

Author Visit Highlights Depression and Mental Health

Medina Jr-Sr High School recently played host to author Bree Barton. She has penned four books: *Heart of Thorns, Tears of Frost, Soul of Cinder* and her latest *Zia Erases the World*.

High School librarian Jennifer O'Toole invited Ms. Barton and Julie Berry, from the Author's Note Bookstore, to talk to 7th graders in the library on April 28th. Ms. Barton talked with the students about her experiences with depression and how she started experiencing those feelings in the 6th grade. "It came on very suddenly and in the nineties nobody was really talking about mental health. It is a very confusing situation for kids and I am hoping by sharing my story, it may be helpful to students here."

Her experience with depression inspired her book *Zia Erases the World*. The story centers on Zia and her challenge of finding the right words for the fear that is growing inside of her. She settles on a word of her own making: Shadoom. When she stumbles upon a family heirloom: the C. Scuro Dictionary, 13th edition, she



realizes in its magical pages she has the ability to erase words that remind her of Shadoom. The consequences of her actions has some funny and heartbreaking moments, but ultimately allows her to get help and overcome her dark moments and reach for the light.

She shared with the students what her life was like in the sixth grade and the challenges she faced as a child of a single mom who moved almost every year. "I was not cool," she told the students. "We were poor and I wore hand-me-down clothing. I was depressed and very sad. I spent a lot of time in the library because books are a great way to escape. I started writing fantasy when I was 10 years old and submitting my stories to editors when I was 11. I got a lot of rejection notices. When some mean girls at school made fun of me, I quit writing for quite a while because their comments really hurt me."

She eventually began writing again in high school. "I had a tough time, but eventually I found a way back to myself and I had my mom and other adults that I could talk to about what I was feeling and they helped me. I took up dancing and getting healthier physically helped me to get healthier mentally. She read a chapter from Zia and also discussed with the students what it is like to be an author and her journey as a writer. She also answered questions from the students. Mrs. O'Toole says this about Ms. Barton's talk, "It was a pleasure to host Bree and to learn more about her background and the inspiration for her work. I think her honesty and life story was relatable and truly resonated with our students. I am thrilled to be working with Julie Berry & the Author's Note Bookstore to bring authors in-person to speak with Medina students. It's such a valuable, worthwhile, and fun learning experience for students to take part in."

World War II Connection Shared in Class

During a recent study of World War II in Miss Martin and Mr. Dockery's High School Global History class, Padraigh Crowley told the story of his great grandfather, Charles Owen.

The class read an article written by Virginia Kropf that appeared in a newspaper several years ago, and Padraigh added information that his father and grandmother have passed down to him.

Padraigh shared that his great grandfather, Mr. Owen, was a waist gunner on a B-17 bomber during World War II with the 369th squadron of the 306th Bombardment group. On his 43rd mission, his plane was shot down over Germany and he was taken prisoner. He was sent to an interrogation camp where the Germans presented him with much information about his background. He found out later that there were Nazi sympathizers in Medina who were sending information to the Germans.

He was taken to a prison camp, Stalag 7, where he endured many hardships. He was then moved to Stalag 17, a 600-mile trip in a boxcar. There was no food, water, or bathroom facilities. At the beginning of the war, Mr. Owen weighed 159 pounds. When he returned home to Medina, he weighed 85 pounds.

By 1945, it was apparent that the Germans would lose the war. They did not want to surrender to the Russians because Germany invaded Russia during the war and had committed terrible atrocities while they were there. The Germans marched their prisoners, including Mr. Owen, 400 miles to meet the Americans. It was very cold and there was little food. Mr. Owen said that the only thing that kept them going was that they knew that they were going to be turned over to the Allies.



After the prisoners were turned over to the Allies, they were flown to France where they were going to be sent by boxcar to a hospital. General Dwight Eisenhower, Commander of the Allied Expeditionary Force in Europe, made arrangements for the prisoners to be sent by passenger car instead. Mr. Owen met Eisenhower one day when he came in and sat at his table to explain how they would be sent back home.

Padraigh also included that Mr. Owen was in training with the well-known actor, Clark Gable, who starred in the movie classic, Gone with the Wind.

During his later years, it was easier for Mr. Owen to retell his story. He talked about the importance of students hearing veterans tell of their experiences. He said, "When we're gone, it will be gone." Mr. Owen would be pleased to know that his great grandson has continued to tell his story.

Medina CSD Encourages Reading All Summer Long

The Medina Central School District wants students and their families to keep on reading all summer long. Students in Pre-Kindergarten through grade five all received a summer reading bag to take home. These bags contain

not only books but other items that support the science of reading approach in learning to read.





"For the past two years, we have partnered with The Reading League to educate our teachers on how to approach reading instruction based on brain research," says Julie Webber, Director of Curriculum and Instruction. "We want our students to be successful in ALL content areas and this requires them to be proficient readers. This investment in staff professional learning will take time but we expect to see our students' reading proficiency increase and therefore have higher achievement in math, science, social studies and many other areas."

Mrs. Webber would like family and community members to be a part of students' efforts in learning to read. "Humans are born with the natural abilities to hear and speak. Reading must be explicitly taught - what does a letter look like, sound like, how to write it, etc. The more students can hear and speak language in storytelling and conversations, the more connections they will be able to make when they learn to read," Webber says. "We can all support early readers by simply having meaningful conversations with them and reading to them."

The summer reading bags were assembled by high school students before their final day of class. Included in the bag is a Mighty Mustang Reader bookmark that contains a QR code to access a website with district students and staff reading their favorite books. Webber says this is just another way that students can build their vocabulary knowledge by listening to stories from some familiar people. You can access the Mighty Mustang Readers page on the District website.

The District also recently hosted a Mustang Parent Academy session for parents, grandparents and caregivers on how to support their child's reading efforts. Another session will be offered in the Fall about the Science of Reading approach.



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
