In Temple City Unified School District, we will use A-G funding to increase and improve services for foster youth, low-income students, and English Learners to improve A-G eligibility by:

- a. Providing teachers, administrators, and counselors with professional development opportunities to improve the LEA's A–G completion rate.
- b. Developing comprehensive advising plans and pupil supports, including tutoring programs, to improve the LEA's A–G completion rate.
- c. Expanding access to coursework or other opportunities to satisfy A–G course requirements to all pupils
- d. Advanced Placement unduplicated pupils.

A description of the extent to which all students, including foster youth, low-income students, and English learners, will have access to A-G courses approved by the University of California.

Temple City Unified School District will direct A–G Success Grant funds towards pupils in danger of not achieving a grade of "C" or better in A–G courses, which will include students who are foster youth, low-income, and English Learners. on the 2022 Dashboard, we had 64.8% of students in the combined four- and five-year graduation rate who met the University of California (UC) or California State University (CSU) a-g criteria with a grade of C or better (or Pass). Specifically our percentage of EL is at 41.6%, and our low-income is at 56.4% (California Dashboard 2022). It is the intent for us to use A-G funding to continue to increase this number of students annually.

Summer school was offered for the students who had D and F grades once we were able to come back to school in-person. This did create a challenge with filing teaching positions and we had a shortage in staff. Apex was offered during the school year as a credit recovery option.

This A-G Completion Improvement Grant supplements the services provided in the Local Control Accountability Plan as it relates to Goal 2: Create engagement and opportunities for student academic and social-emotional success. Specifically, TCUSD has money allocation to 2.10 Summer School and 2.11 Intervention Support. The A-G grant will continue to support these initiatives within the LCAP.
