museum, & the Carnegie Library)
- Program funding was provided by MDRC.

- "My daughter felt love & encouragement from her teachers. She enjoyed the classroom activities & would often want to recreate them at home."
- "Thank you for working with my son this summer. I just want to add that this free programming is great for parents like us, otherwise the cost would make it impossible to give our children these experiences."

- "My daughter made new friends & learned about topics that were not yet discussed in preschool."








The main objectives of Little Dreamers Academy were to:

- Served over 100 scholars from Hill District,
 Homewood, and West End neighborhoods
 - Over 6-week camp, average daily scholar attendance was 71%!
 - Unique Summer Academy activities:
 - 3-day stay at Robert Morris University for college immersion
 - Visits to corporate headquarters of Covestro, Giant Eagle,
 Koppers, Lamar Advertising, and McKinsey
 - Culminating event: Olympics of the Mind curriculum/athletic challenges



2018 Programming Highlights









In 2018, the Summer Dreamers Academy:

- Expanded to 4 sites (three K-5, and one 6-8)
- Served over 1,500 Campers (1,523)
- Employed 185 District staff
- Employed 43 youth workers
- Partnered with 18 community organizations who led 27 enrichment activities

SDA Statistics from 2018

	Summer Dreamers (Average)	PPS (Average)
African American	64% (975)	52%
Economically Disadvantaged	75% (1142)	63%
IEP	23% (350)	19%
English Language Learners	11% (146)	5%

Regular attendance rate (at least 20 days attended) was 49%

- Average attendance days: 17
- Average daily attendance: 63%

Parent & Teacher Feedback

Parent Feedback:

- 100% agree their child enjoyed their time
- 97% agree their child tried something new
- 95% believe their child benefitted academically

Teacher Feedback:

- 98% agree that faculty and staff enjoy teaching at SDA
- 95% agree that SDA helped them to become better teachers
- 85% learned skills or techniques that will be applicable to their school year


