

### Bills Name Medina Football Coach Eric Valley Coach of the Year

Even though there has been no high school football this fall, the Buffalo Bills are still honoring coaches around Section VI for their contributions to their players, their school and their community.

Medina Varsity Football Coach Eric Valley was named the ADPRO Sports Coach of the Year for Section VI during the Bills vs. Dolphins game during halftime. Coach Valley is a Medina High School graduate who played college football at SUNY Cortland. Valley has been on the Mustangs coaching staff for 25 years and served as head coach for the past 13 years. "I am very grateful to be part of the Football program here in Medina," says Coach Valley. "This award is a reflection of our coaching staff, our student athletes, our district and community. A huge thank you to the Buffalo Bills organization and ADPRO Sports for supporting high school football in our area."

The Bills' press release notes that in addition to serving as varsity football coach and athletic director, Valley has helped bring unified sports including basketball and bowling to the Medina athletic program. It also points out that Valley is very involved in the community. He works closely with the Medina LOYAL Football organization, has organized the "Miles for Heils" 5K run to raise money for a local family whose father passed away and the "Coins for Coopers" fundraiser which aided a local family who lost their home to a fire.

The honor earns Medina a \$1,400 grant as well as a \$2,000 credit from ADPRO Sports for the Mustangs football program.

"That is greatly appreciated," said Valley during an interview on the half-time program on the Bills website. "Obviously a small community like ours we can use every penny we get to make it a great experience for these kids as part of our program."

### Student Teaches Her BOCES Class Bunny Basics

Serenity Baumgart decided to share her passion for rabbit husbandry with her Animal Science classmates at the Orleans Career and Technical Education Center.

Teacher Paige Hungerford asked her if she wouldn't mind bringing in some of her pet rabbits and talking to the students about how to breed, raise and care for them. Serenity shared that she became interested in her hobby through the 4H, when someone volunteered to mentor her. "She taught me a lot about the different breeds of rabbits and what they require to stay healthy. It is something I really enjoy and nothing makes me happier to see a child's face when they are gifted one of them and I get to hand them over."

Serenity showed her class how to check the rabbits' health and check for any abnormalities. She talked about what she feeds her rabbits and what kind of equipment is required to raise them. She also talked about how to handle and show them and how to groom them. Mrs. Hungerford says she is grateful for Serenity for providing a very informative lesson to the class.


