The twenty students, who took part, had a great time meeting with members of the community (estimated to be over 300) and educating them about their animals and the products they make along with some demonstrations. Brooke Moden, the FFA Chapter Reporter says, "For the first year doing this, we had a great turnout and our FFA team had a great time interacting with the community and telling them what our AgEd program is all about. We loved educating our visitors about the animals and we allowed them to walk them and get super close to them. We have much planned for our farm and we hope for it to grow bigger and better as the years come."

Mr. Eick says he got nothing but positive feedback about the weekend. "Most attendees were surprised and amazed that Medina CSD supported a real working farm on campus as a hands-on opportunity for students. Oak Orchard Students Engage in Enrichment Opportunities



At Oak Orchard, Exploration Time is for 1st and 2nd graders. "Students participate in a 12 school day rotation where they visit one of 13 different offerings from teachers," explains Principal Jennifer Stearns. "The offerings are meant to enrich student's life experiences outside of school and support building their background knowledge."

Mustang Marching Band Falls Back Into Step After Canceled 2020 Season

The Mustang Marching Band has been a source of pride for many years in Medina Central School District. Last year, due to the pandemic, marching bands across the state had to cancel their competition season. For many it has not been an easy way back to the field. Band Director Jimmy Steele says that although the high school and intermediate school students were still able to get individual lessons virtually or hybrid last school year, it was unclear how they would all come together. "In 2019, we were New York State Champions and now



we have to work our way back with losing about 20% of the band because of graduations. We really didn't do a lot of recruiting. Unfortunately, the new norm for many of our students is staying at home, watching TV and being with their families only. Many of them did not pick up their instruments for a couple of years and many felt reluctant to get together with other students so we didn't get the normal amount of new members. We usually have 10% of the school participate in band and most of students are from 7th to 9th grade, this year most are in 10th to 12th grade."

Mr. Steele says even though they are down to 87 students as opposed to the normal 100-105, they are still the third largest in the state. "We are lucky, many of the schools are facing challenges in getting enough members and some are not even participating in the season this year. We have a good core group of students and it is going well. Our new show is entitled "Together Again" and it plays off of our past shows, "Together As One" and "Walk the Path". It is a true celebration of being back after the pandemic."

This season, students are readjusting to a normal season and getting their marching fundamentals back in sync. They seem to enjoy coming together and creating the magic again. "Their dedication is amazing and we are looking forward to a safe and enjoyable competition season," says Mr. Steele.

The Mustang Marching Band Wins Championship

The Medina Marching Band won the championship during the New York State Field Band Championships at the Carrier Dome in Syracuse.

Medina had the highest score, 94.75, among the nine bands in the Small School 1 Division.

Medina's performed a program called "Together Again" in a return to competition after the 2020 season was wiped out due to Covid-19. Medina also won the title in 2019.



Medina's score on Sunday topped New Hartford at 92.40; Mineola at 92.25; Malvern at 90.60; East Syracuse-Minoa at 89.65; East Irondequoit at 88.45; Central Square at 87.50; Oswego at 87.10; and Mohonasen at 82.70.

Sunday's event also included the induction of retired Medina Marching Band Director Joseph McKain into the 2021 NYS Field Band Conference Hall of Fame. McKain led the marching band in Medina from 1970 to 1999.



Mustangs Impress with Football Playoff Debut

Venturing into uncharted waters, Medina made its state football playoff debut on November 13th as the Mustangs took on East Rochester/Gananda in the Class C Far West Regional contest at noon at Williamsville South High School.

Although it did not turn out as they hoped, the team still put on an impressive showing with a 26-24 decision that saw the East Rochester/Gananda take home the Class C Far West Regional Championship. "It's huge," said Medina Coach Eric Valley of advancing to the state playoffs. "Just to have a chance to win a state title. I'm just super glad for the kids to have this opportunity."

Fresh from capturing sectional championships both the Mustangs and Bombers brought 11-0 records into the state playoffs.

Medina romped to a very snowy 48-6 win over Fredonia to claim a second straight Section VI Class C title while East Rochester/Gananda outlasted Bath Haverling 18-12 in double overtime to earn the Section V Class C crown.
