

UB Architecture Students Come Full Circle with Art Class

Professors Joyce Hwang and Chris Romano presented architectural drawings from students in the Masters of Architecture program at UB to celebrate the life of Sydney Gross who was a former UB Art and Architecture student. Many of the students who presented ideas in February to the Medina Junior-Senior High School students in Jennifer Scott's class have graduated from UB's Architecture program. This graduate level course will continue with new students and two returning students in the Fall to further refine and develop the ideas for the living memorial. Joanna Pacheco, the Capital Planning Manager for the New York Power Authority and lead architect for Reimagining the Canals, talked about using public spaces to connect people to the water.



In February, there were three main ideas for the installation: a playground, a not-a-wall space, and rock musical wall monument. The professors talked about how the ideas from community members in Medina and students from Medina Jr.-Sr. High School helped to inform where the project is now in June. All of the ideas for the memorial (making the memorial a space for reflection and enjoyment, a place of joy, integrating art and music, making it a space for giving and taking, including places for individual expression within the collective, and making the memorial a place for building community) are part of the design process that came from student comments and community input. They mentioned how Sydney's favorite colors are pink and purple and how that might be added through colored stone or glass into cement pieces

that can fit together like a puzzle. They also talked about adding colored gels high on poles to cast colored shadows in the area. Professor Hwang mentioned the work of Aldo van Eyck and specifically affordances for play and how his work is influencing the project. The art installation is now moving toward playful, curved cement modules that can be cast and configured into community spaces. Another idea is to create negative space holes that can have "plug-ins" which can change in and out.

The Medina Jr.-Sr. students commented on the renderings as well as offered feedback on various ideas regarding building community involvement. Being included in this process was a great way for the high school students to gain a real-world understanding of long-term projects and group work. It also inspired several students to research different college careers and understand the amount of work required in a graduate university program.


Medina Grads Celebrate Commencement at Vets Park






FFA's Animal Appreciation Day Huge Hit
